



Physics at Marshall High School gives the students a sound background, for future study. It is also practical for those who don't intend to go on to college.



Students learning how to drive under the supervision of qualified instructors are taught the importance of safe driving. This is one of the reasons why driver training students usually make better drivers.






### **Student Council Works for Bigger and Better Things**






# Holiday In Blue






# G.A.A. Provides Members With Competitive Sports
