Along with the new school year came a new style of teaching-THE EIGHT BLOCK SYSTEM. This year the tradıtional six class days of fiftyfive minute classes extended to four. eighty-five minute classes with a Monday/ Wednesday and Tuesday/ Thursday schedule. Seminar time was a tıme set aside for the students. The first half was for those students with prearranged passes to take tests or get extra help. The second half was used for the students without passes to see their teachers. For the students who did not need extra help used the time to finish homework. This time made it so students and teachers did not have to stay after school to make up work or tests. Most students took advantage of this new class. Along with this system is the Friday schedule. On Fridays the students attend all seven of their classes plus an Advisor class in the place of Seminar. During Advisor the teachers were instructed to lead their class in discussions on various topics. Some teachers used Advisor time to clean up the school grounds and to explore the school. This year was definitely a year of change.

Not only did things change this year, but many things were added. Along with many additions to the school came two new classes. Anatomy/ Physiology and Ancient History. The Anatomy/Physiology class made a huge impact on the science department at Marshall. They really got a hands-on experience with the dissection of a sheep's eye and brain and then with a fetal pig. The fetal pig dissection took place in a few sessions so the students were able to get really involved in the project. Andrew Mckenna said that "Mrs. Wheeler did a great job teaching such a difficult class." The Ancient History class studied the periods between pre-history and the Renaissance. Stacı Garcia saıd, "At first I didn't want the class because I hadn't even signed up for it, but now I'm really glad that I took it. I learned a lot and really enjoyed the class.

With so many new additions to the year, a few complications were to be expected. Fortunately this year went very smooth. Although the eight block has not been accepted by all of the students, it seems to have a promising future.
