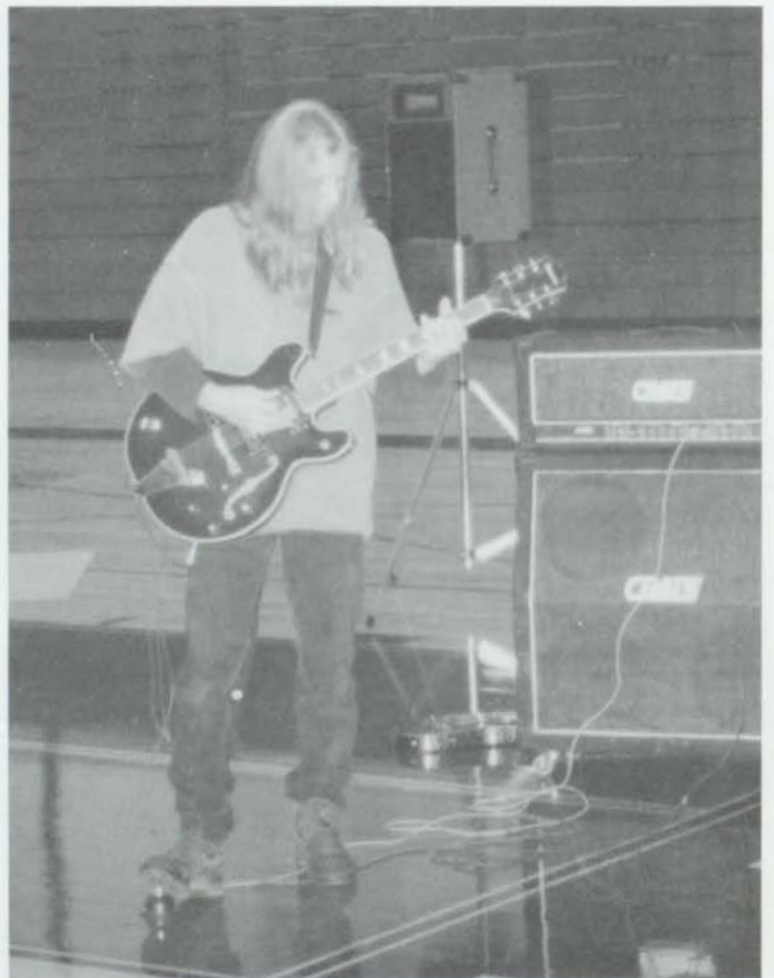

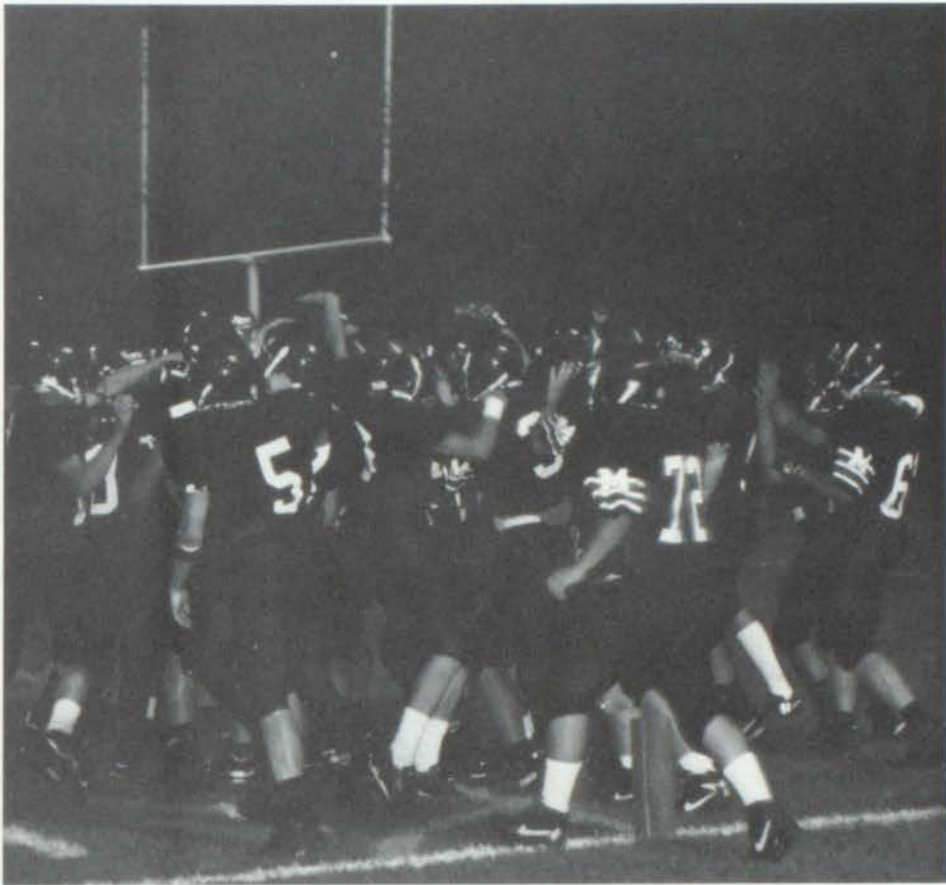

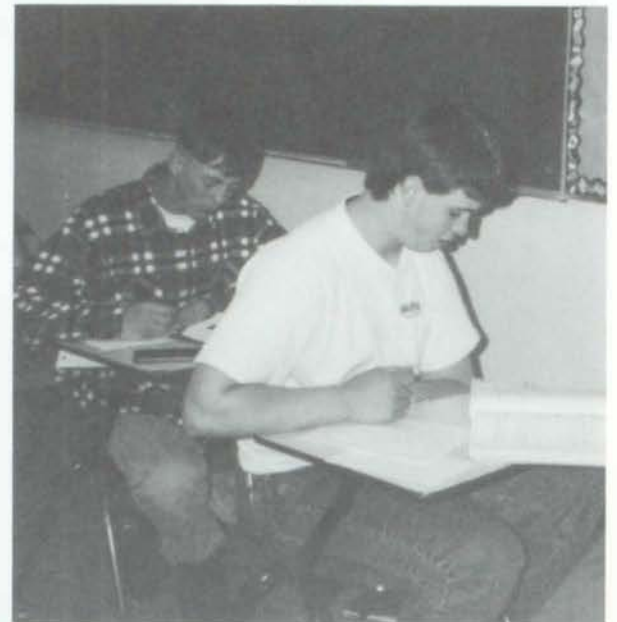

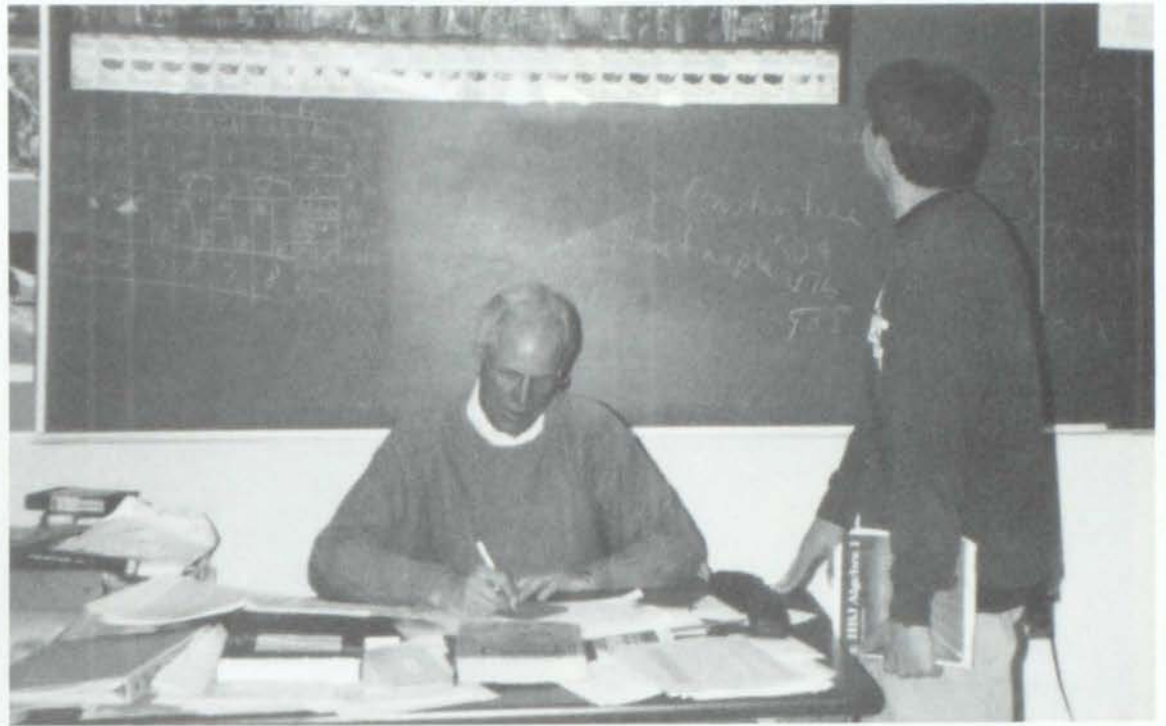

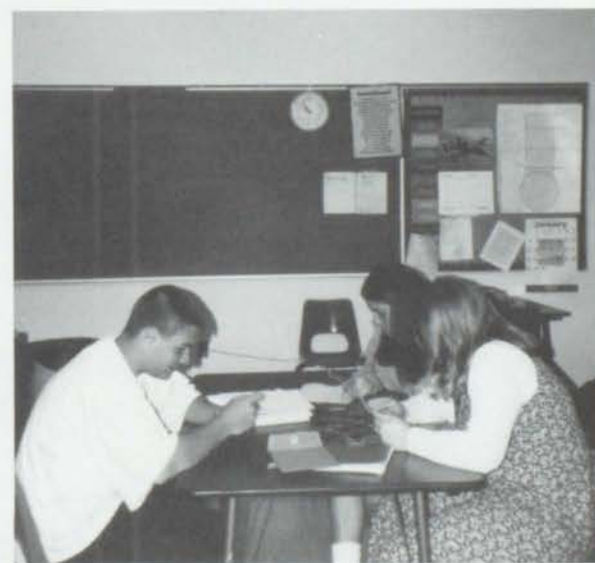

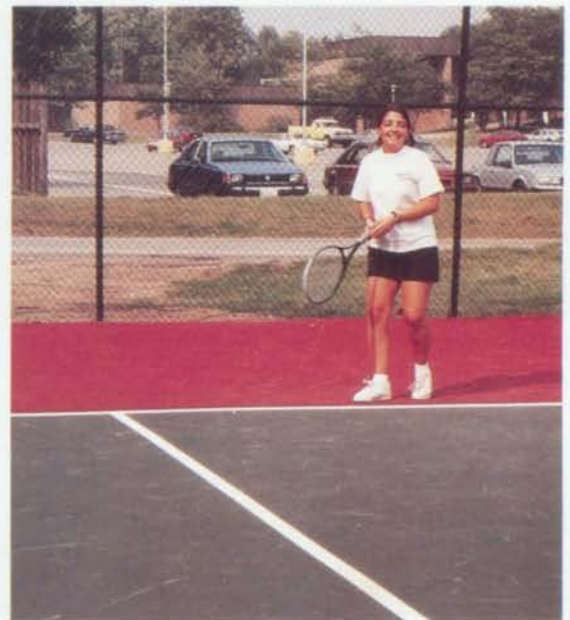

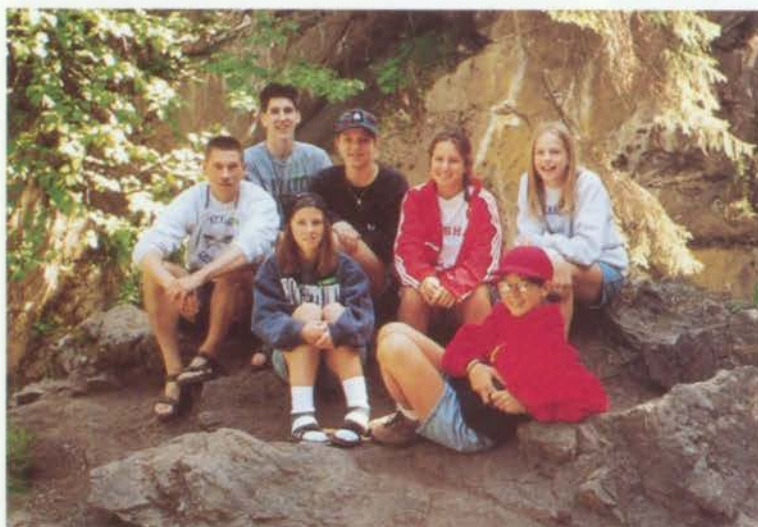
During the school year, relaxation time can't easily be found. For many, summer is intended for just that reason; but for others, traveling or working fills the summer.

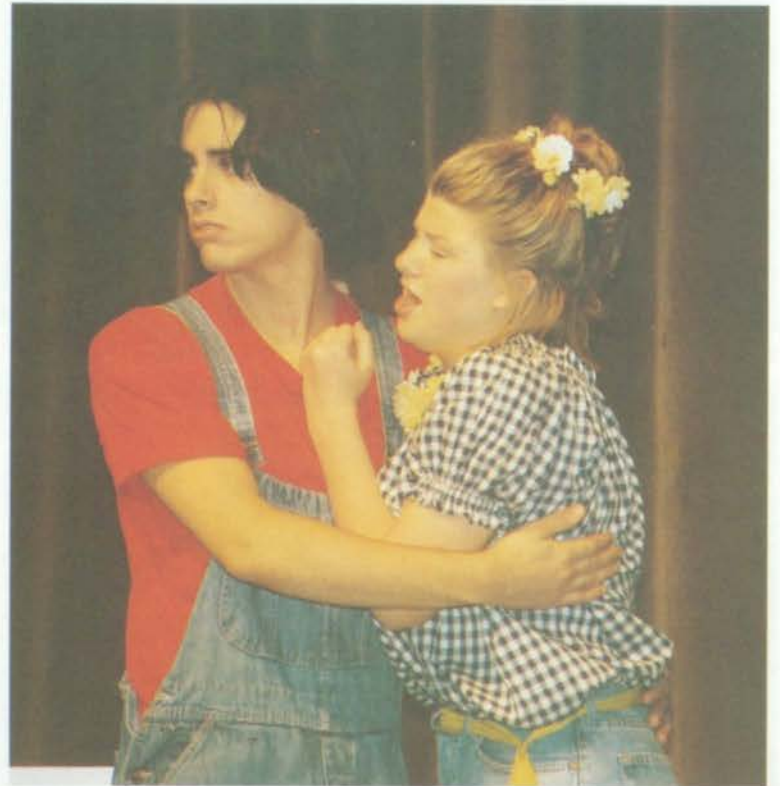

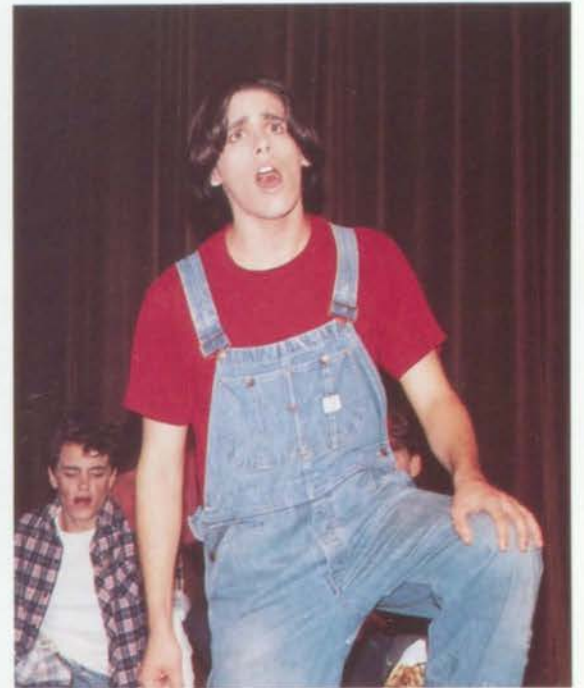

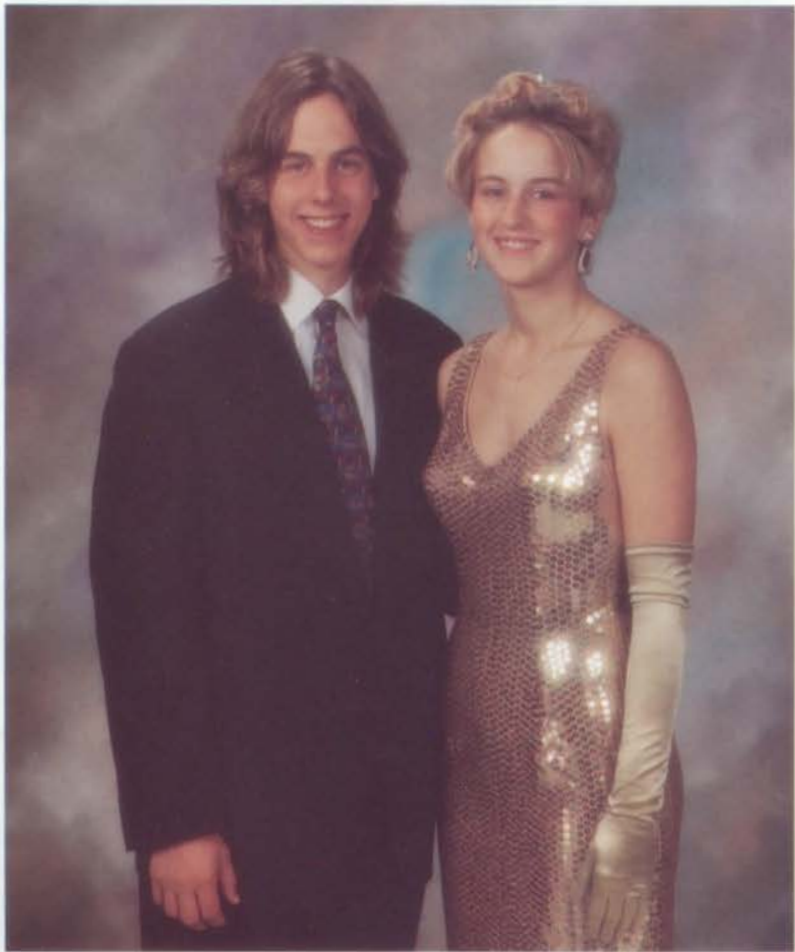

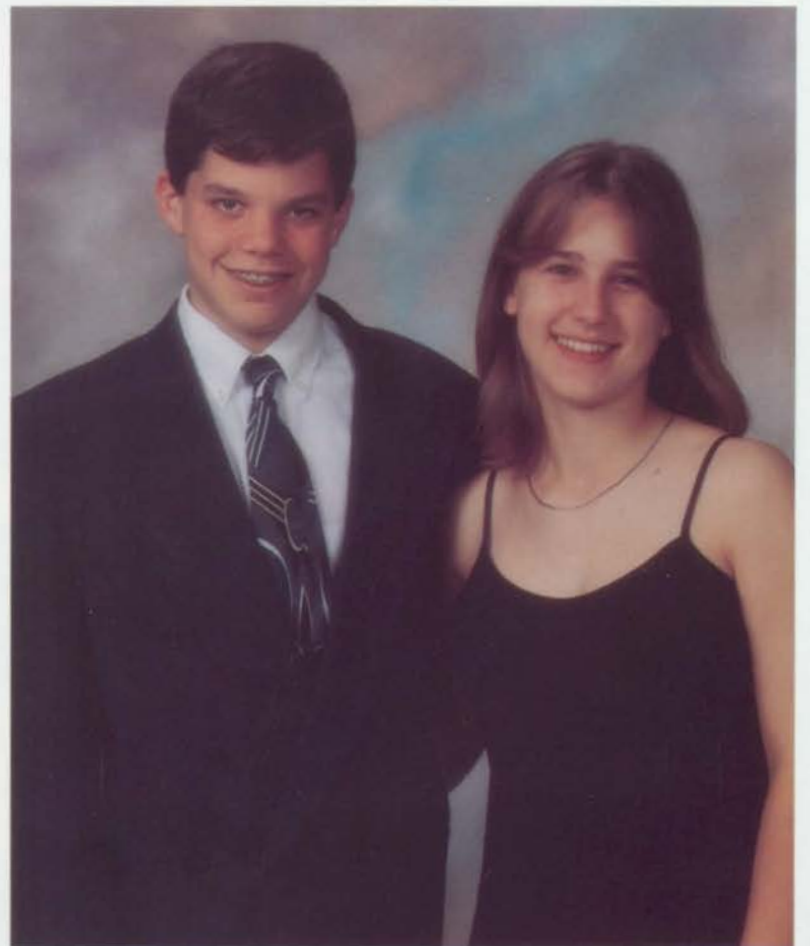

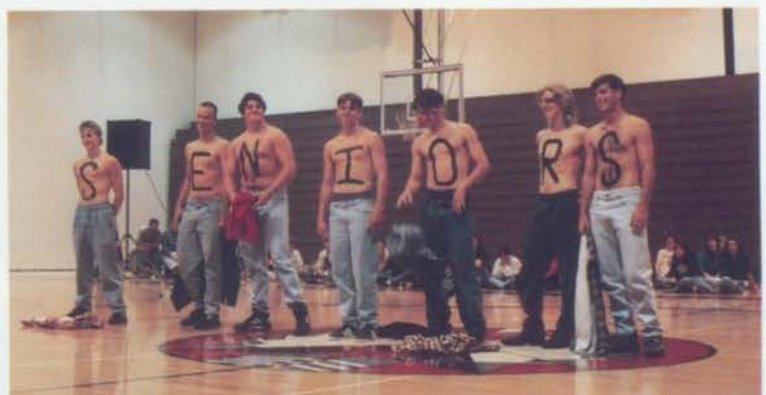

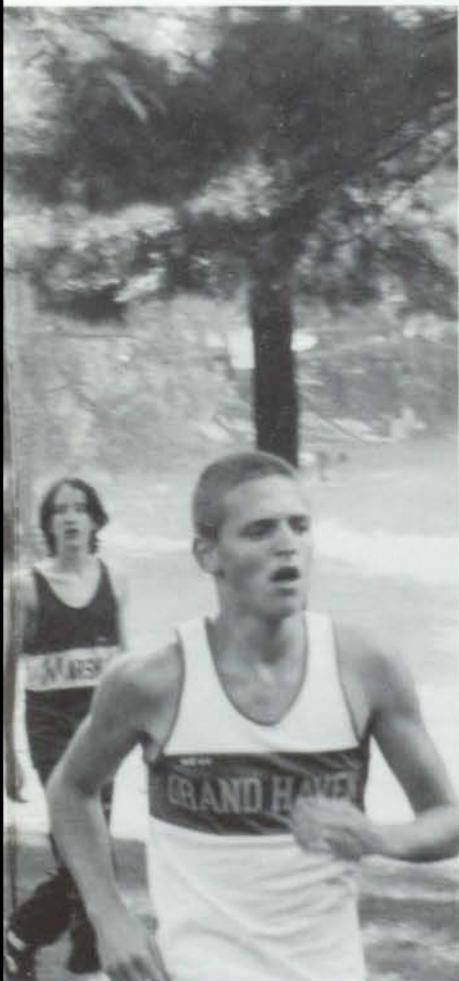

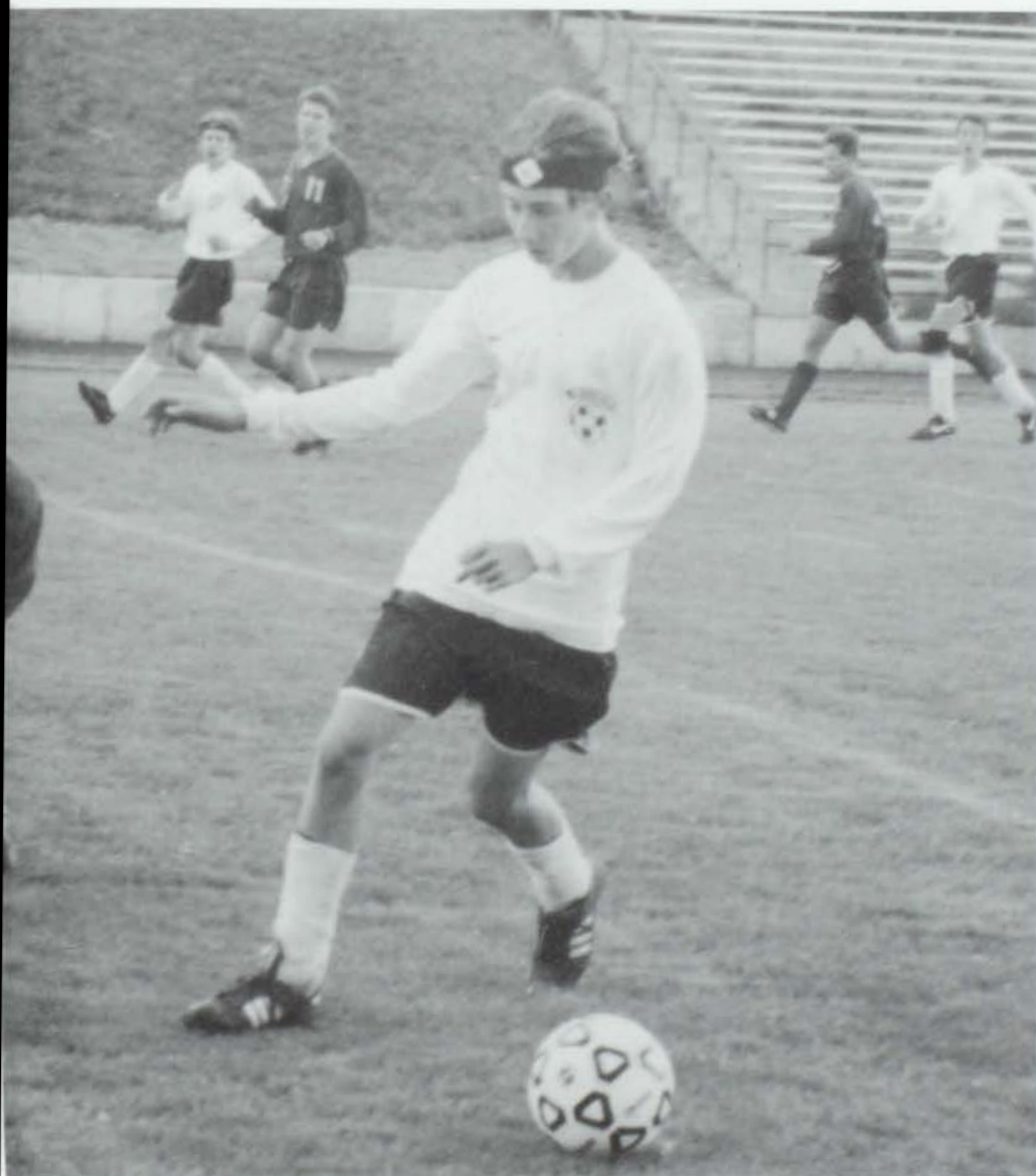

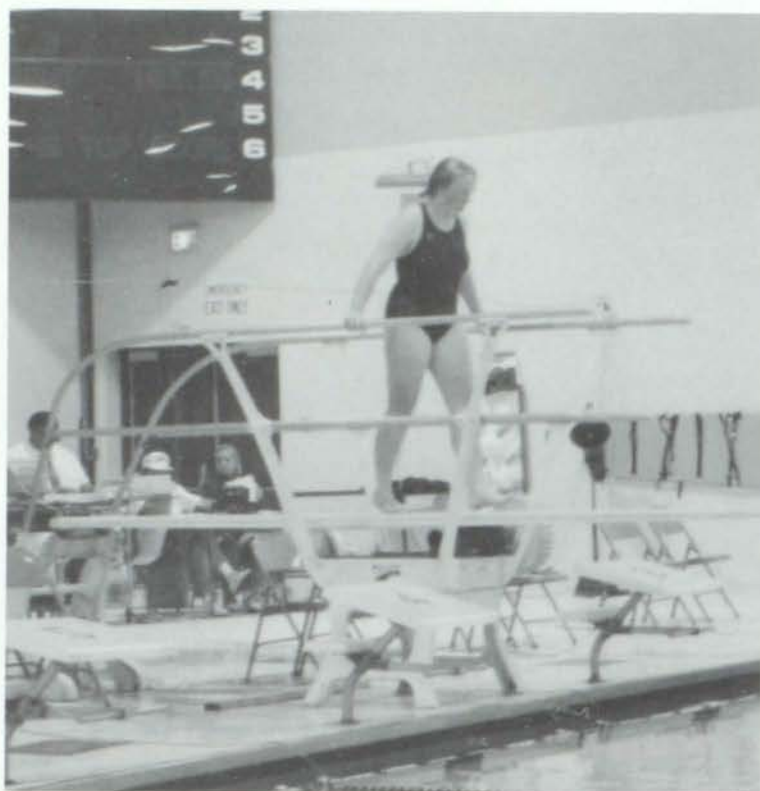

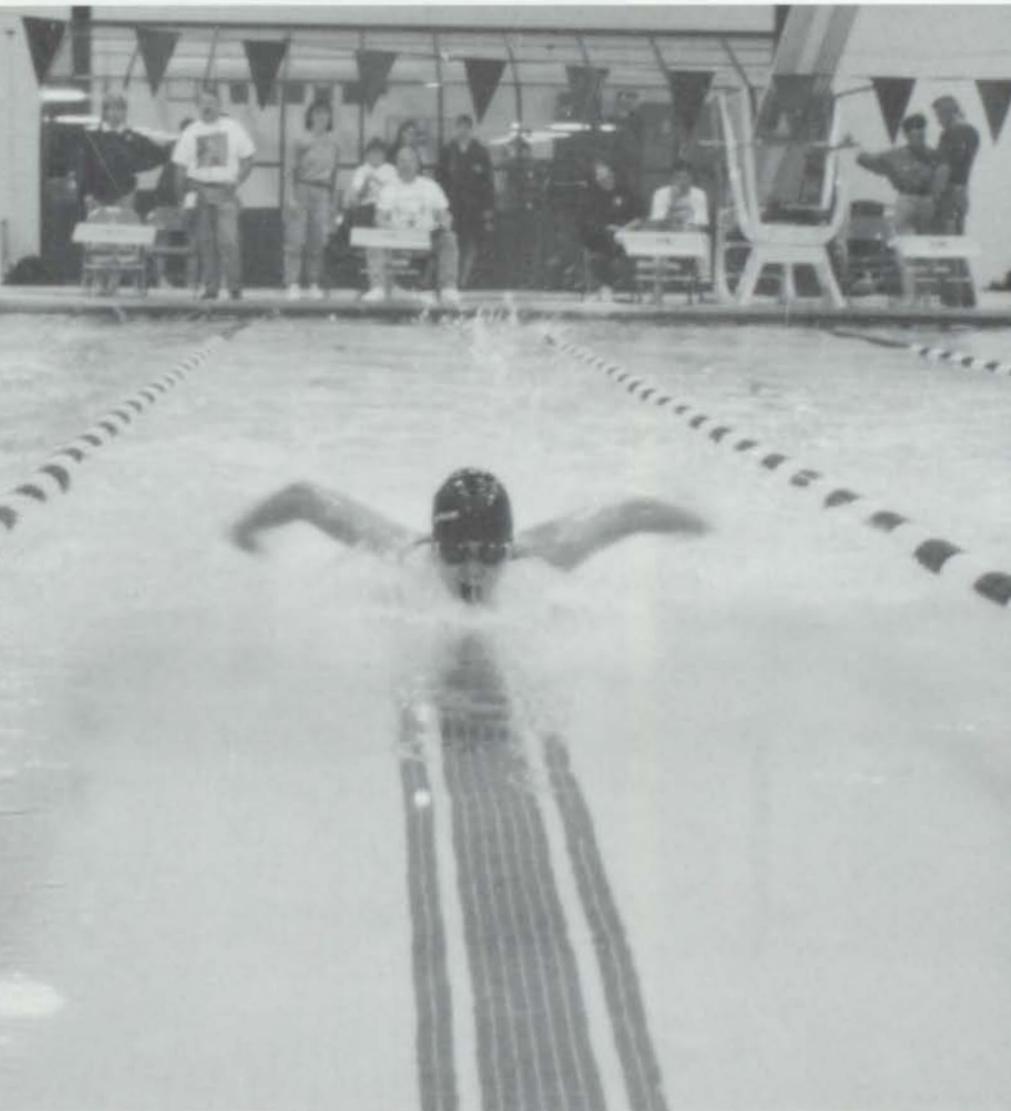

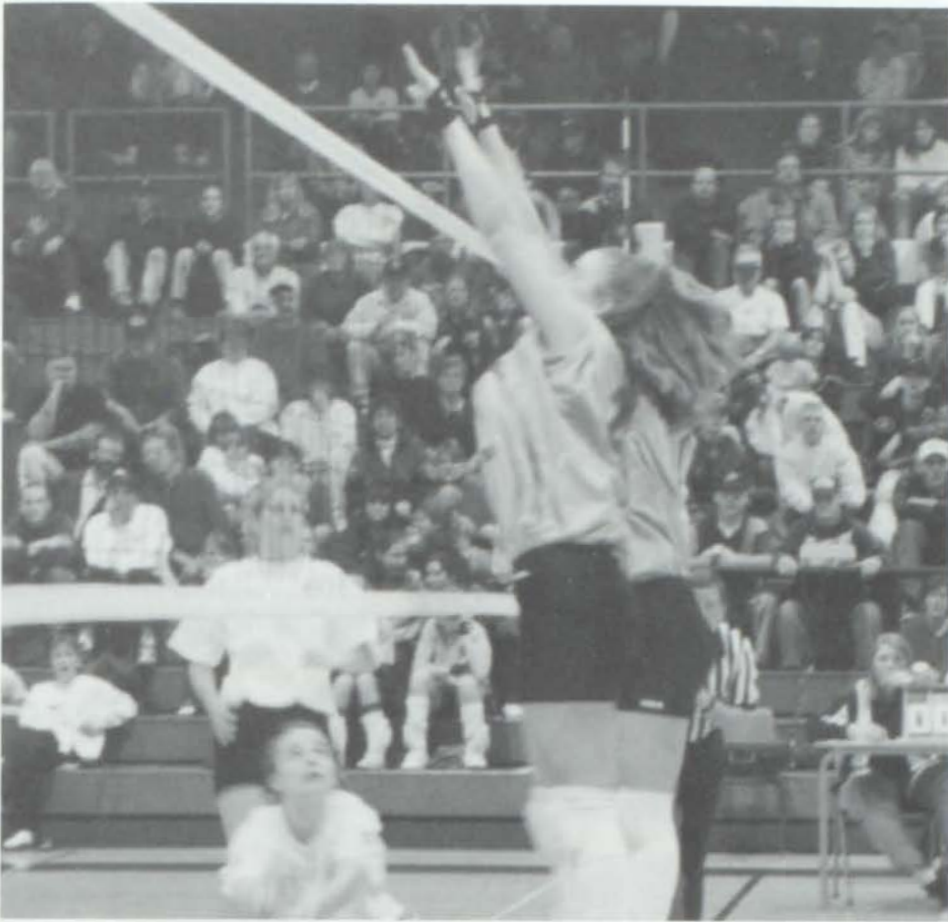

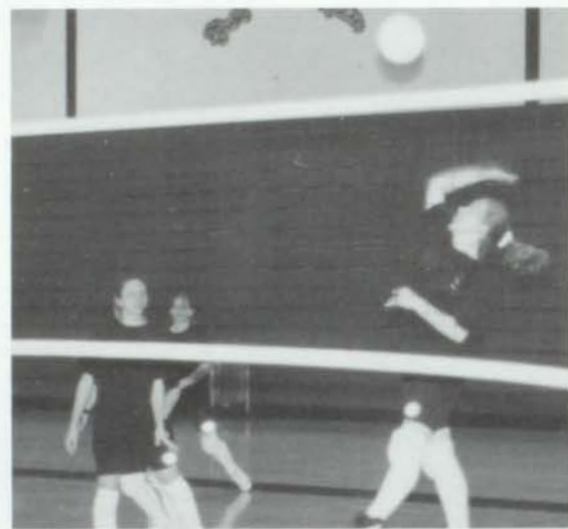
DIGGIN' THEIR WAY TO THE TOP

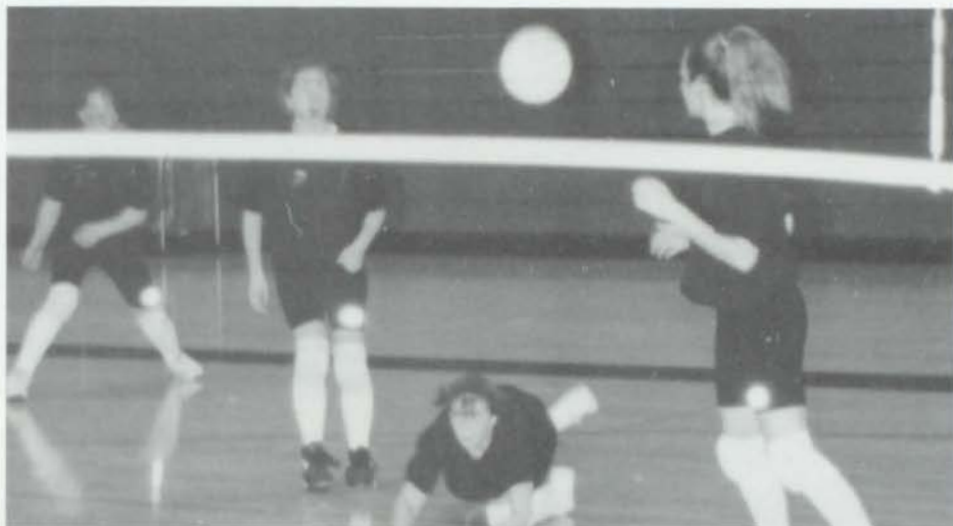

Marshall Wrestlers Slam Their Way to VICTORY!

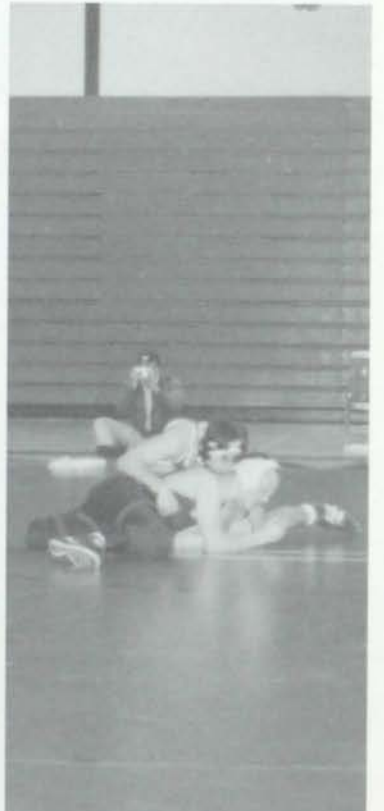

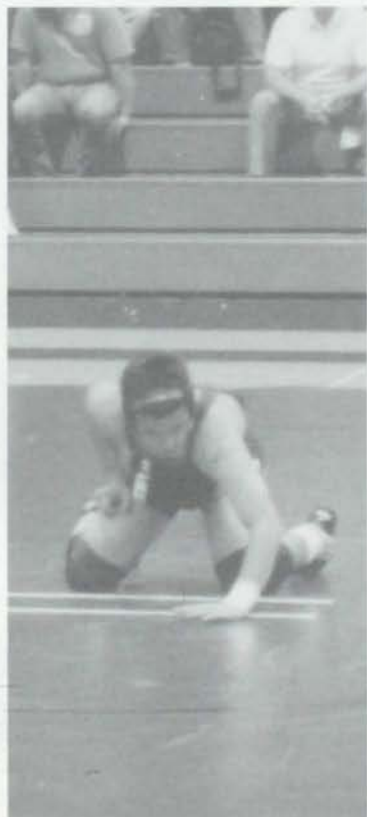

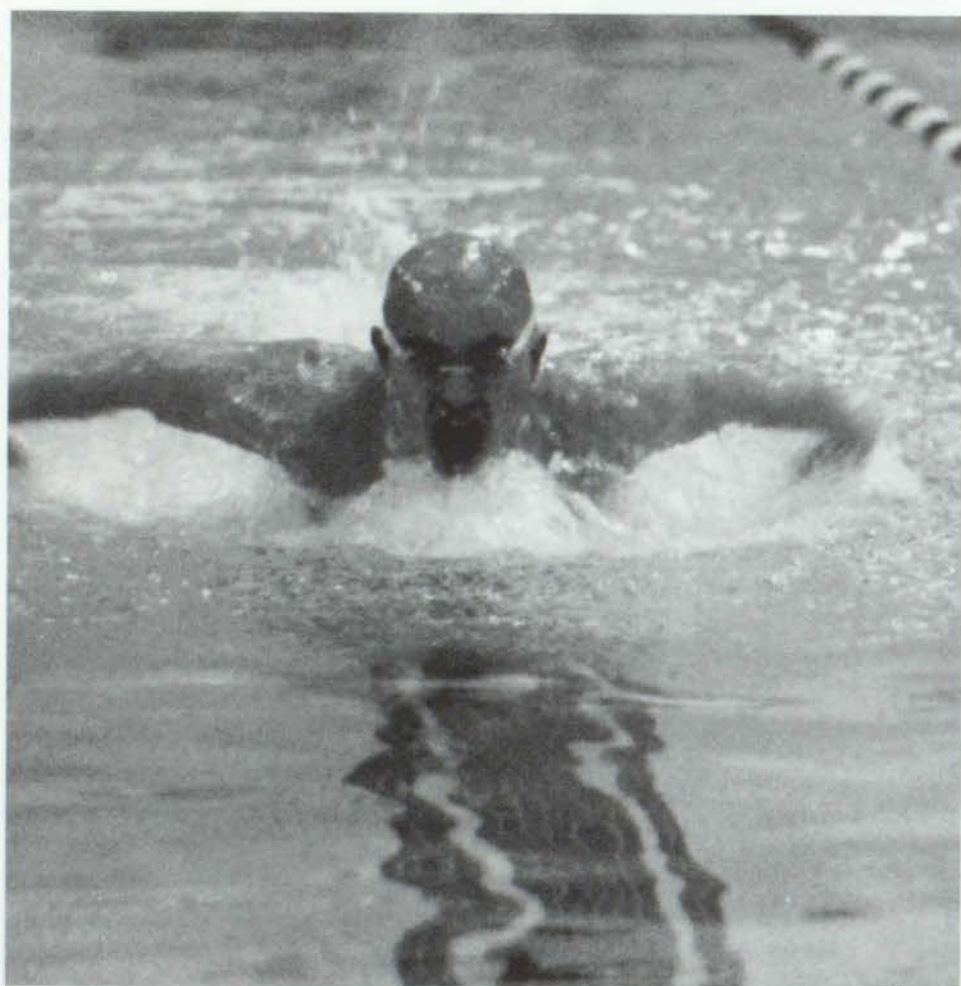

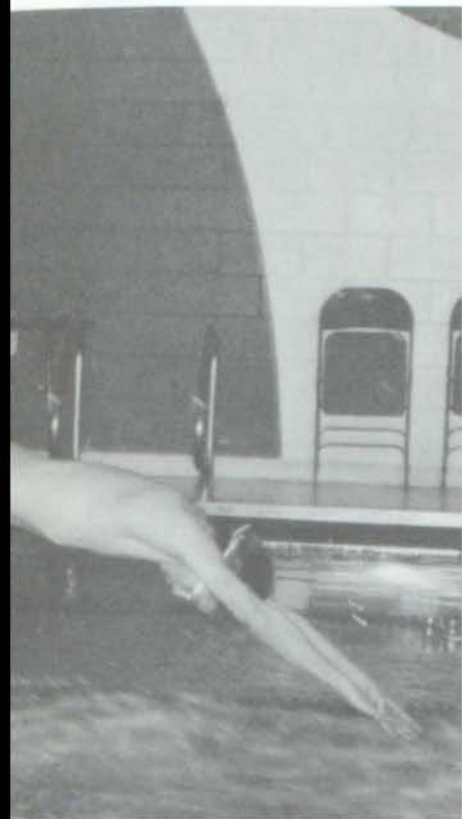

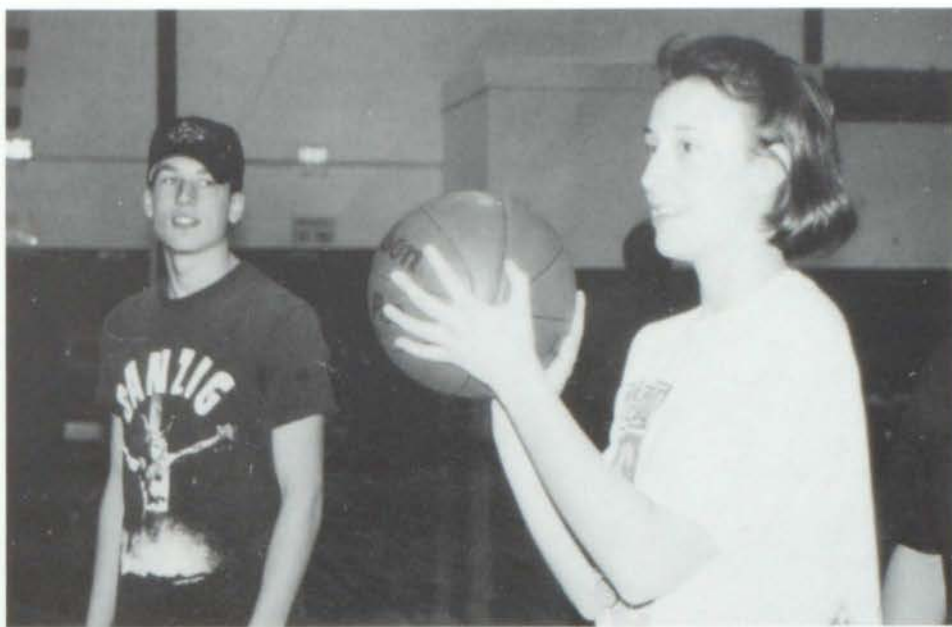

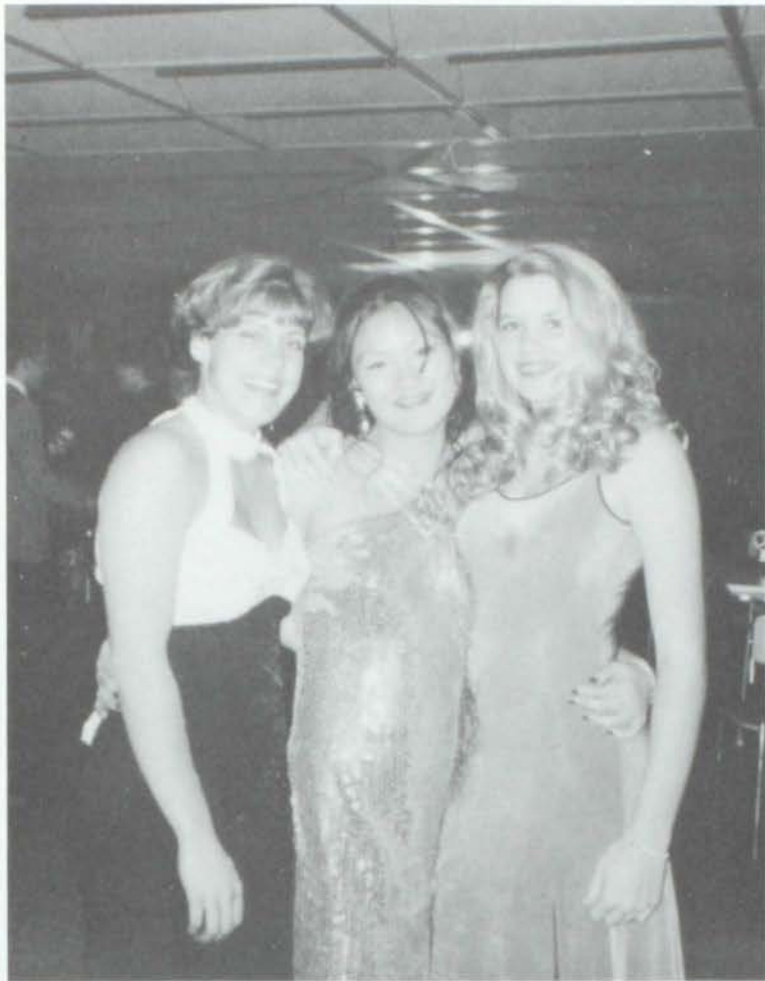

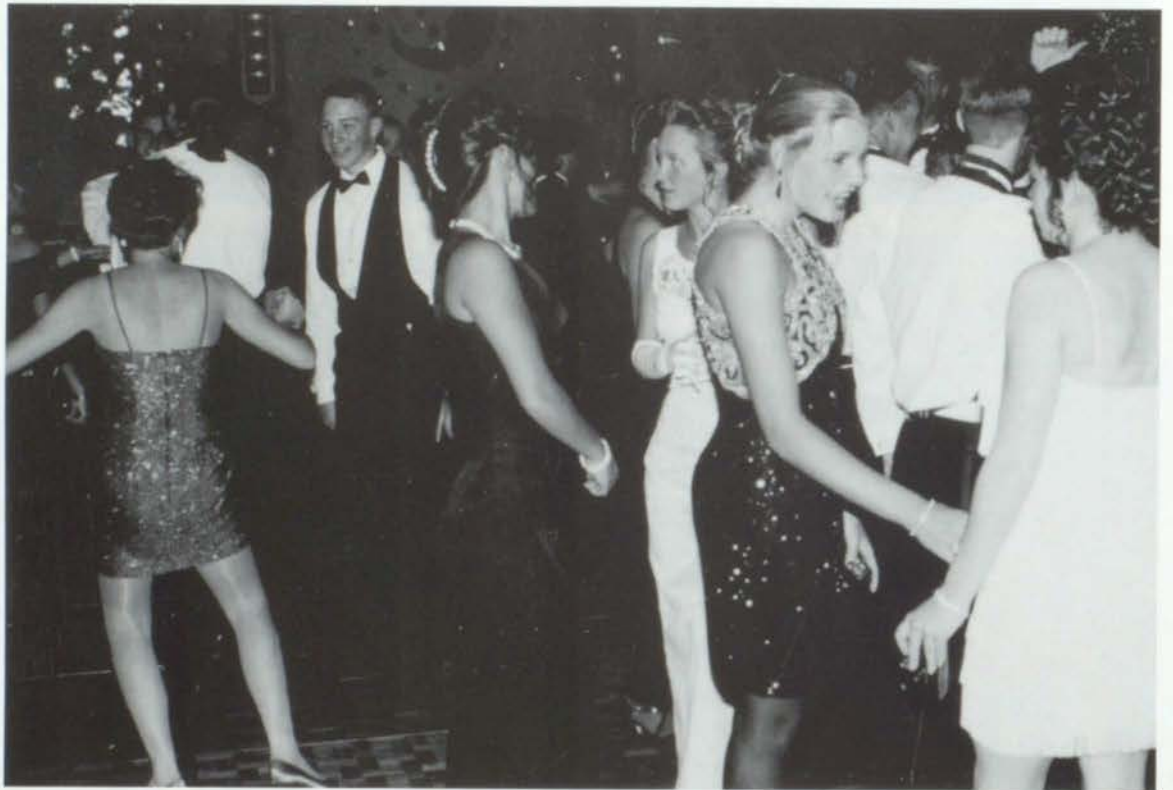

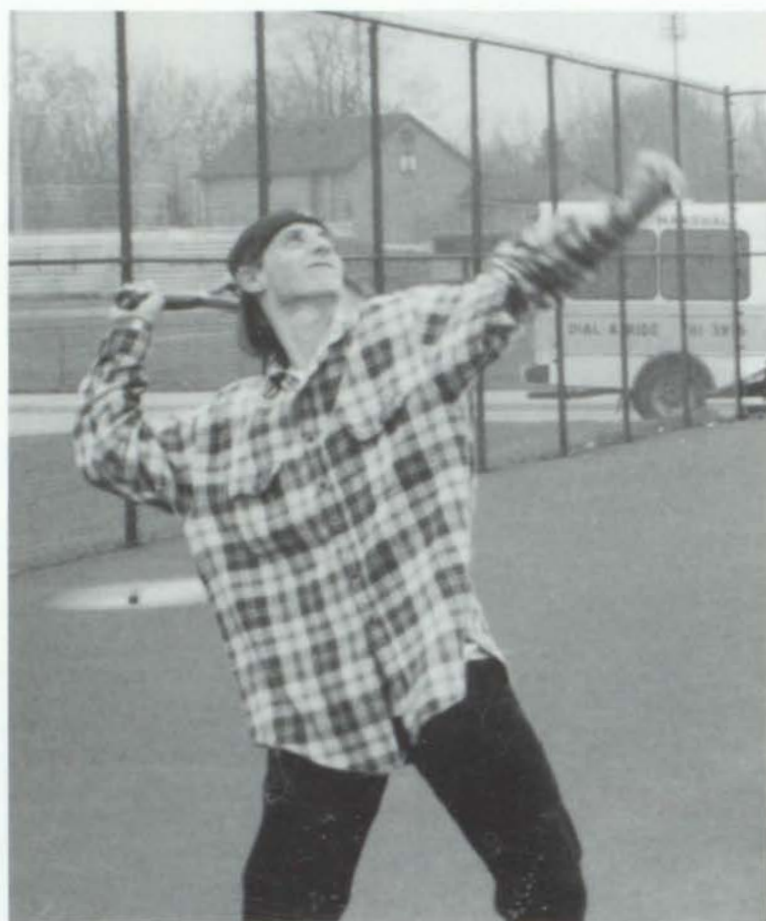


J.V. Tennis Conquers Wet Season

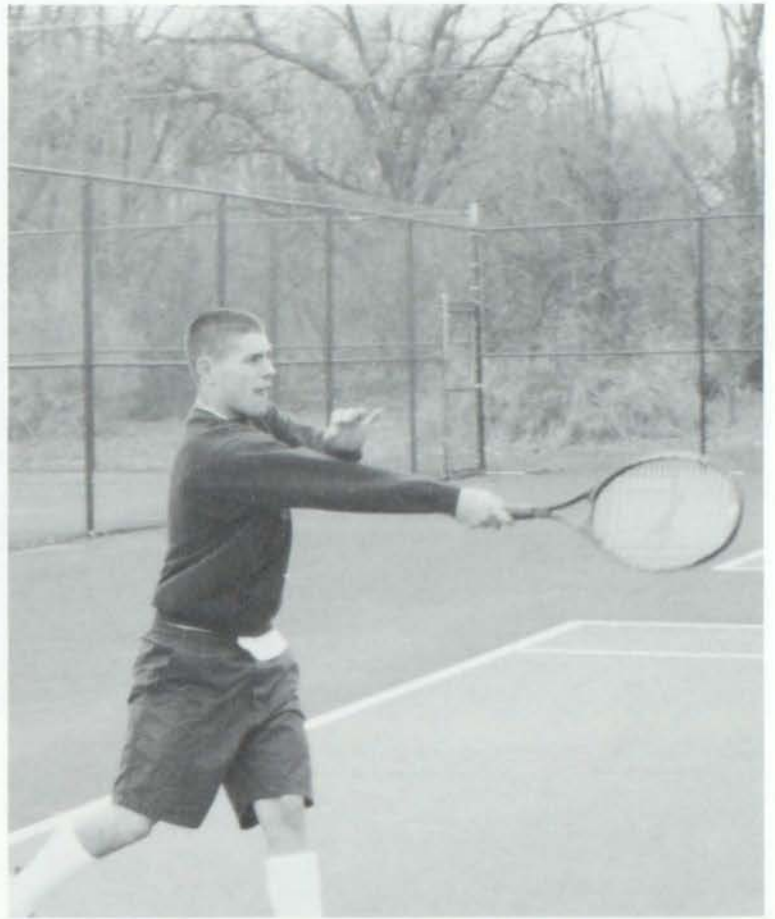

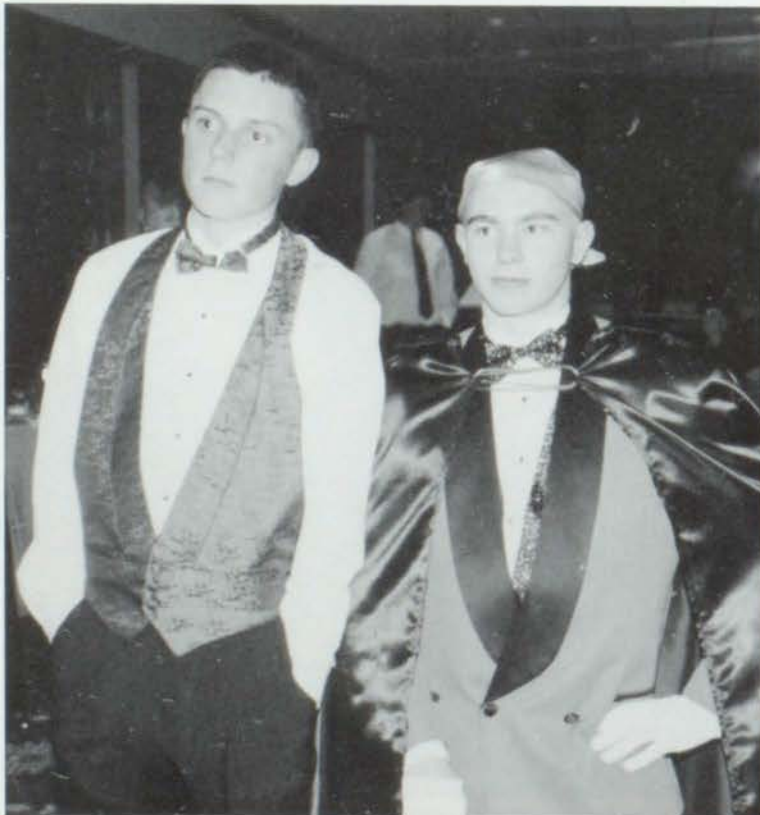

Along with the new school year came a new style of teaching-THE EIGHT BLOCK SYSTEM. Staci Garcia said, "At first I didn't want the class because I hadn't even signed up for it, but now I'm really glad that I took it. I learned a lot and really enjoyed the class."

With so many new additions to the year, a few complications were to be expected. Fortunately this year went very smooth. Although the eight block has not been accepted by all of the students, it seems to have a promising future.

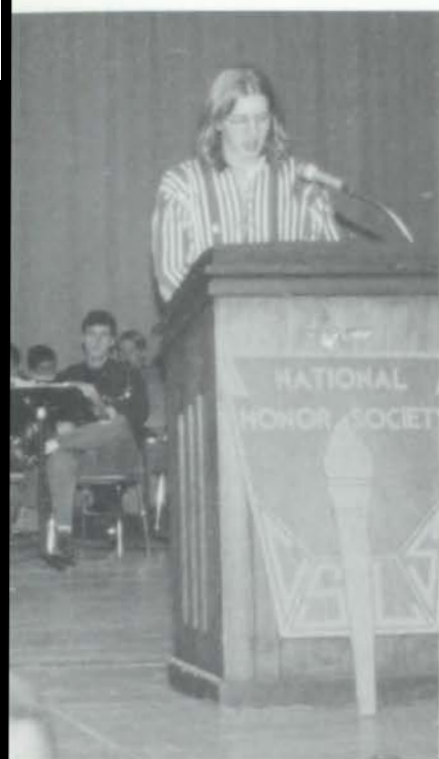

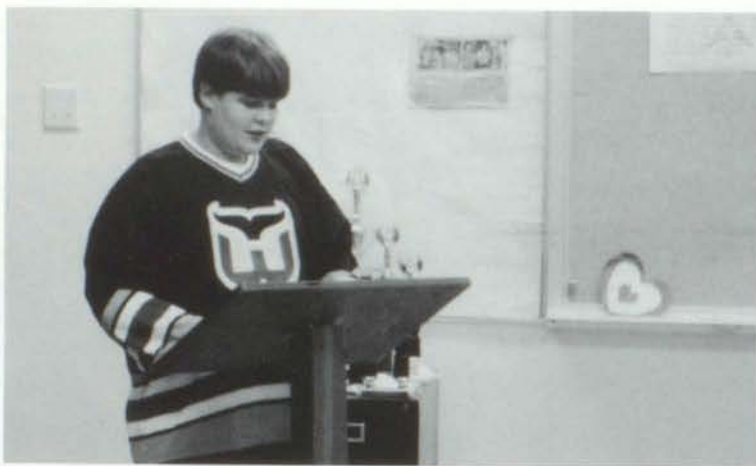

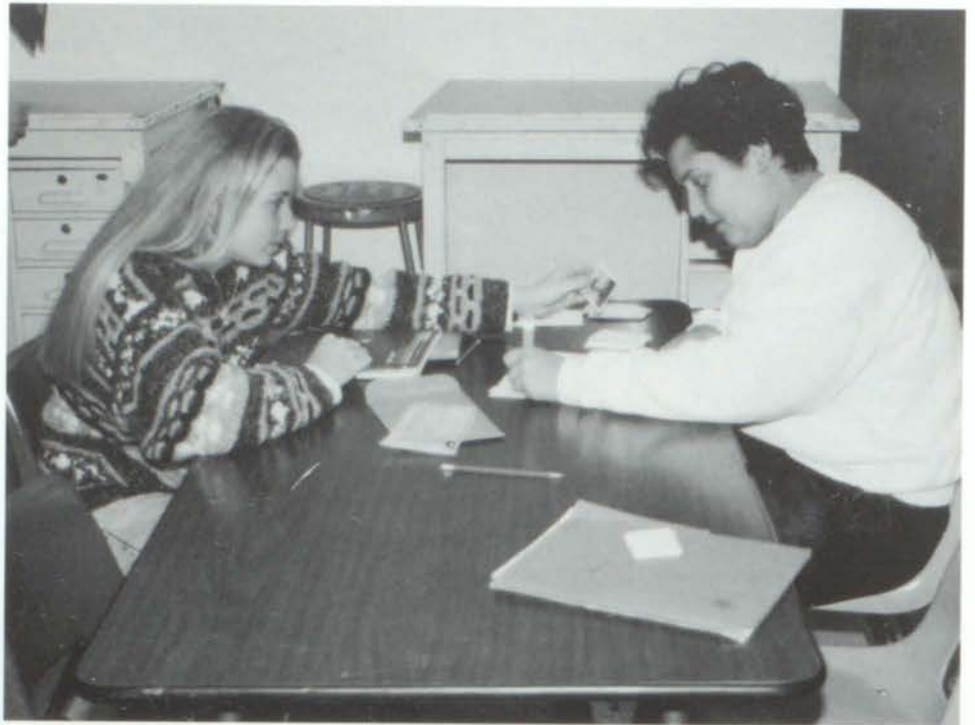

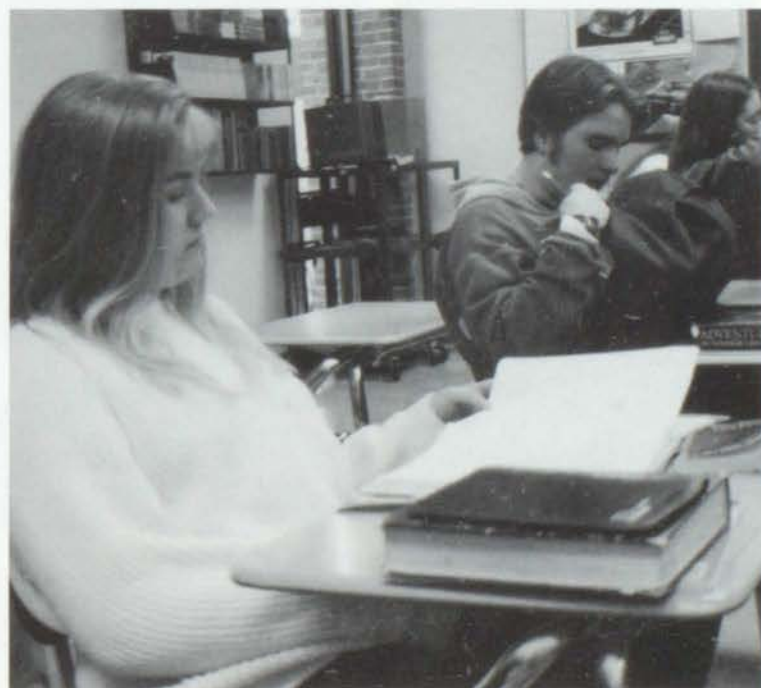

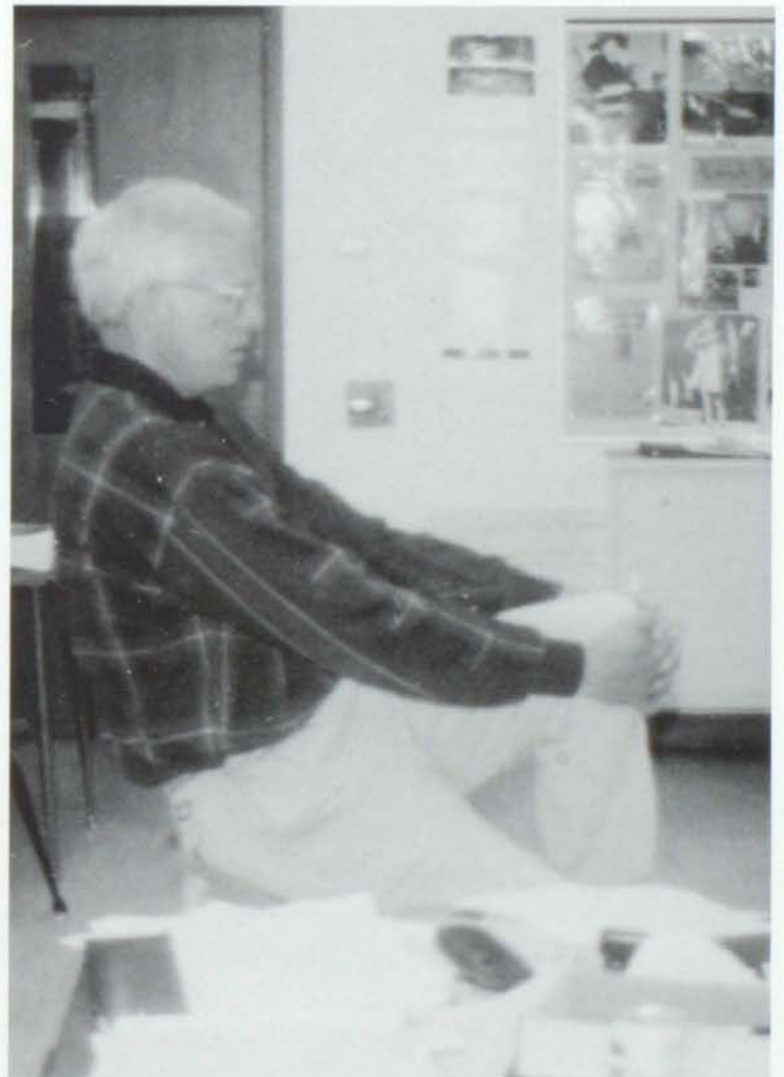

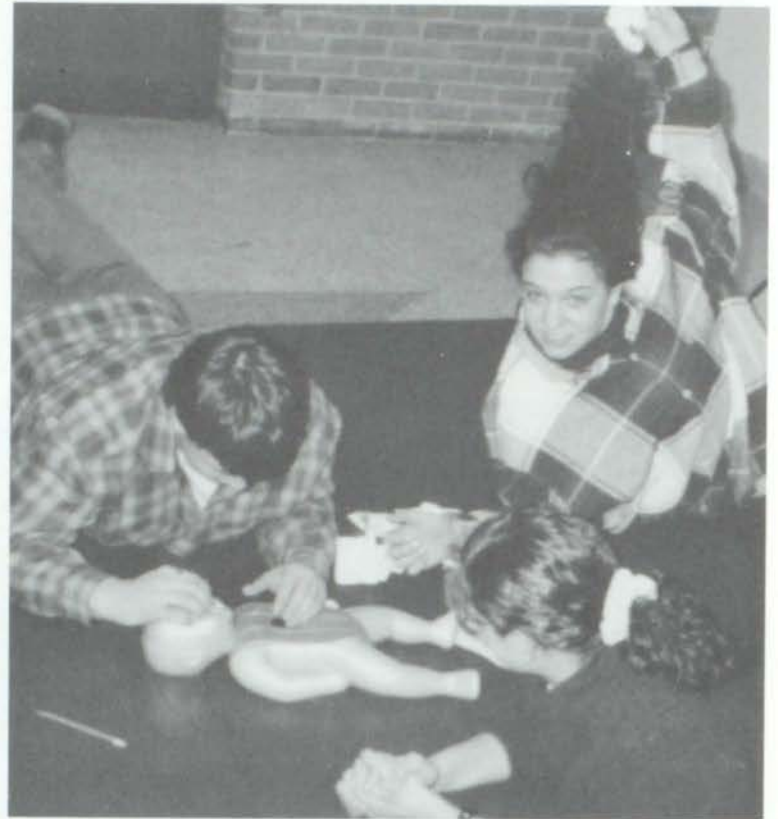

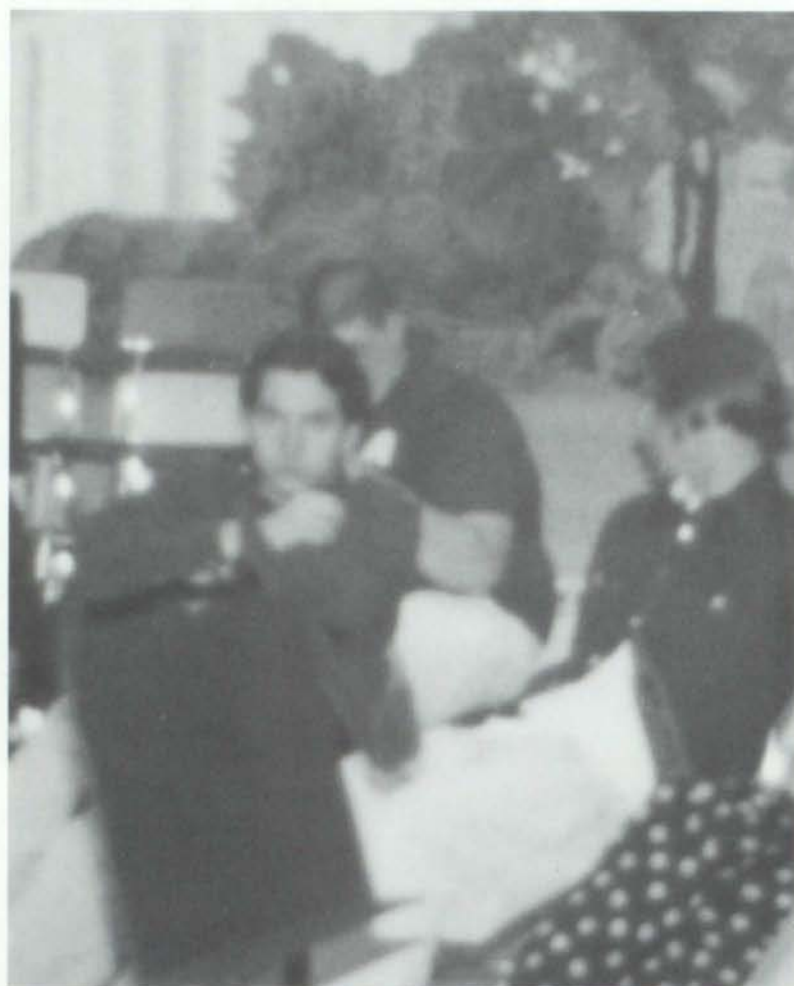


Crazy melodies
