This small dedication can never express the gratitude, respect, and admiration we all feel for this humble and great person. With our deepest appreciation, Miss Merritt — we thank you.



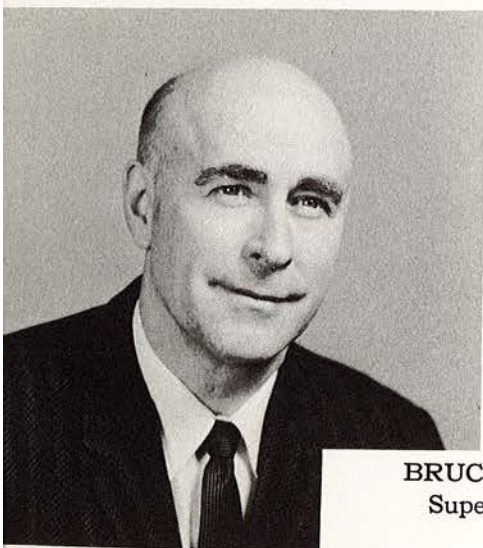
Administration Works for Better Schools

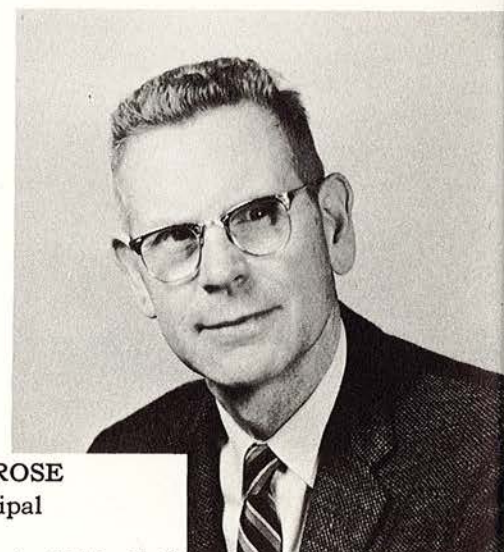
BOARD OF EDUCATION

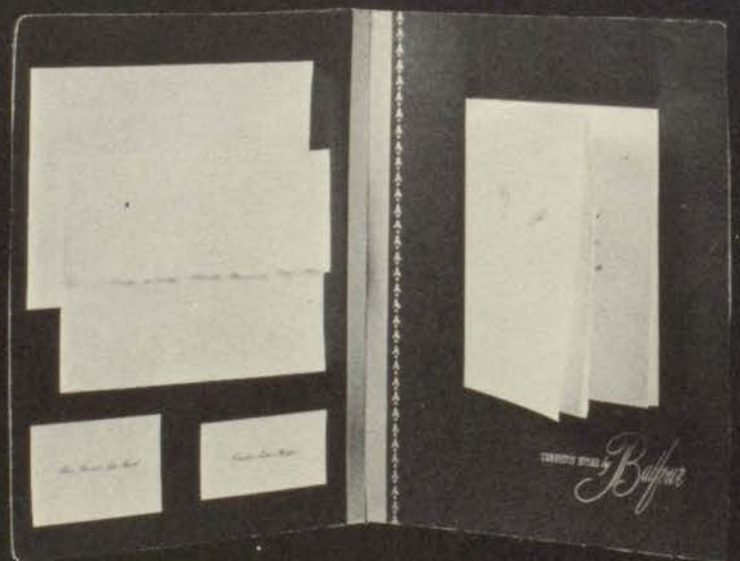
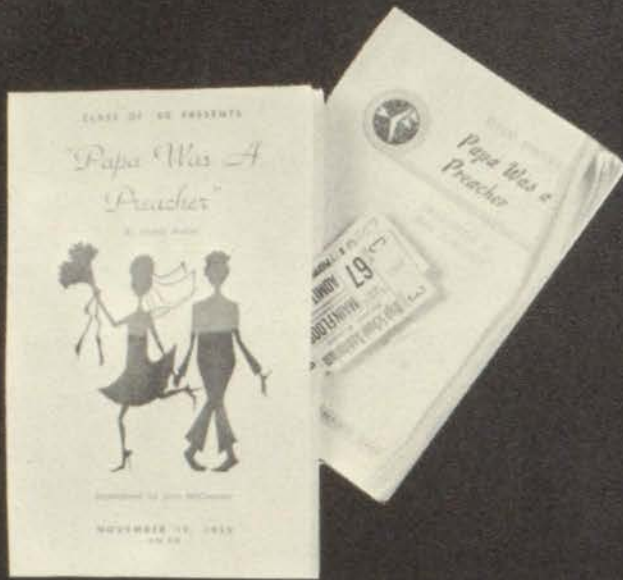

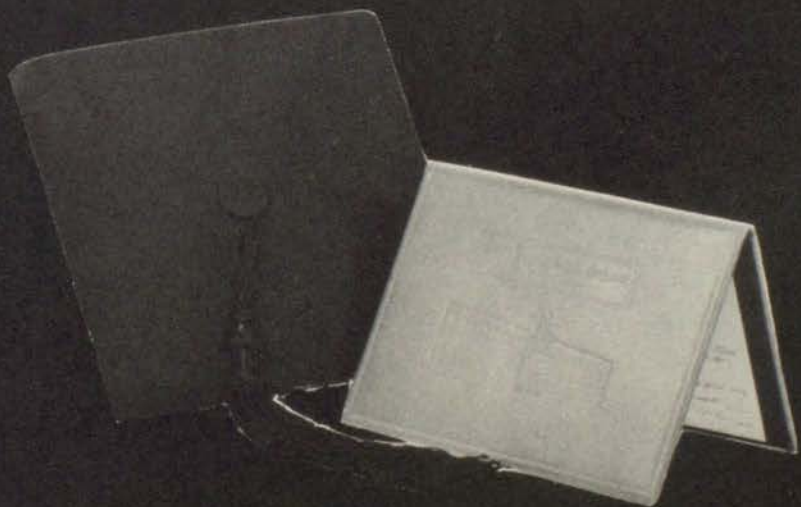

We, your 1960 graduates, in leaving, would like to pay tribute to you. We realize that the most formative part of our years was spent here and we will always recall many fond memories.

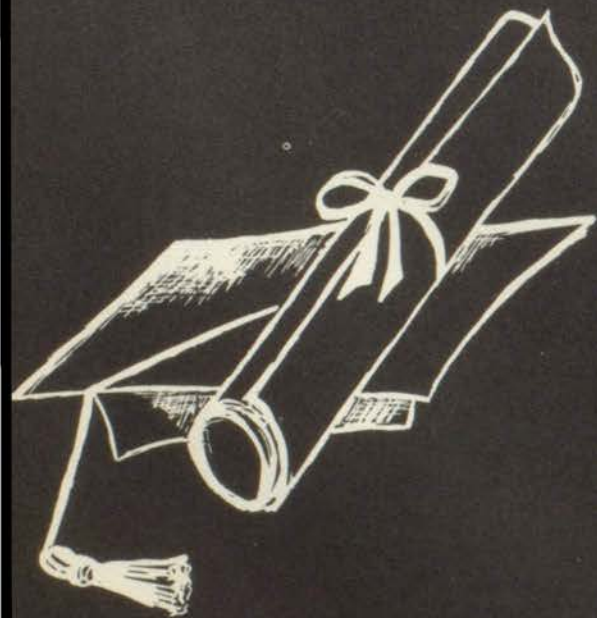

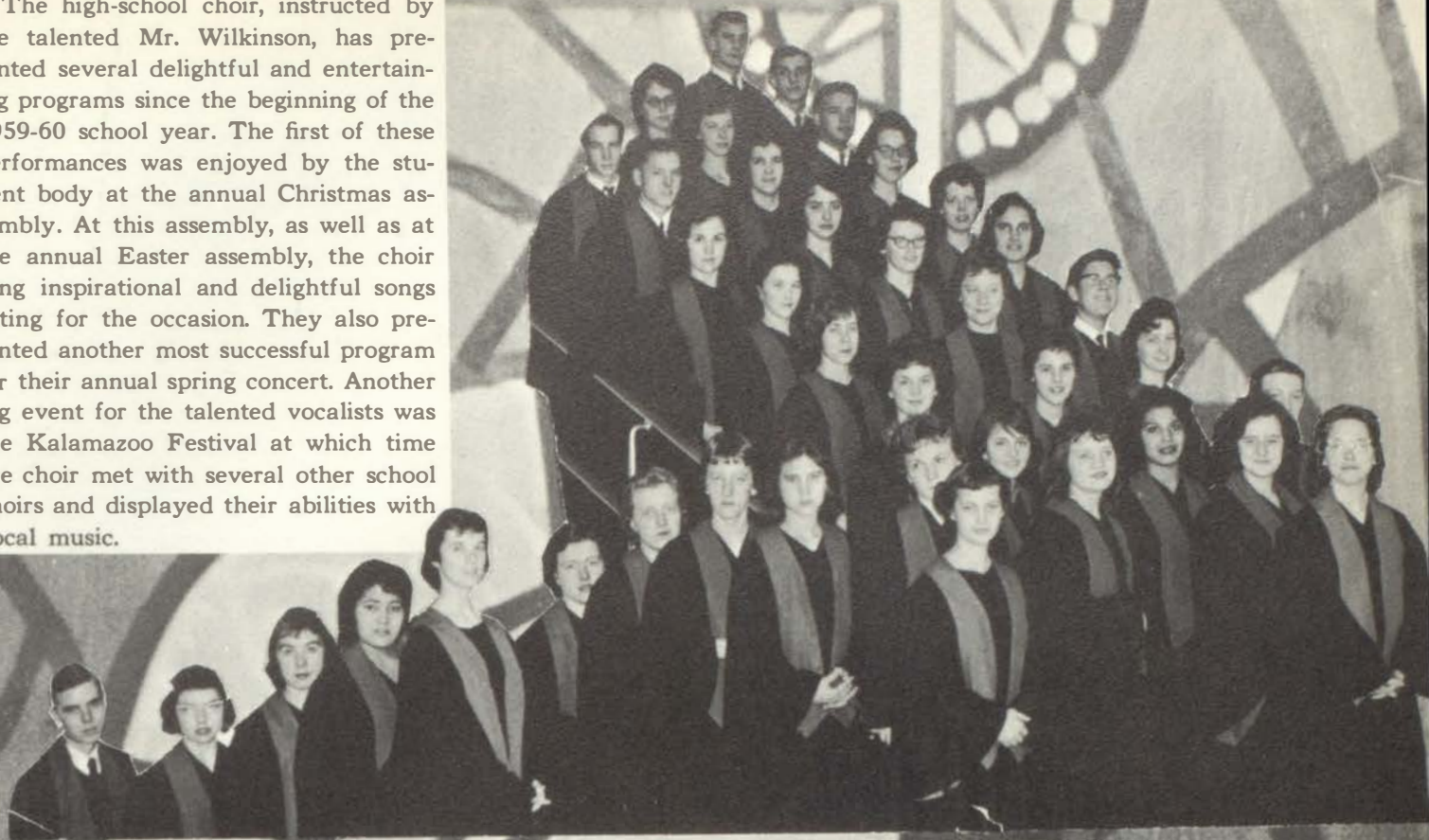

This three-act comedy, directed by Miss Burlingame, was presented by a skillful cast and crew.

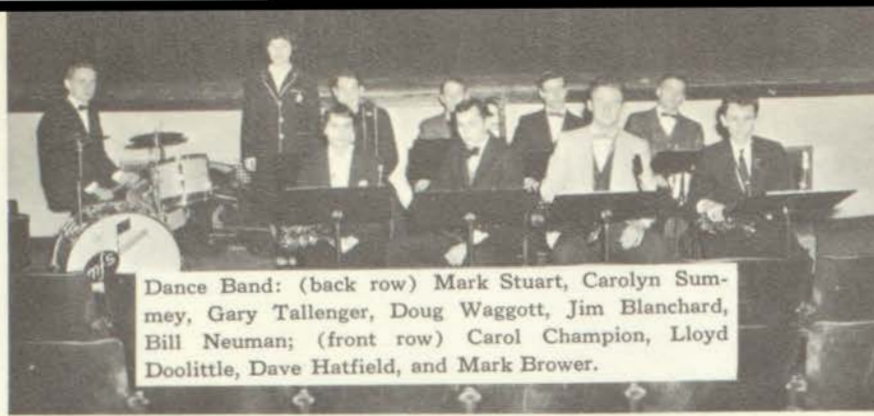

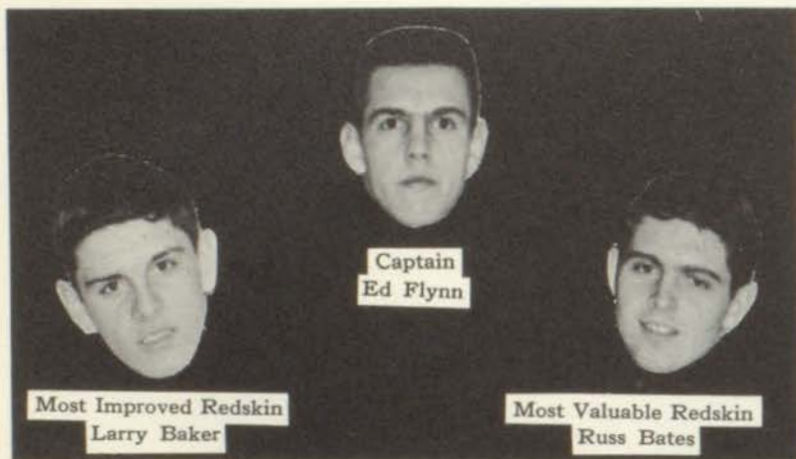


CAGERS FOOL ODDSMAKERS; TAKE CLASS 'B' DISTRICT TITLE

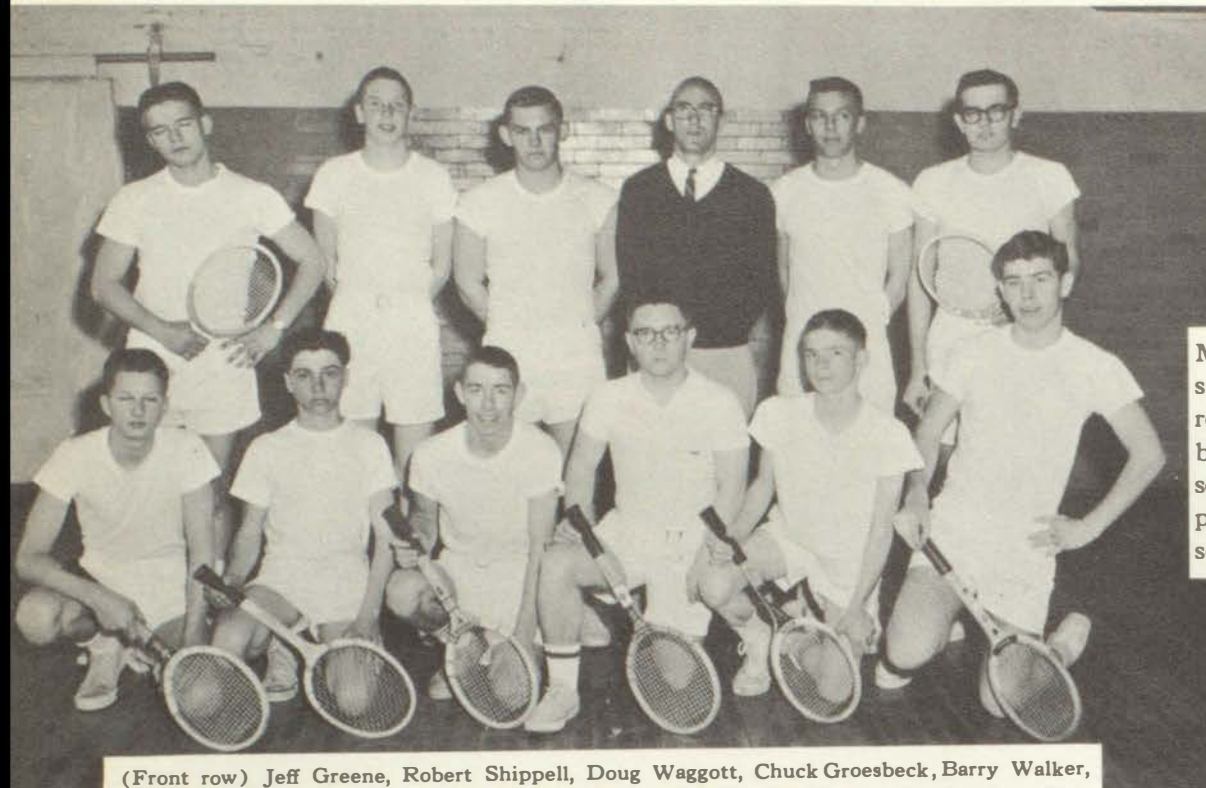

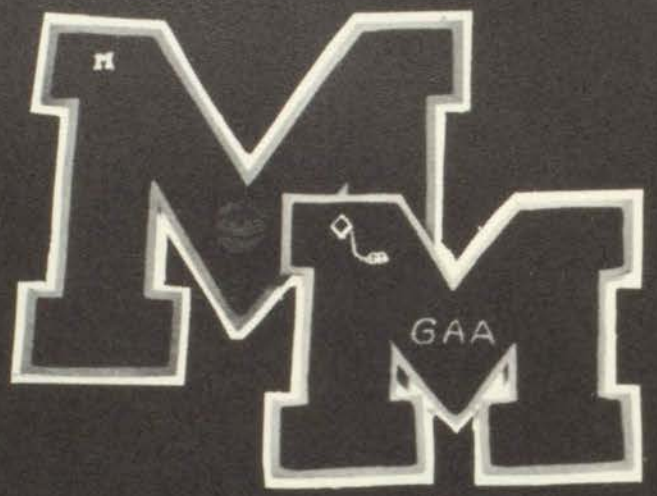

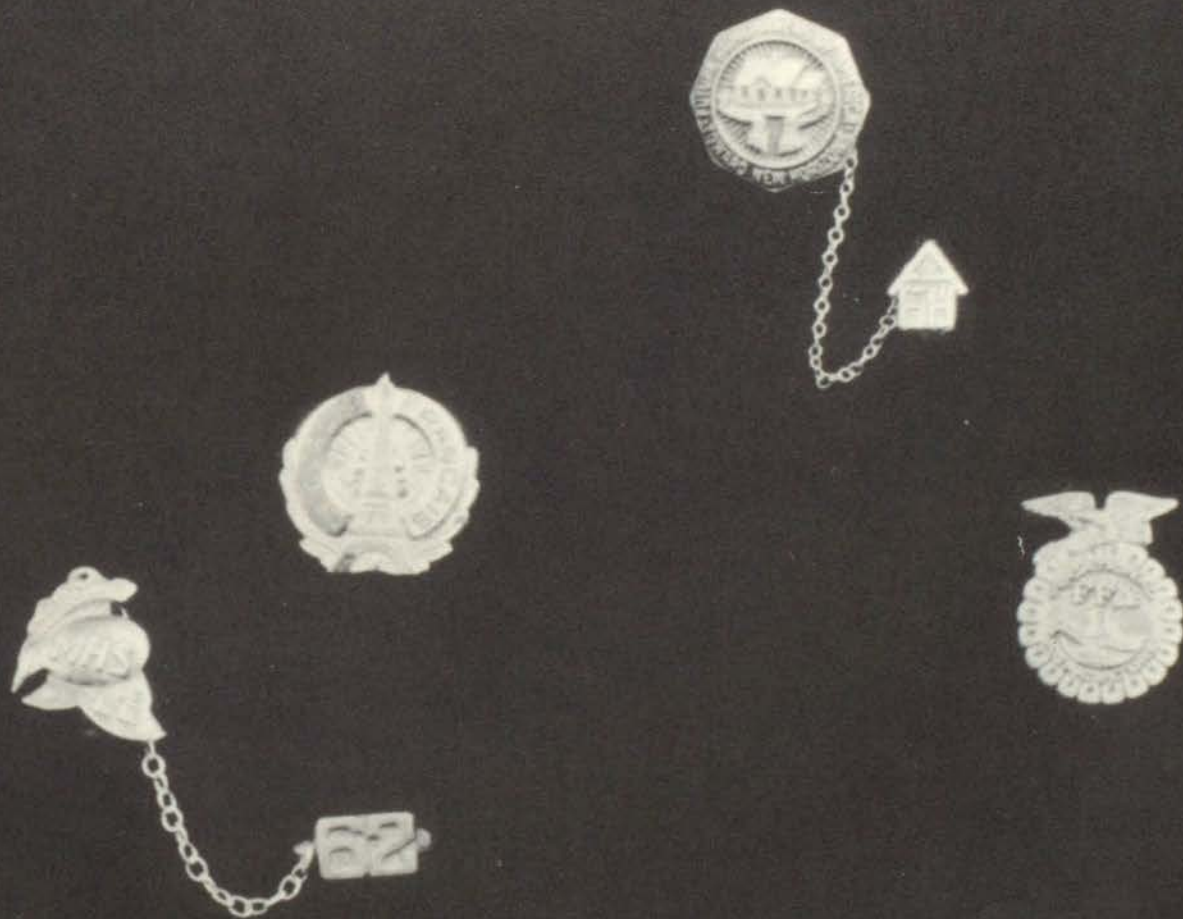

GAA and Varsity Club Show Student Interest in Athletics

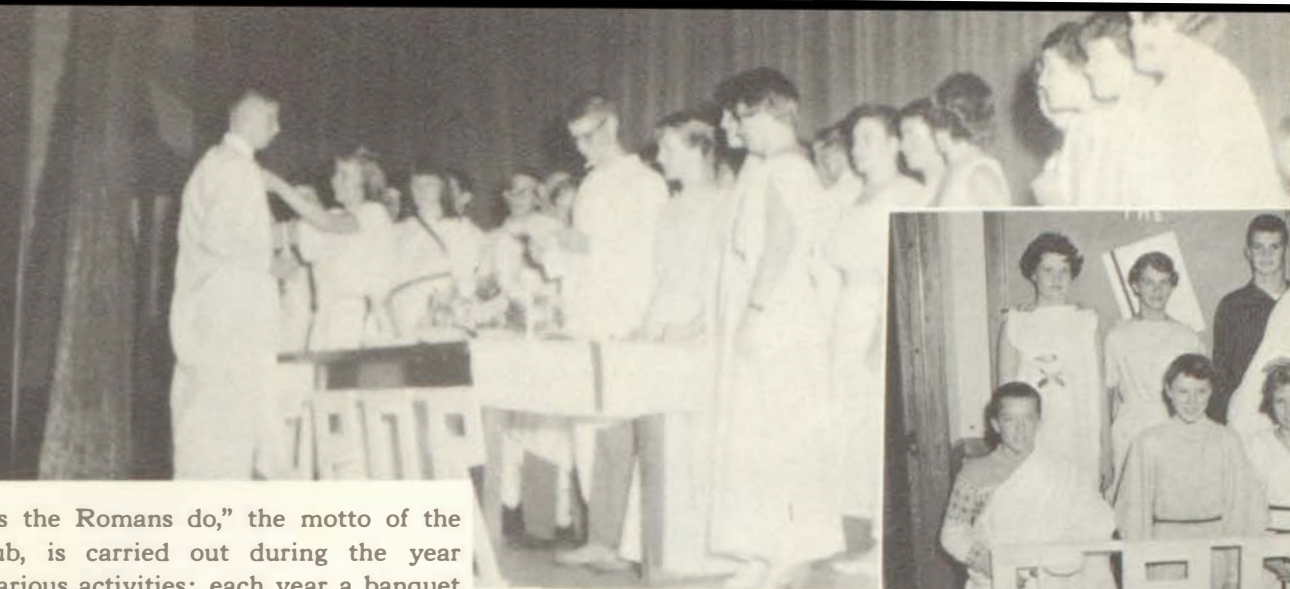
