



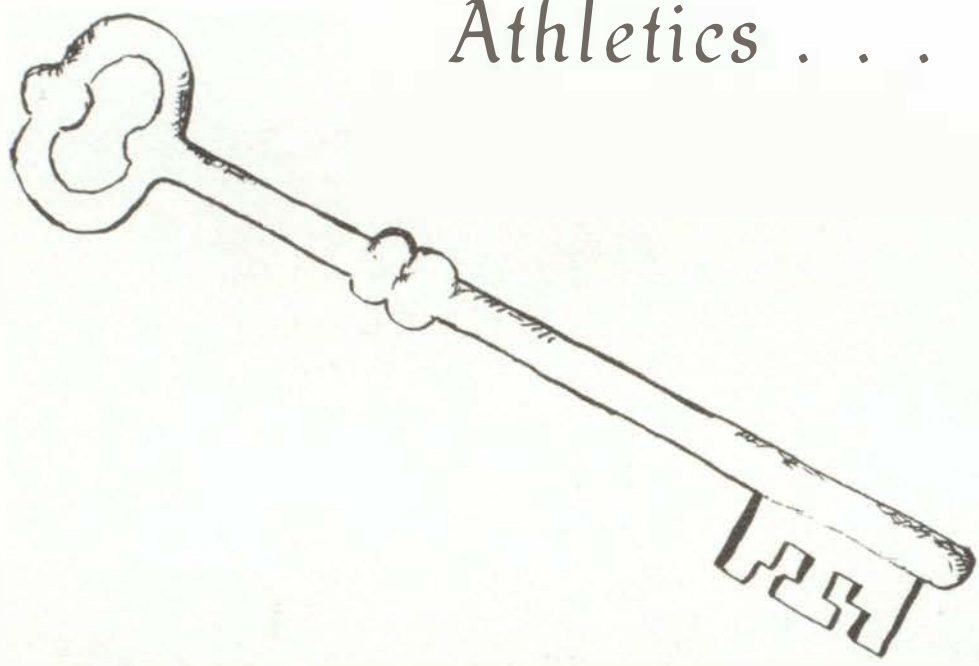

Mrs. Storr Selected For  
Special Honor in '62 Yearbook

*Remembering those services rendered to the students of Marshall High School and her many civic accomplishments, the Class of 1962 sincerely hopes the many students yet to enter the classroom of Mrs. Jennet L. Storr will also come under the influence of her devotion to teach, guide, and inspire.*

"Mrs. Storr, we shall remember you. . . .

. . . for your service in our school system as an English teacher . . . working with the guidance department in sessions with those students taking part in the Superior and Talented Student Project . . . participation as a sophomore sponsor. . . .

"Others will remember your contributions as a member of the Marshall school board for eleven years: trustee, three years; secretary, five years; and president for three years. Your services were also rendered in the National and Michigan Education associations, Rotary-Ann committees, Civic Theatre, Community Chest, PTA, Monday Club, Marshall Teachers' Association, and membership in the Republican Party serving as a county delegate and at present as a worker in your ward.

"*Historic Marshall*, a booklet published by Win Schuler's of Marshall, is a product of your

lecturing to local groups on Marshall's history and your membership in the Marshall Historical Society.

"As for yourself, you must also hold fond memories — such as your grade-school years in Olivet and Lansing, graduation from Olivet College, and three years of teaching in Fowlerville High School. Marriage to Lewis F. Storr, also an Olivet College graduate, and his election as mayor for five years while serving on the Marshall City Commission, began your life in Marshall. Presently, you are the owner of a 200-acre farm in Marshall Township and a home on North High Street.

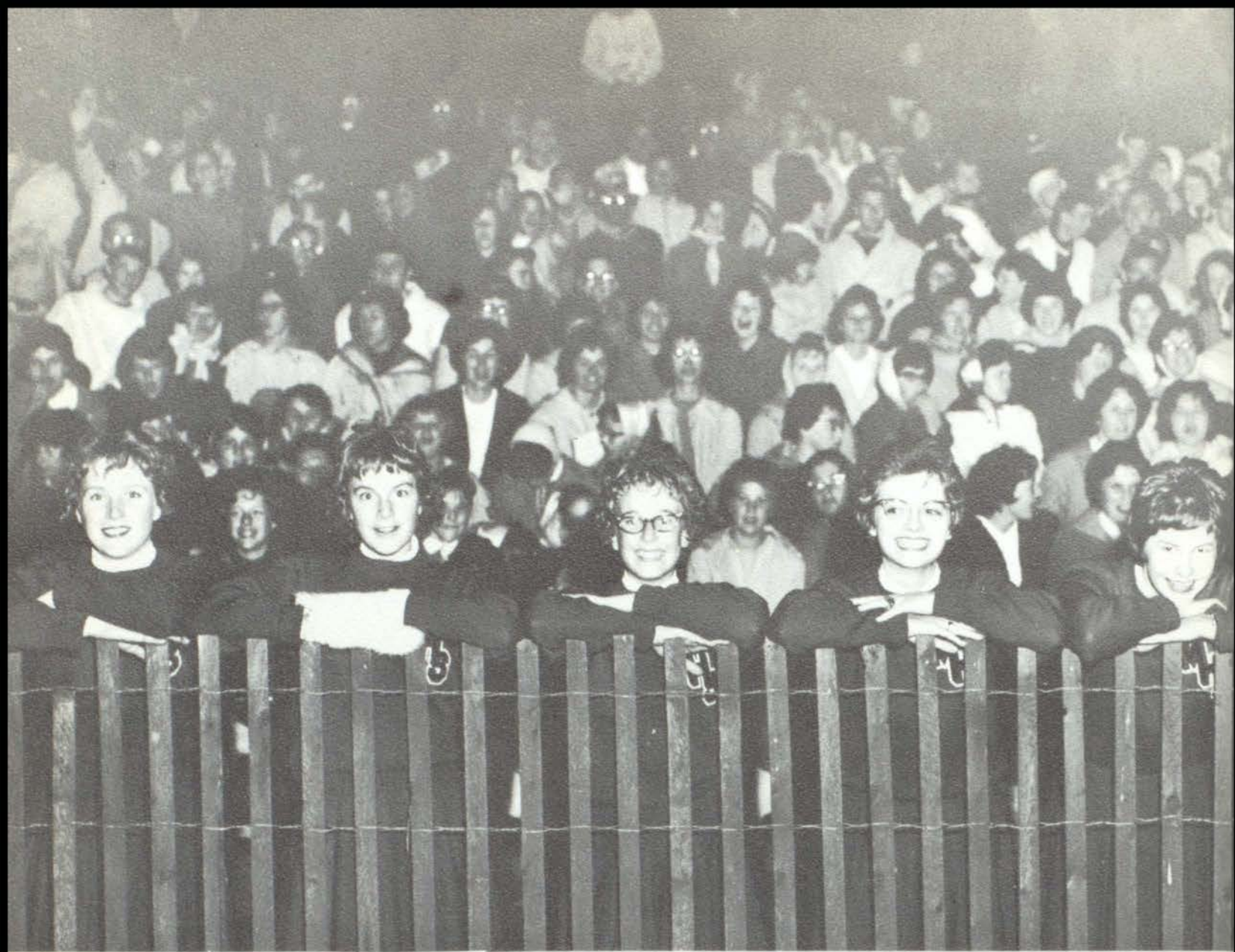
# Hi Ho, Hi Ho, It's Home from School We Go!

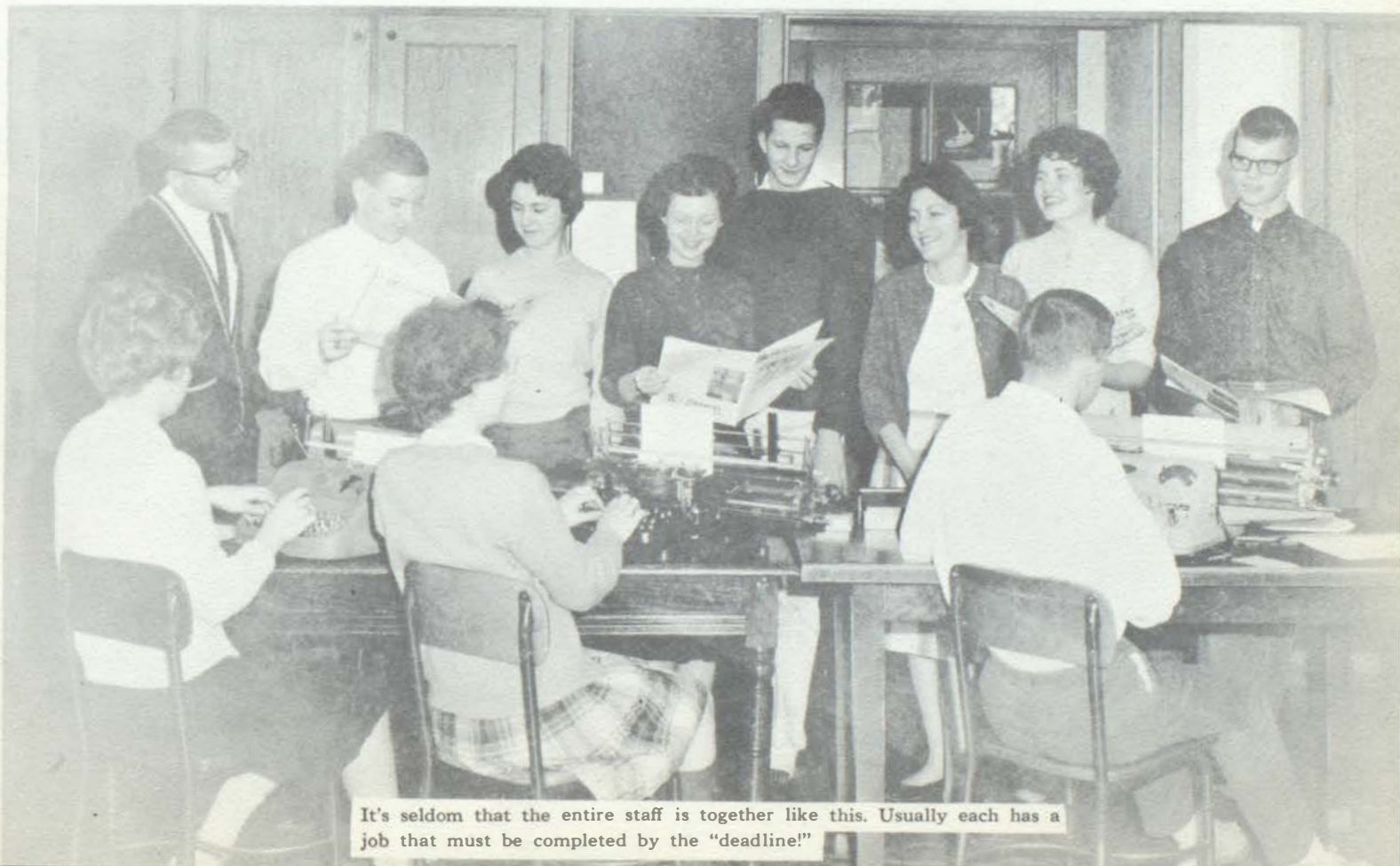

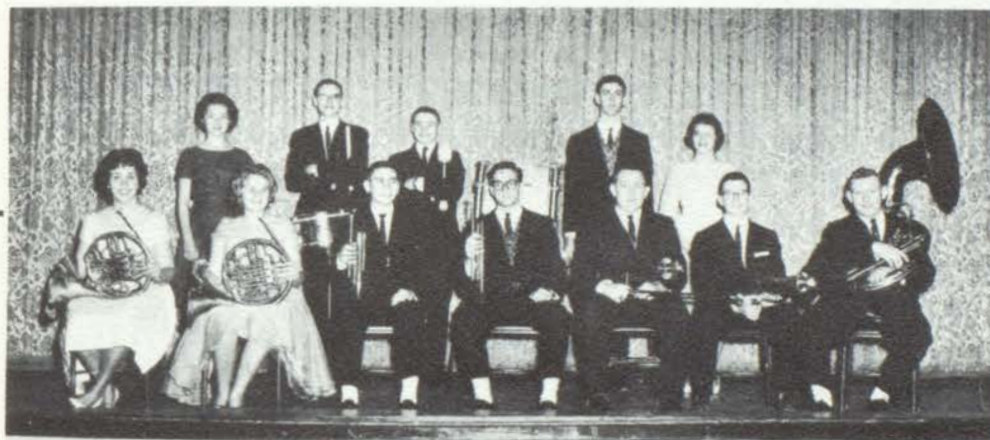

# Scholarship, Leadership, Character, and Service Lead to Membership in Honor Society



Among the brightest laurels one can gain in high school is selection to the Marshall Chapter of National Honor Society. Members are taken from the junior and senior classes. Selection by the teachers being based on scholarship first, only juniors with a  $B+$  average and seniors with a  $B$  average are eligible. Grade averages are based on marks received in five areas: English, social studies, language, science, and mathematics.

Leadership, service, and character also are of great importance in determining members. Never may more than 15% of any graduating class receive this distinction, allowing a possible 5% as juniors and 10% as seniors. Members are initiated at an annual induction ceremony assembly held each spring, with the year's organizational proceedings directed by Miss Merritt.

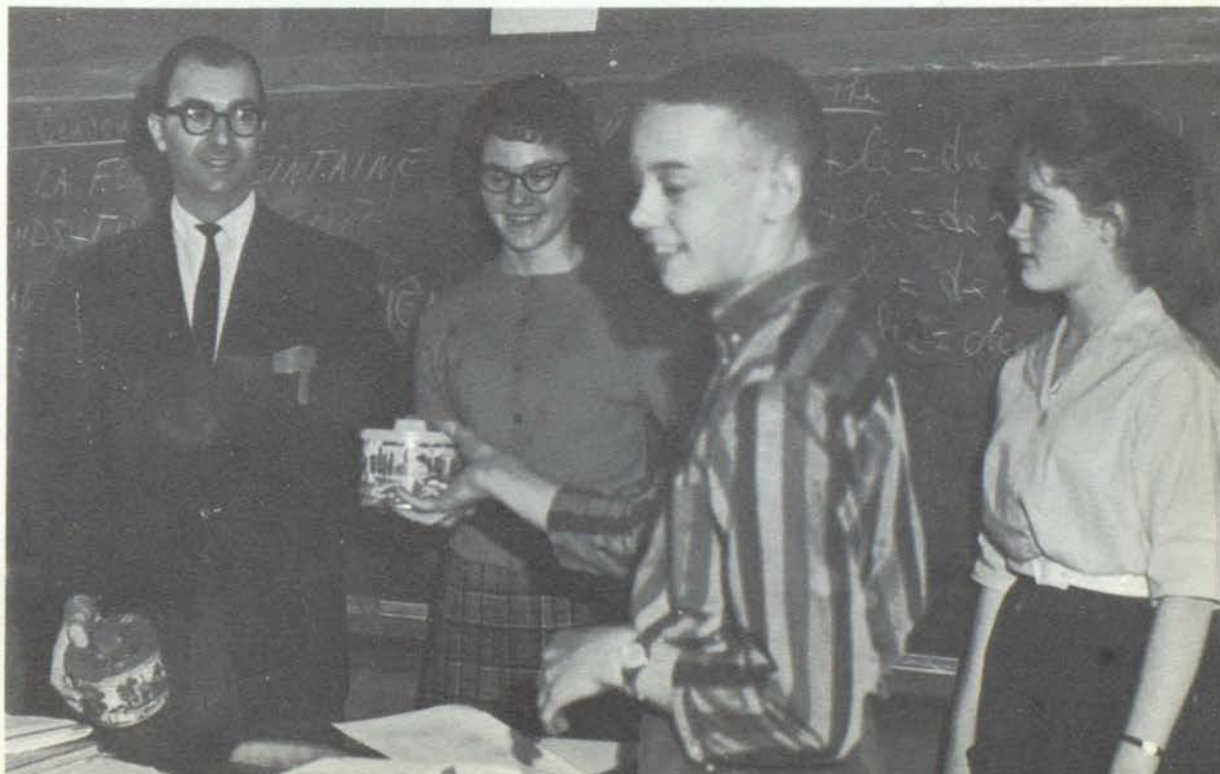

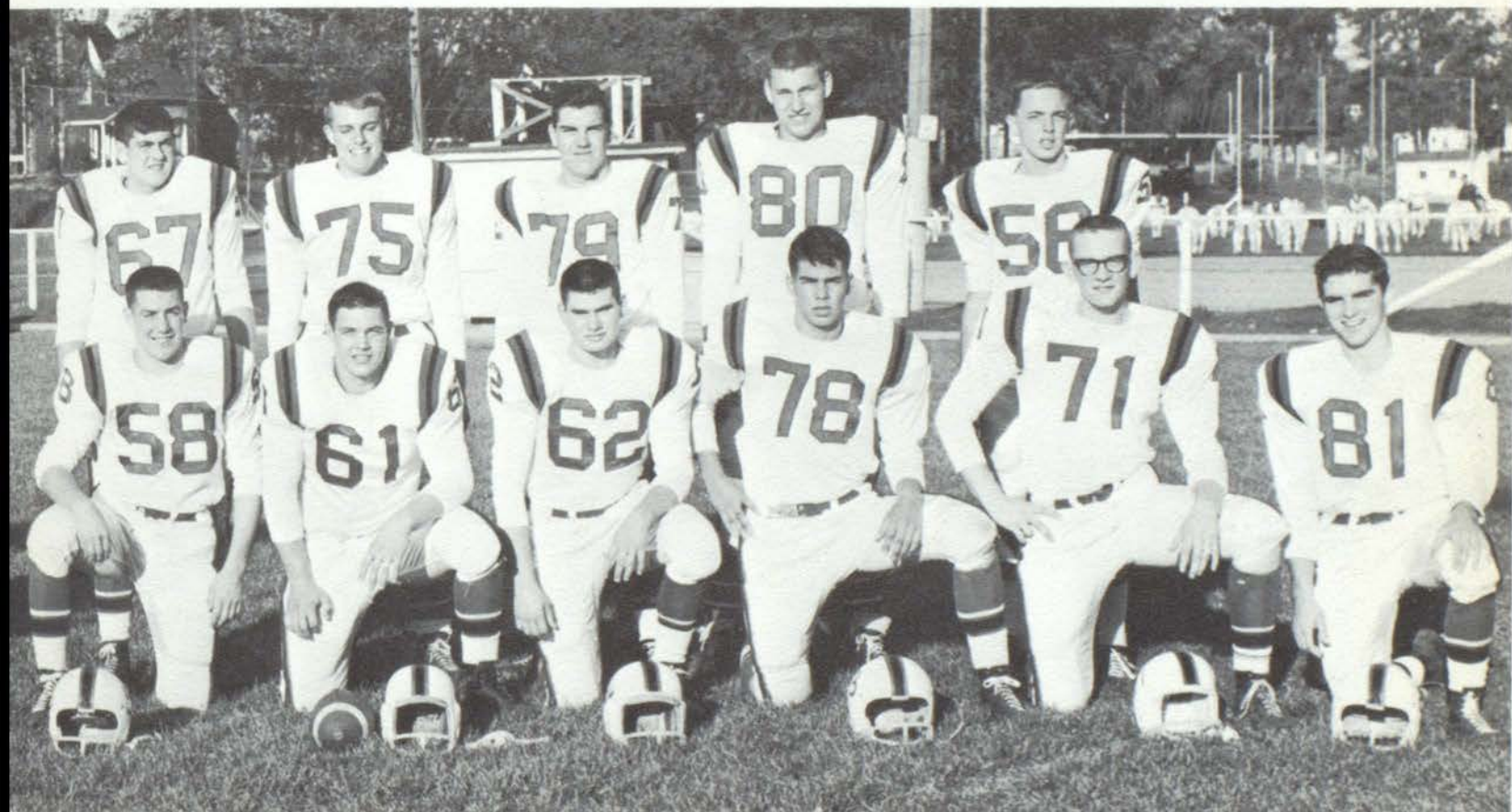

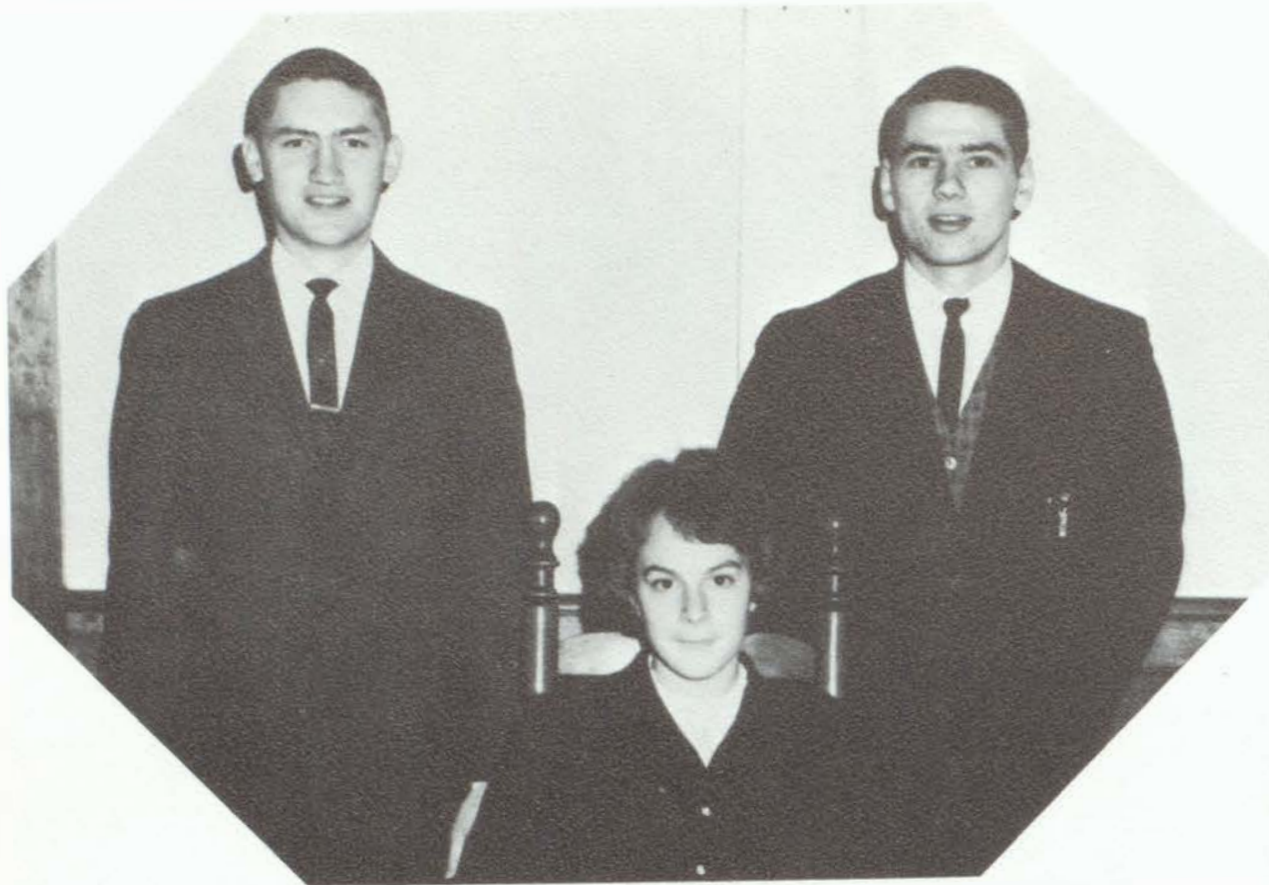


## *Juniors Experience Varied Activities*
