




"Others will remember your contributions as a member of the Marshall school board for eleven years: trustee, three years; secretary, five years; and president for three years. Your services were also rendered in the National and Michigan Education associations, Rotary-Ann committees, Civic Theatre, Community Chest, PTA, Monday Club, Marshall Teachers' Association, and membership in the Republican Party serving as a county delegate and at present as a worker in your ward.

"Historic Marshall, a booklet published by Win Schuler's of Marshall, is a product of your lecturing to local groups on Marshall's history and your membership in the Marshall Historical Society.

"As for yourself, you must also hold fond memories — such as your grade-school years in Olivet and Lansing, graduation from Olivet College, and three years of teaching in Fowlerville High School. Marriage to Lewis F. Storr, also an Olivet College graduate, and his election as mayor for five years while serving on the Marshall City Commission, began your life in Marshall. Presently, you are the owner of a 200acre farm in Marshall Township and a home on North High Street.


#### Hi Ho, Hi Ho, It's Home from School We Go!


### Seniors . .







Climaxing our year were our graduation activities, including baccalaureate, senior party, class picnic, and ultimately, graduation. . .








#### Library Club Sees Active Service



Three Rivers was the season's first victory for the Redskins. In the Coldwater game the fighting Redskins finished with a 6-6 tie.






# Cagers Open, Close In New Physical Education Building




