
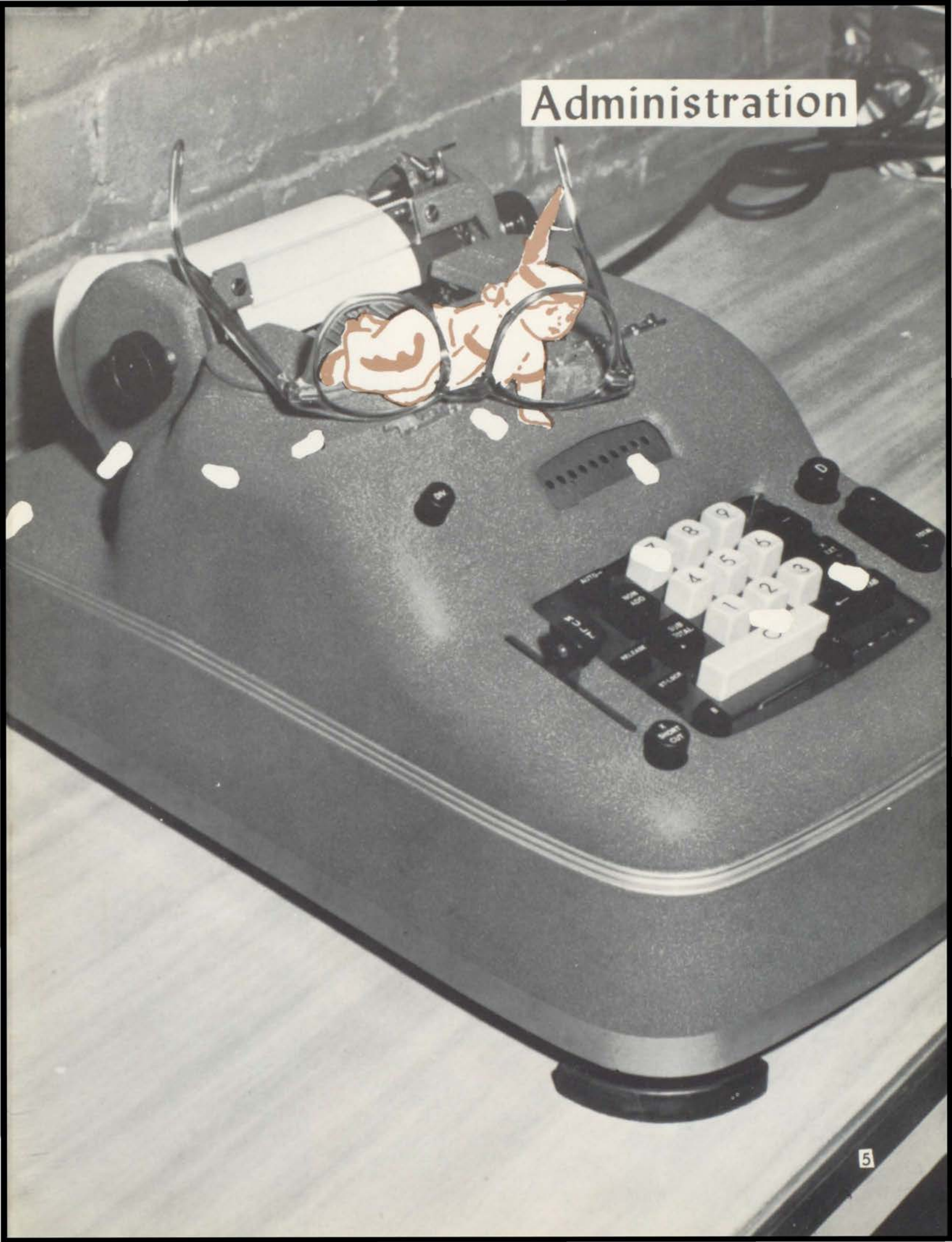


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Administration

The problems they face and the duties they perform are indicative of the high caliber people they are.

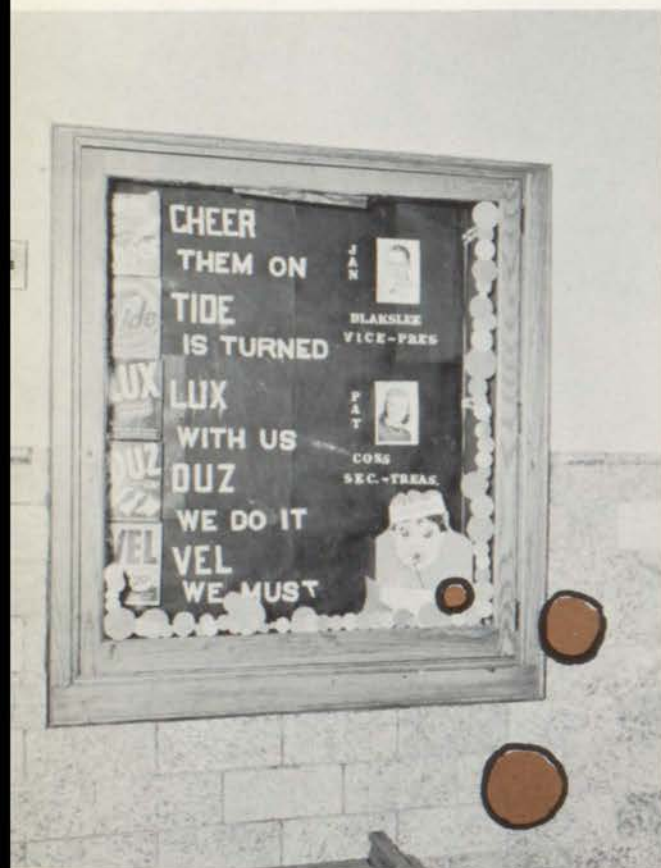

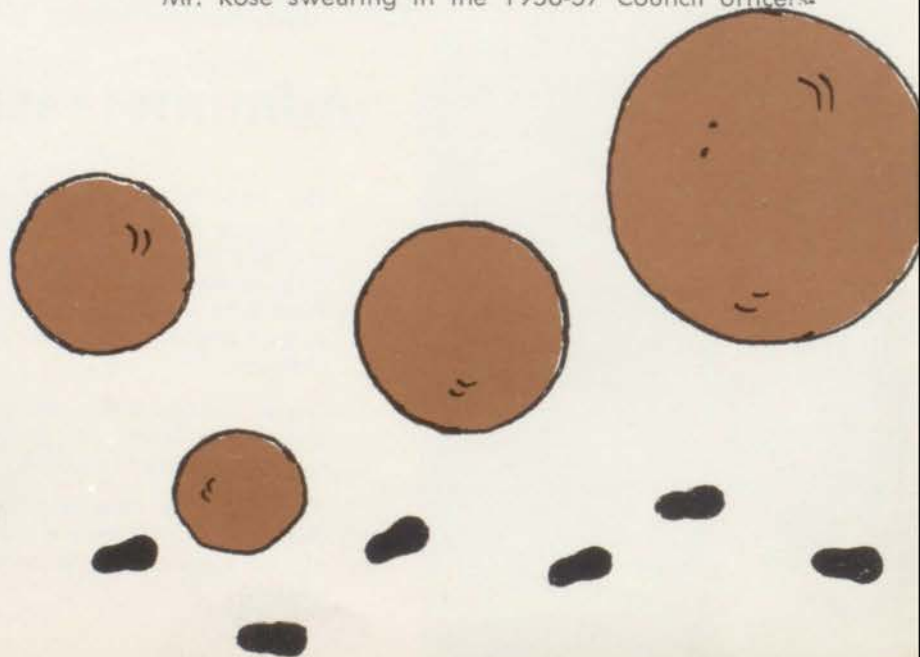

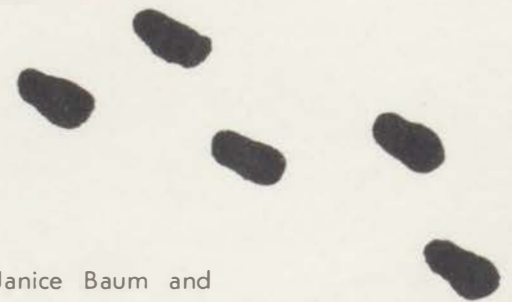
In Journalism We Learn By Doing

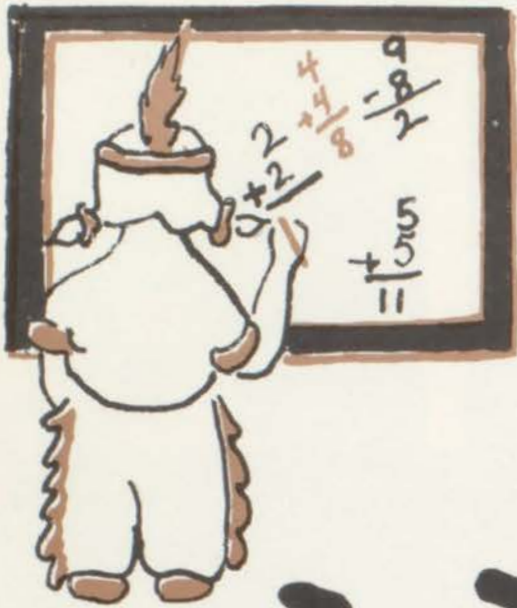

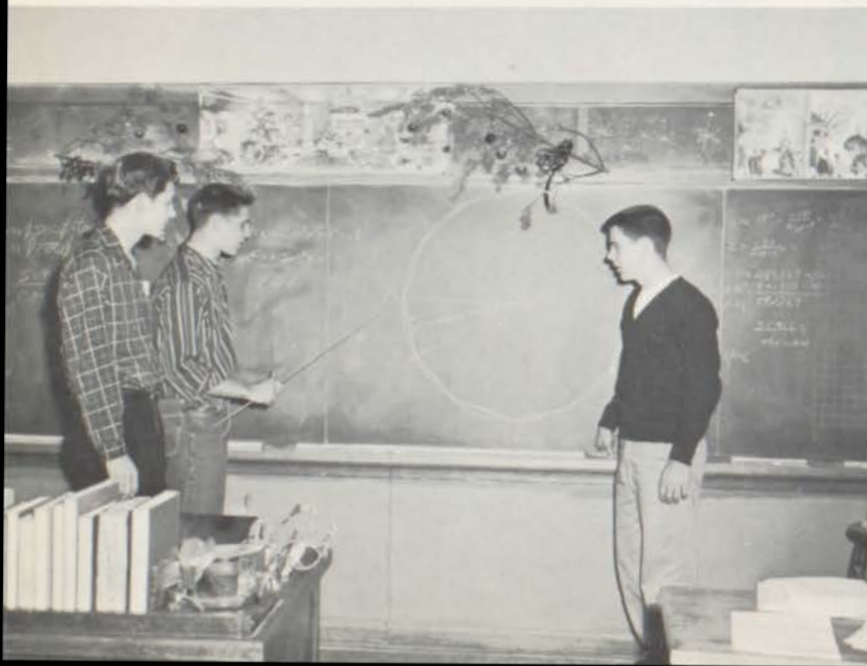

Physics is studied to provide the student with the necessary background for advanced study in the field of science and engineering. It is also studied by those who don't plan to go to college.

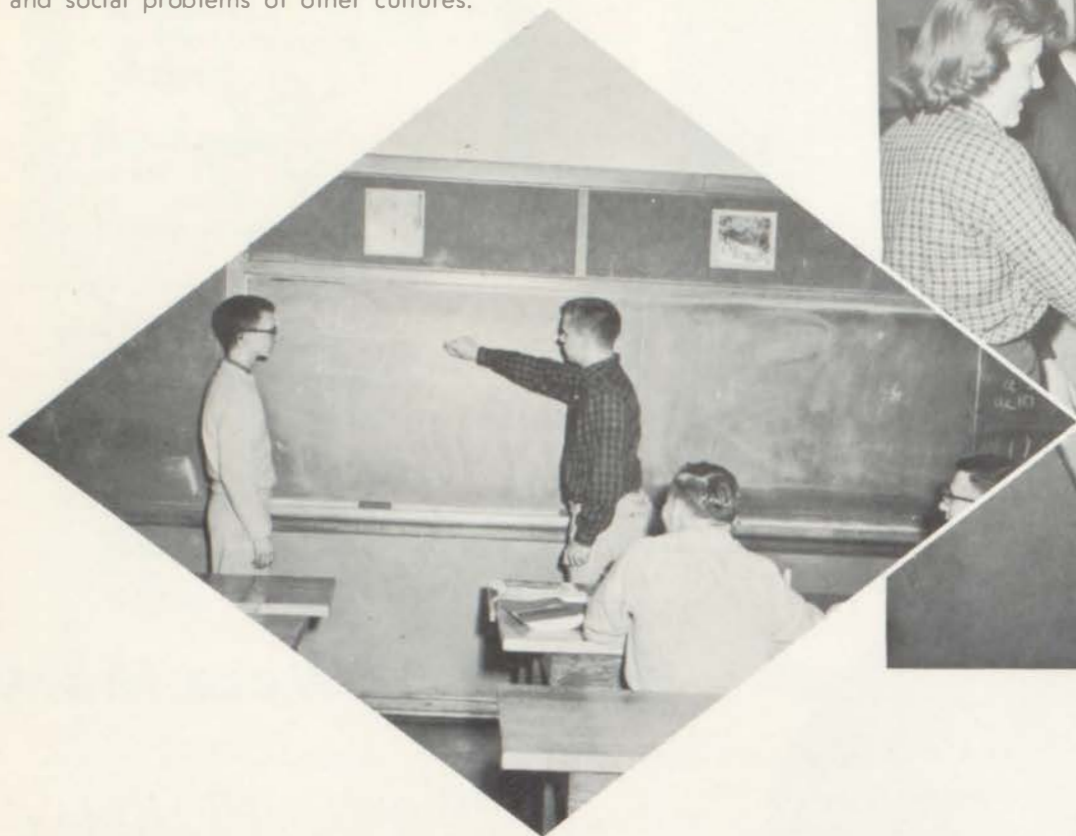

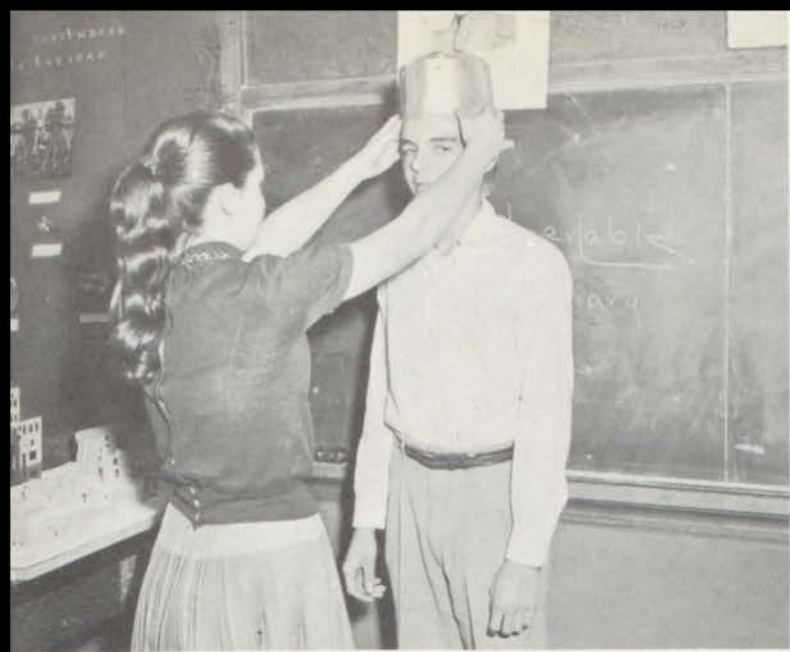

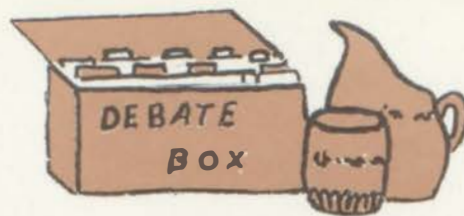


Latin provides a student with the foundation for many phases of study. The important result is a taste of genuine study which carries over into college life.

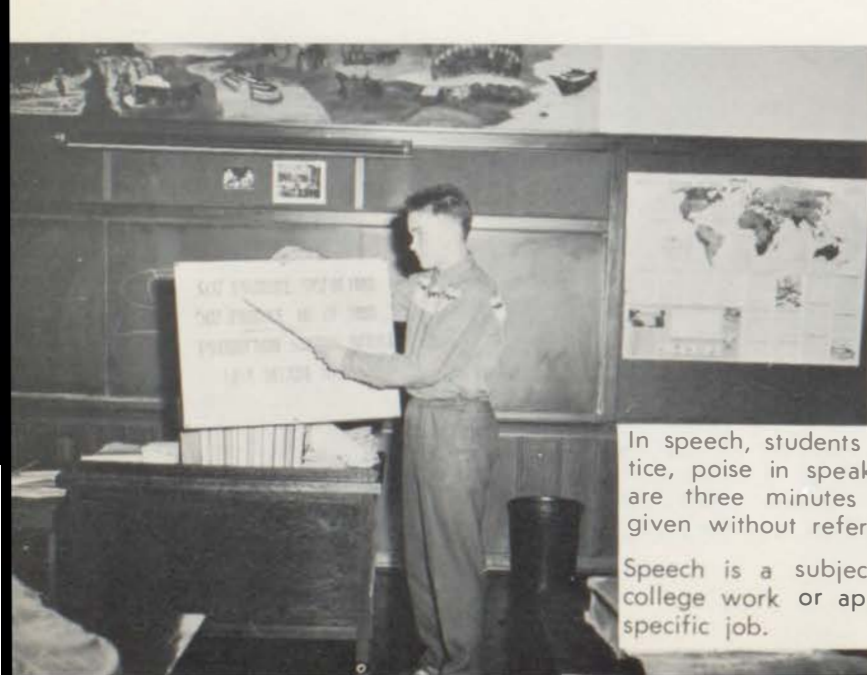

In speech, students learn, through practice, poise in speaking. Most speeches are three minutes in length and are given without reference to notes.

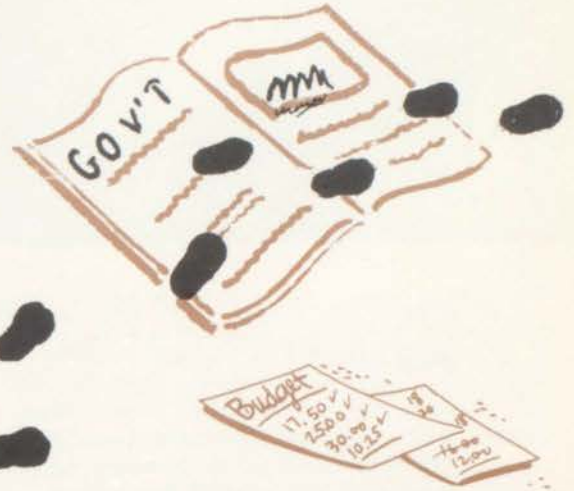

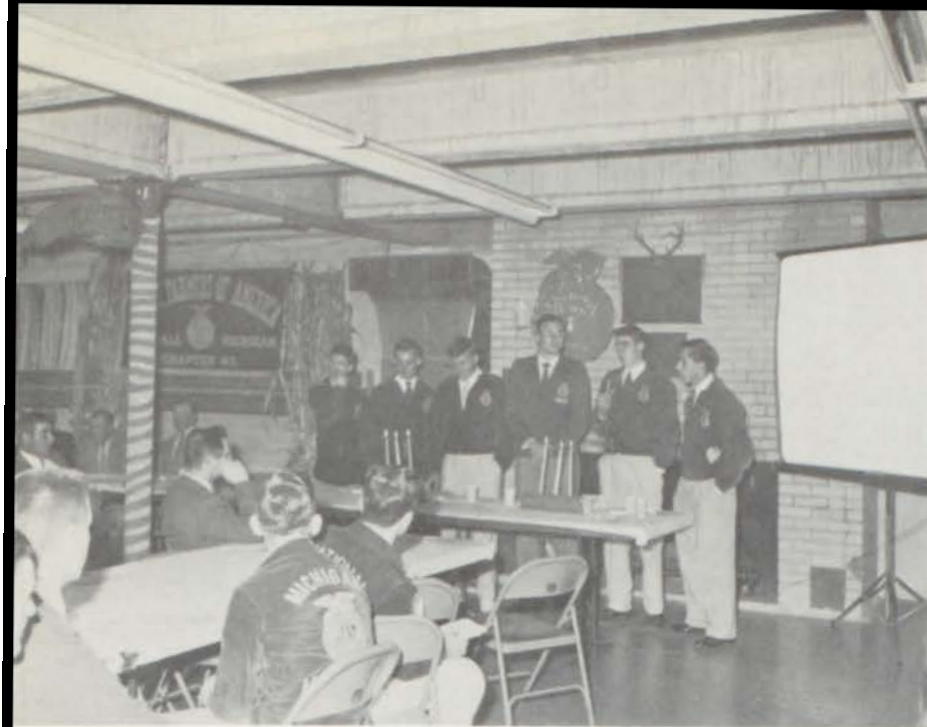
The National Honor Society was installed for the first time in Marshall High last year. Students have to have a B average to qualify.

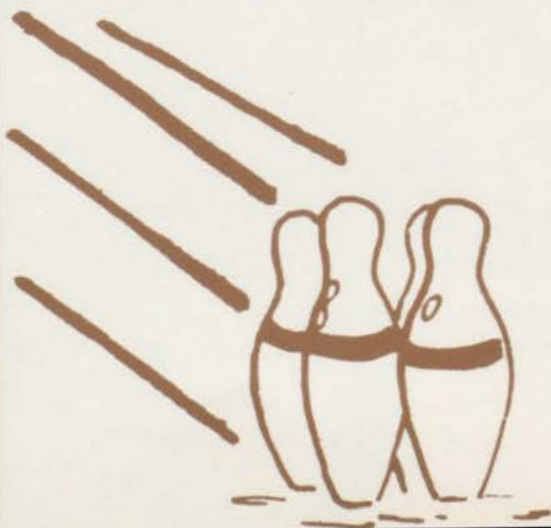
