## Administration

Marshall acquires new superintendent

Mr. Gordon Van Wieren assumed the responsibilities of superintendent of the Marshall Public Schools July 1, 1969. Also Mr. Ray Davis replaced Mr. Ross VanNess as high school assistant principal.

A bond issue was passed in the fall for construction of a new high school. Planning began immediately in order to open the new structure in the fall of 1971. The school board also saw citizens approving an operating millage vote by a $2-1 / 2$ to 1 margin in the spring.

December $9-10$ the North Central Visitation Committee evaluated MHS. Twenty faculty members and administrators from different schools visited their assigned areas and met with the faculty and administration to report on the school. They felt that the school was overcrowded, but the curriculum over-all was good.


The 196970 school board included Mrs. George Kibbie. Mrs. T. W. Hall, Mr. Carleton Cameron, Dr. Phillip Glotfelty. Mr. Richard Berge, Mr. David Foster, and Mr. Robert Oren.

## Vocational

## Woodshop acquires tool panel, library

The Industrial Arts shops have embarked on a program of tool storage and handling developed by Mr. Richard Murphy, former metals, now woodshop instructor. Mr. Murphy has combined his knowledge of pattern making with his experience in foundry work to initiate a tool cabinet, making tools easily recognizable at a glance.

The tool panel consists of a multitude of metal tool holders which are outlines of the tool that is to be placed on them. The panel itself stands about eight feet high and is mobile. Students also constructed a portable library which is used as a reference and research area for woodshop students. Books including woodworking and lathing inform pupils on the primary points of such skills.

Under the direction of Mr. Stanley Carlyon the Building and Trades classes worked from September to July on the construction of a package-purchase Permabilt home. Excavation, pouring of the basement, plastering and heating involved the student crew. The architectural drawing class had a part in the planning stages and revisions. Plumbing and electricity was installed and completed by the students under professional direction. With the completion of the house, the Agricultural Dept. landscaped the entire grounds.

Witnessing wheels of justice in motion, Mr. Phil Wuori, head of the Social Studies Dept., enabled his students to observe an actual courtroom case. The department took advantage of the video-tape machine for panel discussions, and broadened the interests of senior classes by monthly visitations from area law firms.

Several American history classes, supervised by Mr. Paul Levy, attempted to place themselves into social problems of the country. By portraying "Sunshine City" the juniors experienced typical community interaction and developed a keen insight towards the racial situation, thus making the purpose of the "game" worthwhile.

## Science

## Drugs subjected to science research

General Science students conducted specialized research on drugs, alcohol, and tobacco-what they are, what they do, and their lasting physical and mental effects on the human body. Films from the American Cancer Society, for example, revealed effects such as the deterioration of the brain, digestive system, and other vital organs from drug abuse.

Mr. Aaron Davis along with Mrs. Susan Steele, supervised the program, bringing in guest speakers from Battle Creek Alcoholics Anonymous and The Kalamazoo Alcohol Information Center. The project served to acquaint the students with all forms of drugs and tneir potential dangers.

## Physical Education, Art <br> Faculty gains four teachers

The Physical Education Department adopted more advanced sports in its curriculum. Field hockey and badmitton complemented the second year students' activities. Joining the P.E. staff, Mr. Gary Gilbert acted as wrestling coach and Mr. Tom Reynolds taught junior high P.E.

Students spent an entire eight-week period solely on parallel bars and other apparatus in coordination with tumbling, toning and developing muscles. The department received a new set of rubber mats to supplement its tumbling equipment.

The administration placed two new teachers in the Art Department, Mrs. Ann Machek and Miss Carol Maus. Students developed creative arts plus advanced their already natural talent, sketching from live student models. One long-range project-molding a plaster sculpture of a human head-required two months of concentration. Ironically enough, almost every sculpture turned out to bear some resemblence to its creator.

Mrs. John Marsh appointed Bob Oren as editor. She also selected the other staff members and directed them according to the National Scholastic Press Guidebook and other journalistic standards. Oren attended a summer seminar in Minneapolis and learned many new techniques to instruct his staff.

In two identical classes of Junior Journalism the students mastered the art of fundamental journalistic writing. This included feature, sports, and news writing, all of which was printed in the Warpath Beat.

Second semester the classes split into two different areas-newspaper and yearbook. The newspaper students practiced editorial writing, layout, and business management. Yearbook students began the planning of the 1971 Dial.

The major concern of the Publication Dept. was the printing of MHS's departmental courses of study for North Central Evaluation. The staff of five printed all programs for concerts, plays, and athletic activities, as well as tickets. New equipment-a platemaker-allowed production to be hastened by printing materials from the department's own plates.

The novice team captured third place in state while the junior varsity took first place in the Twin Valley league. Among 30 students competing in forensics tournaments, Kevin Dooley and Mike Stulberg captured regional and district honors. The team hosted a league tournament Mar. 21.
