

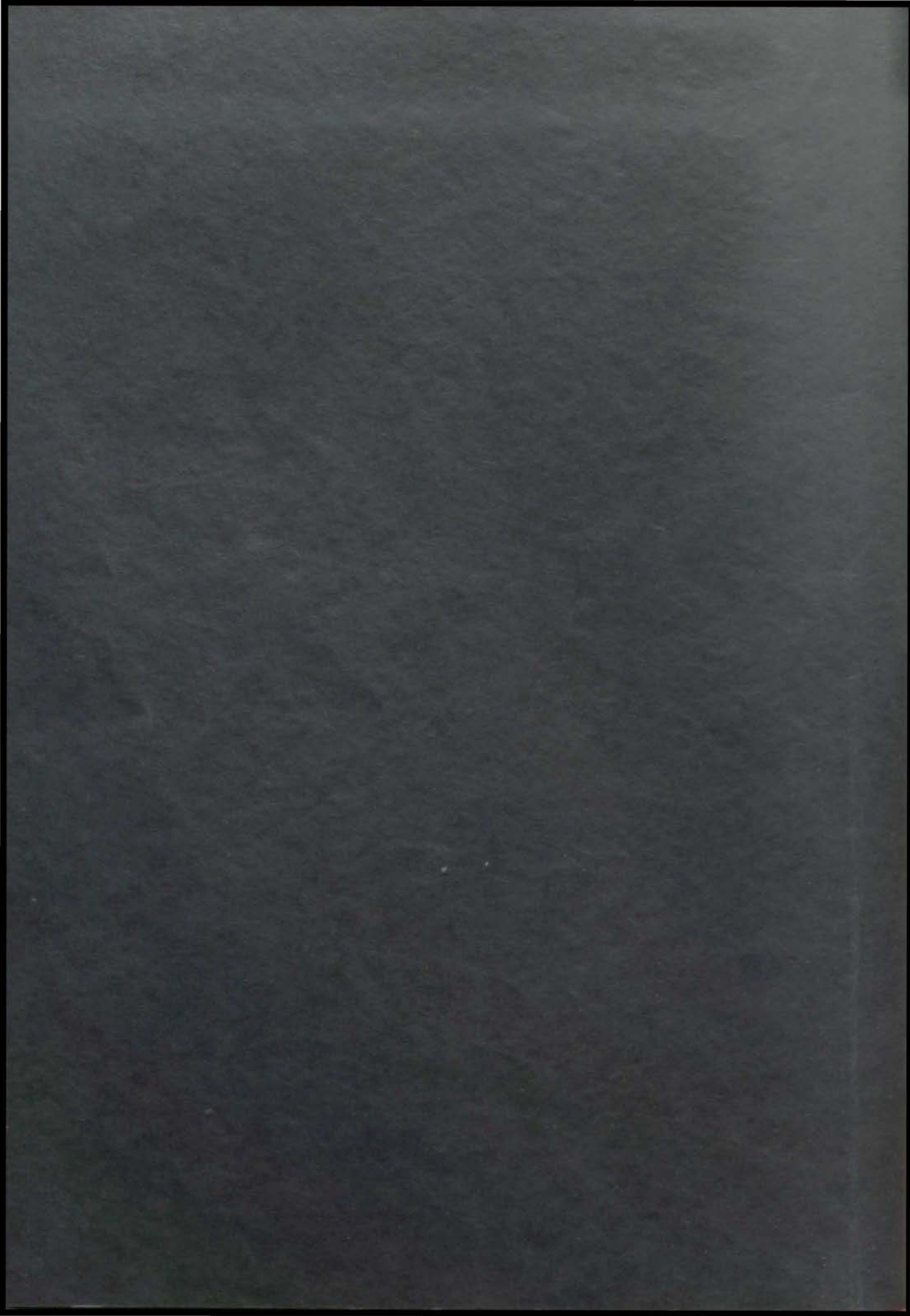

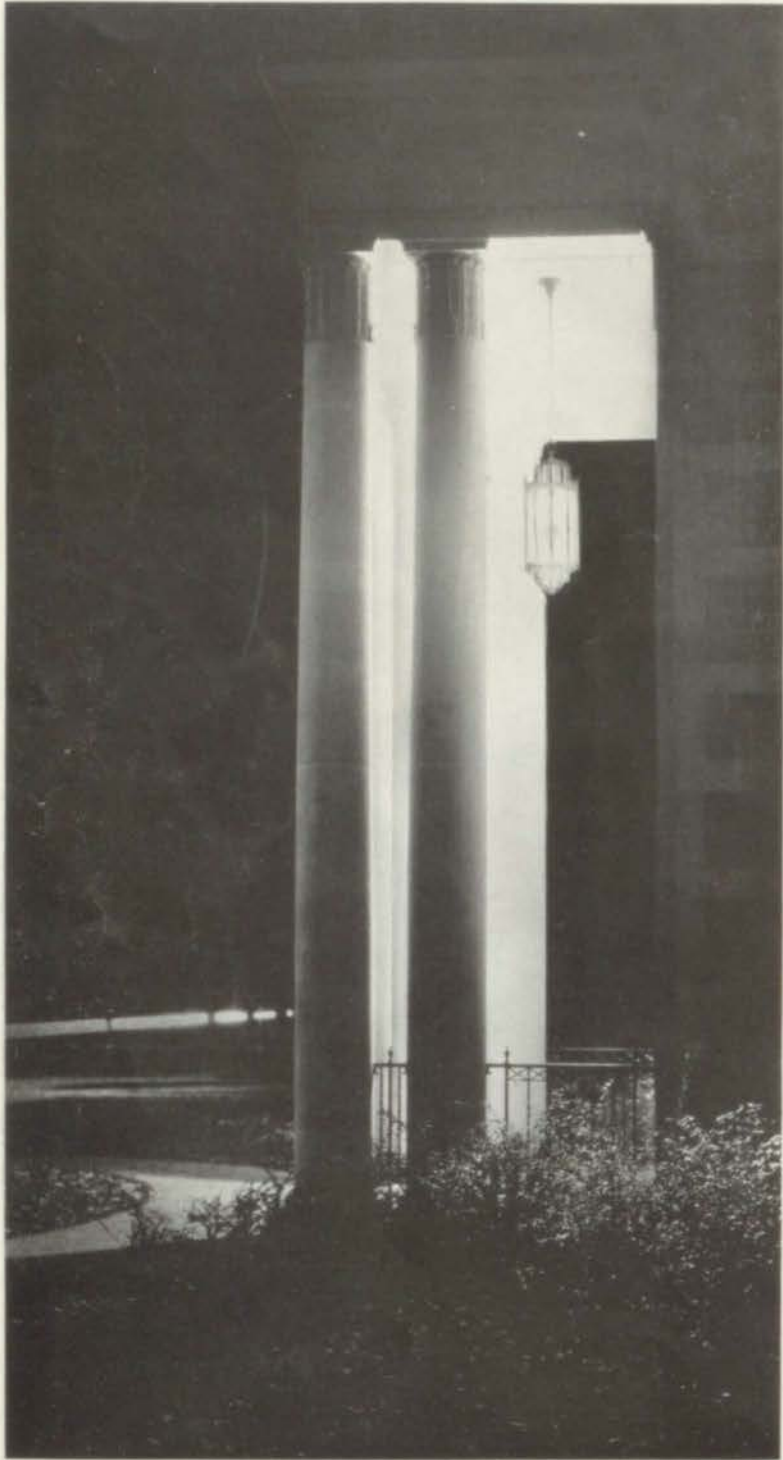

The Hall of Fame, an annual feature of each yearbook, since that of the year 1931, has as its candidates, those students who, by virtue of high scholarship, all-around participation and distinction in extra-curricular activities including athletics, and fine school citizenship, are deemed worthy to be placed by a secret faculty committee, in a position of honor.

HALL OF FAME

We nominate to the Hall of Fame of the Dial for 1934 the following:

Glenna Barningham, for her participation, enthusiasm and industry in class affairs, distinction in literary matters, including editorship of the Dial for 1934. She has proved to be faithful, cooperative, helpful, one who "got things done." Her activities included the class plays, Operetta, Usher Club, Commercial Club, Glee Club. She served as a class officer her first year.

George Bachman is nominated for his participation in commercial work, Commercial Club and Science Club. A good speaker, he won his letter in debate and served variously as the able chairman of student assemblies, debates and speech contests. In dramatics he took part in the class plays his junior year and in plays for student assemblies his senior year. He also served as business manager of the Dial. While his work in the principal's office took a great deal of his working hours, he still was among the upper ten in the class in scholarship.

Barbara Bentley, the class valedictorian, served as president of Commercial Club, and as a class officer for the Senior year. She played the leading female role in the Senior Play and appeared in the program of plays given by the class in its Junior year. She was Student Council representative and a member of the Usher Club.

Fred Reyer's Senior year was his big year. By virtue of his standing, in the U. S. Naval Academy exams, he was named by the late Congressman Jos. C. Hooper as the alternate from this district for appointment to that institution. He has participated in debate, Science Club and took part in the plays of 1933. He also acted as stage manager. He won a name for himself as a student of high scholarship, intelligence and ability.

Ruth Schroeder was the most versatile of this group, in activities. In speech, she won the oratorical contest and participated in every one of this year's decision debates. She served variously as Head Usher, Commercial Club officer, Dial Associate Editor, Student Council representative, participated in Intramural Sports, was a member of Library Club, G. A. A., and Dancing Club. In all of these she was more than a member and may be characterized as one who accomplished many things well. She was third highest in scholarship in the class.

Robert Mumaw, class president, played center on the football squad during his Junior and Senior year, played baseball and acted as student manager in basketball for the 1933-34 season. He played the title role in "Minick" and the "hero" in the group of plays presented in 1933. He, like the rest of this group, was also a moving spirit behind the 1934 commencement program. His other activities, in which he served with distinction, include, Student Council and Intramural Sports. He represented the school in the Y. M. C. A.-Older Boys' Conference at Kalamazoo in 1933.

Roger Welch, salutatory, played both guard and end in first-team football, guard in "varsity" basketball during his Junior and Senior years. In his "Frosh" and "Soph" days he was class president. His Senior year he was president of the Science Club. He also participated in the Junior Plays.

SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

Much ado about nothing—in the fall of 1930, ninety-six very self-confident, conceited, and sophisticated (?) freshmen crossed the threshold of the new high school (yes, we were the first freshman class in the new building) and with supercilious glances viewed Marshall's knowledge factory. Being so young, however, we were awed by this spectacular sight and were soon subdued. After a short time we were herded together for the purpose of electing leaders to guide us through the harrowing experiences of the forthcoming year. Rod Welch was elected president with Glenna Barningham and D. Stout his help-mates. Miss Kiefer and Mr. Wilcox were our "worriers" for that year. The year proved to be uneventful and we concluded it with a picnic at Pine Lane.

The next year we returned as Sophomores, sadder but wiser. Roger was again elected president with Phyllis Marquardt vice-president and Wendy Miller chief scribe. The big event of our second year was the dance given by us in the Girls' Gym. The gym was gaily decorated for the occasion and several dollars were added to the coffers as a result. That year was ended when we packed sandwiches and olives and went to Duck Lake for a picnic.

Our Junior year was started when we elected Wendell Miller president. Peg Robinson was chosen vice-president and Margaret Carpenter assumed office as holder of the purse strings. Mrs. Parry and Mr. Horton were elected sponsors. Then began the great campaign to raise finances so the high and mighty (?) Seniors might be "entertained." The class was divided into four groups for this purpose. A chicken pie supper was held April 27 and netted over forty dollars. Candy sales, plays, and dances were held throughout the year to fatten our pocketbook. On May 6 the "repression" caused the Juniors to give two one-act plays and vaudeville. "A Weakness For Nurses" and "Call It A Day" were the titles of our dramas. On May 26 we ushered the Seniors on board a modernistic Noah's Ark done in black and silver. This was the annual Junior-Senior Reception. Movies, games, and dancing provided the entertainment. June 9 we drove to Jackson and held a picnic at Pleasant Lake.

In 1933 we returned for the last time and settled down to earn a few credits and gain a little knowledge before trying to graduate. Officers elected to pilot us through our final year were Robert Mumaw, president; Barbara Bentley, vice-president; and George H. (Hiram Emanuel) Bachman, secretary-treasurer. Mrs. Parry and Mr. Horton continued as sponsors.

Then we got ambitious and on November 27 put on a play "They Clean the Attic" for assembly. Peg and Kenny were "man and wife." For further information on the "joys" of playing colored parts see Ruth Schroeder. The Seniors gave the last dance before Christmas vacation and then adjourned for a two weeks' sleep.

Um—m—m. That's Barbara and Kenny practicing kisses for the Senior play "Minick," which was presented March 7. Bob Mumaw played the title role and were those kisses ever realistic.

May 4 the Seniors got ready for the "Last Round-up," held at the Country Club. The club was decorated with blankets, buffalo skins, and other articles suggestive of the "lone prairie." Dancing, movies, and "tall stories" provided ample entertainment and "cowboy victuals" were served during the evening. This concluded our social activities until the Junior-Senior Reception.
