Thanks to Our Well Organized Science Department, We Leave Prepared for Occupation or College Study



Chemistry in our high school is mainly theoretical. It does not have a practical application to things around us as much as it offers a solid basis for future scientific study. Many Marshall students have found themselves adequately prepared in Chemistry when they encountered it on the college level.

Physics, too, is primarily for the purpose of preparing a student for college study in things scientific. It is taught in the senior year and by this time the student has a pretty good idea of his future academic plans and the serious student finds a real preparation in Physics class.



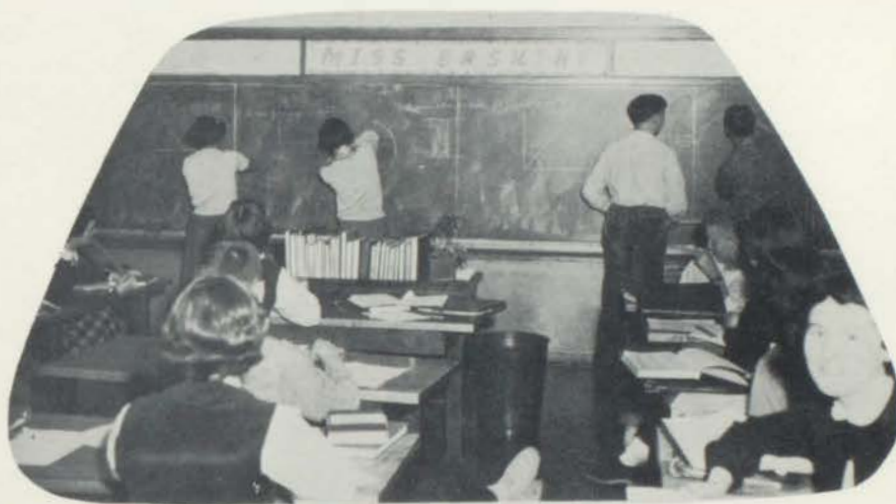
Biology is the study of the living things in our world. This life science includes a study of plants, animals, and man. It deals with the physical make-up of all living things. The principles which govern life, and the relation of living things to their surroundings and to each other.

In Solid Geometry the student learns how to visualize a third dimensional solid, to represent a three dimensional solid in a two dimensional space, to apply geometric truths to practical problems, to understand the practical problems of the architect, engineer, carpenter, and mechanic and to derive pleasure from intellectual inquiry.



Mathematics Links Applied Skills With Practical Knowledge

Geometry is a subject in which the student studies material devised in an ancient age and through its study gains a better practical knowledge of mathematical facts, a better knowledge of his own environment, improves his thinking habits, and has a good time while learning the subject.



Algebra is a mathematical tool that all should have. It is useful in many fields and essential in many others. It is a means of understanding the scientific world of today and the equipment necessary for one to take his place in today's modern world.

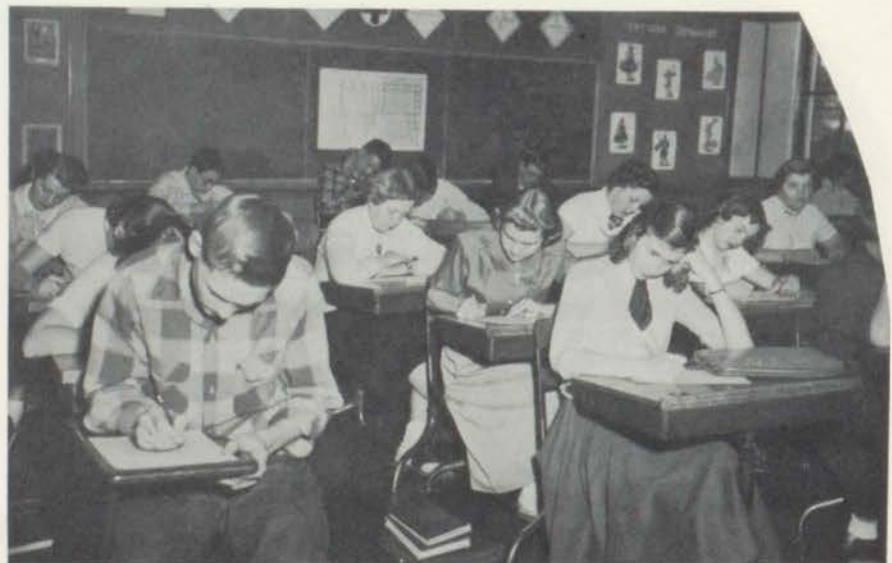


Spanish is a language of beauty. It also is one that students often have an occasion to use in later years since we live very close to Spanish-speaking people. Many of our English words come from the Spanish and a study of their grammar helps the student form a better mental picture of English grammar. The customs of the Mexican and Spanish people also make an interesting study.

Closely Coordinated Latin and Spanish Classes

Provide a Solid Foundation

Latin, often accused of being a dead language, is very alive to those who have taken and used the training derived from the course. Although students seldom go around talking in Latin, they develop a thorough and vivid knowledge of their own language from the standpoint of grammar and derivation of words. Those planning a college career, especially in medicine, pharmacy, or nursing, find it indispensable. Latin students learn a great deal also about the history and traditions of Ancient Rome.

Debate teaches a student to develop poise before an audience, to argue politely and convincingly, to evaluate facts, both oral and written, and to follow guidance, rendered so capably in our case by Mr. Cunningham.

Receive Full Attention in English Classes



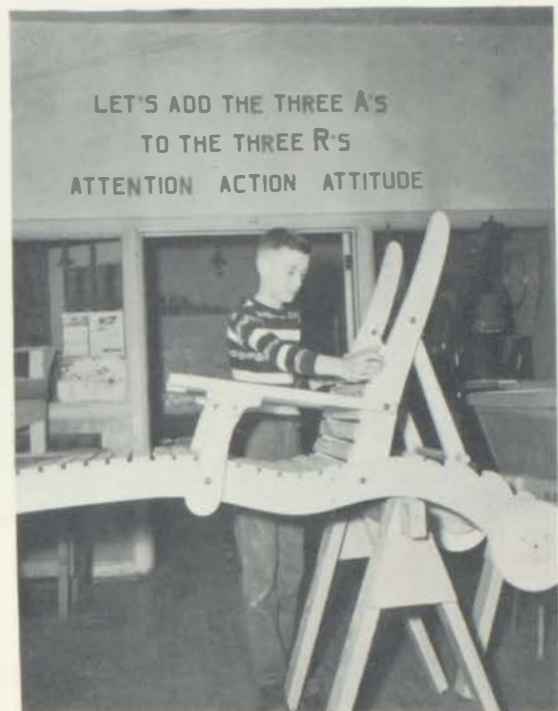

Homeliving Provides Practical Training For That Important Role Ahead



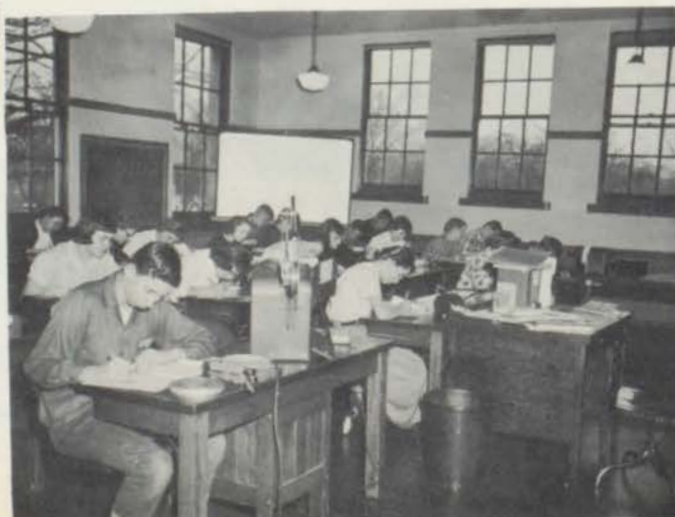

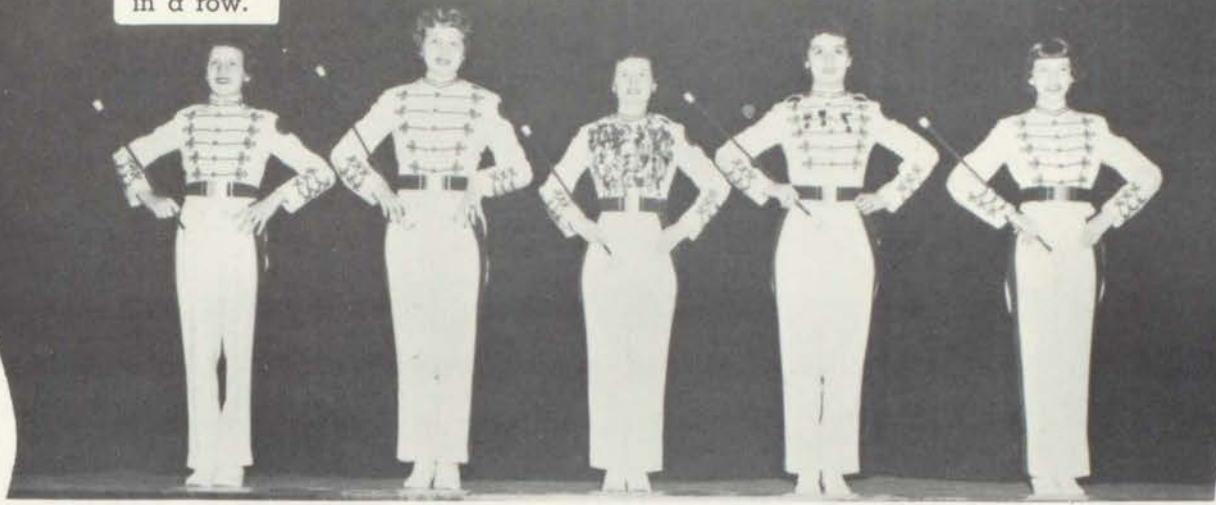
Our Band is Known Throughout the State as
