Betty Lou Drumm



Merle A. Getty




Sally Hale (Kimball)




William H. Hammond




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September, 1940, a memorable month and year in the annals of Marshall High School, for it was then that one hundred and forty-four green and quivering Freshmen entered its towering portals. We began breaking the masculine-domination tradition right away, by electing Marian Hale class President, Maynard Clark, Vice-President, and Audra Hatch, Secretary-Treasurer, We entered the Student Council race with all customary thunder and lightning. Made a direct hit, for Marv Shebel represented the "Class of '44" as Secretary-Treasurer. Then, for the girls, came that horrible and ghoulish ordeal, the G. A. A. Initiation. We stayed up all night learning the definition of the brain, only to find we didn't need it. That initiation wasn't nearly so terrifying as we had expected. We'll never forget the thrill of our first high school tormal (The G. A. A. Spring Party). Months ahead our dates were paged, and for the first and last time we arrived on time for the seceiving line. For weeks afterward we dreamed of it. The formal was no sooner over than class day rolled around. Remember how Mariyn cried? After three busy months of blissful laziness we returned, superior and sophisticated Sophomores. How we looked down on those poor childish Freshies. We knew the school; we had been cround; or so we thought. Maynard Clark served us as a President, while his right-hand helpers were Audra Hatch and Bill Hammond. Miss Kiefer came back as sponsor, and we added Mr. Gray as her co-sufferer. We again were victorious, as Norma Faust assumed the duties of Secretary-Treasurer among the Student Council executives. Wayne Sharrar became Norma's No. 1 man this year. That gorgeous "hunk of man," Mr. Cuber, entered M. H. S. this term. Every girl yearned to take speech. Spring really hit us this time. Ruthie Noneman started going with Bob Smith; Mary Johnston snared Stewart Trefry: Danny Hochradel act "that way" about Donna B. At last the day dawned when we were upper classmen. Junicrs-what magic that name held. We attained the honor of being the first class to use the "Puffball" at the football games. What a relief from that drafty canvas tent. 'Youth Takes Over," the best Junior Play in years, everyone said. Bill Hammond was the typical Albert without much pretending. Them Greenfield got so well into his part he hasn't ceased to be sleepy since. Our final triumph—"Beneath the Briny Deep" was the '43 J-Hop theme. So closed our most exciting, and busiest, year. Marvin Shebel piloted us, assisted by Dorothy Wheeler and Beulah Snyder. The summer had its effect on the class, for on Sept. 9, 1943, when we re-entered school we numbered but 106. Two of the boys—Vic Camp and Doug Crandall, went into the armed services Danny Hochradel deserted for Monoe and Toledo. At last came the day we entered Marshall High as impregnable Seniors. We started off in high by choosing John Eaton, President; Marion Hale, Vice-President; and Beulah Robinson, Secretary-Treasurer. Each club, in the course of a year, usually sponsors a school dance, a pep assembly, and a party or two. The pre-war Latin Banquet was a real occasion. 
