Bob Howard (forward)—Although not a regular, this senior saw plenty of action. Icky showed up plenty "good" at Albion.

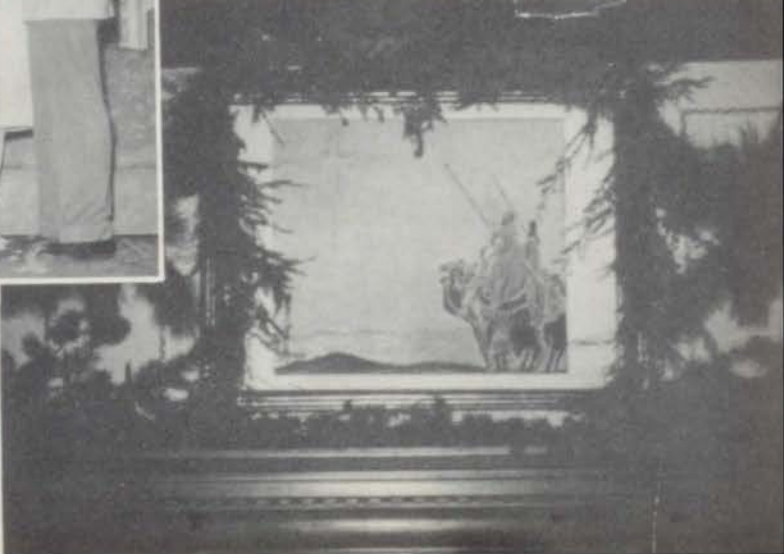
Clyde Reed (forward)—This lanky point-making junior was invaluable in Russell's absence, and will no doubt be a mainstay on the 46-47 team.
