

The Man and the Music...




SpirIt Transformed










Now It's Over



"I enjoyed it modernized. I liked the idea of using present day music, but I thought we could've expanded on that more," Thomas said.






The student council addresses many tasks over the course of one meeting, such as improving the school's recycling program,



This year's members were required to do ten hours of community service. Next year they will be required to do even more.


"I like that they require community service because it's a worthwhile project," Caron said. The members are also required to do two group projects a year. One was working the Sherman carnival.



YAC students get involved by going out and helping kids.






SADD organizes events and fundraisers throughout the whole year, but their efforts are focused around the school's prominent events: homecoming, prom and






You Can't Blame It On The Rain


The new teams in the league heard a lot of talking, but in the end they did the walking.




The JV nearly dominated the new SMAC league, losing only one game to Albion.





Every weekday freshman hall fills with "newbies". They cram together in one big group as they tear through their lockers in search of their belongings.



Counting the days until they inherit the school




From hand-waxed layouts to digital designs, the *Smoke Signals* team is advancing technique.







Three Part Harmony


Woodwind, brass, and percussion sections spend countless hours blending their talents to create a sound all their own.



Four different groups all perform in many different concerts including the Pops concert, the pre-festival concert, the winter concert, and the Rose concert in the spring.



With all of the advances in modern technology and communication, foreign language skills have become a necessary tool to influence people all over the world.



"I'm excited about econ next year. It will be cool, and a good experience for my business filled future, considering that I'm going to be a rich sports agent," junior Jon Hammond said.





The numerous P.E. classes offer all students a variety of ways to achieve and maintain physical fitness.



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
The 2002 Marshall High School Yearbook, *The Dial, is* 245 pages in length with one full signiture and an additional multiple of color. The theme and cover concept were developed by Nick Zalewski and Megan Adams at the Michigan Interscholastic Press Association camp. Their theme and concept took first place in their class. *The Dial* took 9 individual awards in the fall MIPA competition for the first time since the late 1980s. The yearbook is 9 by 11 inches in size. The printing cost of the yearbooks is \$36,000, with around \$3,000 coming from the fundrasier, and \$8,500 coming from advertising. The yearbook was in severe debt in 1999. Yearbook Advisor Diane Long and her last three staffs have erased that debt.

The student sections were developed by Nick Zalewski and Megan Adams. The ad sections were developed by Emily Boedecker, who was also in charge of ad sales throughout the year.

This was the second year of incorporating digital design. This year all layouts were original designs by Nick Zalewski. All traditional black and white pictures were developed by our chief photographer Jeff Hammer. All of the traditionally taken color photos were developed by Color One Photo and at Walmart. This year all pictures were scanned and placed using Photoshop 5.5. Underclass photos and team photos were taken by Prater Studios. Senior pictures were taken by a wide variety of photographers. Photos for the yearbook were taken by all of the students in both of the yearbook classes using two types of digital cameras, Fuji Fine Pics 4700, and a Fuji Mx 2900. All traditional pictures were taken on a Cannon Rebel 2000.





Patriotism Flying High At sunrise just before school begins, the American flag flies high over the school.






