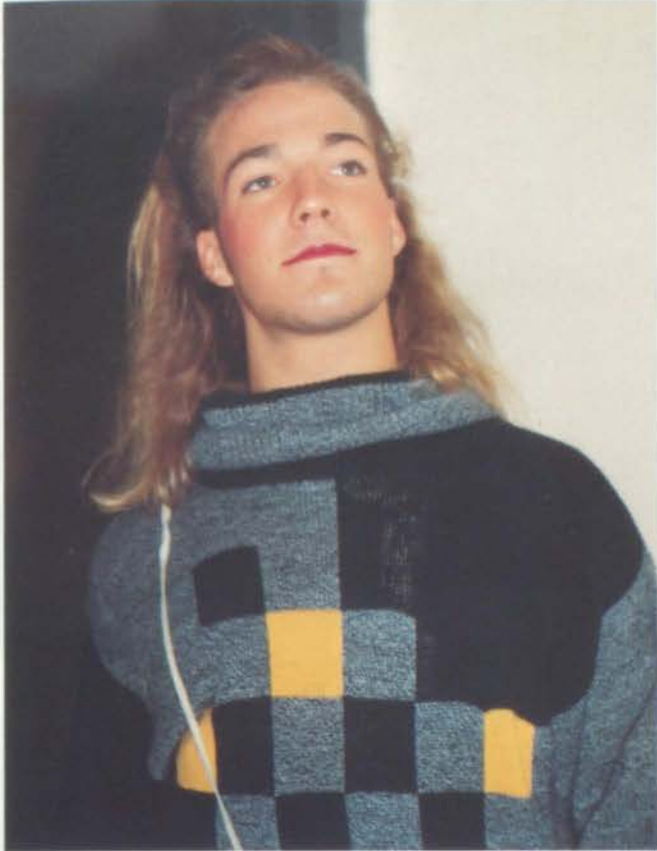

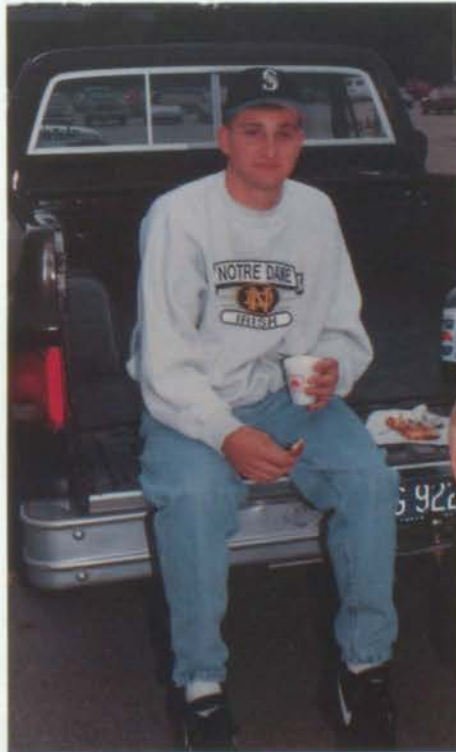

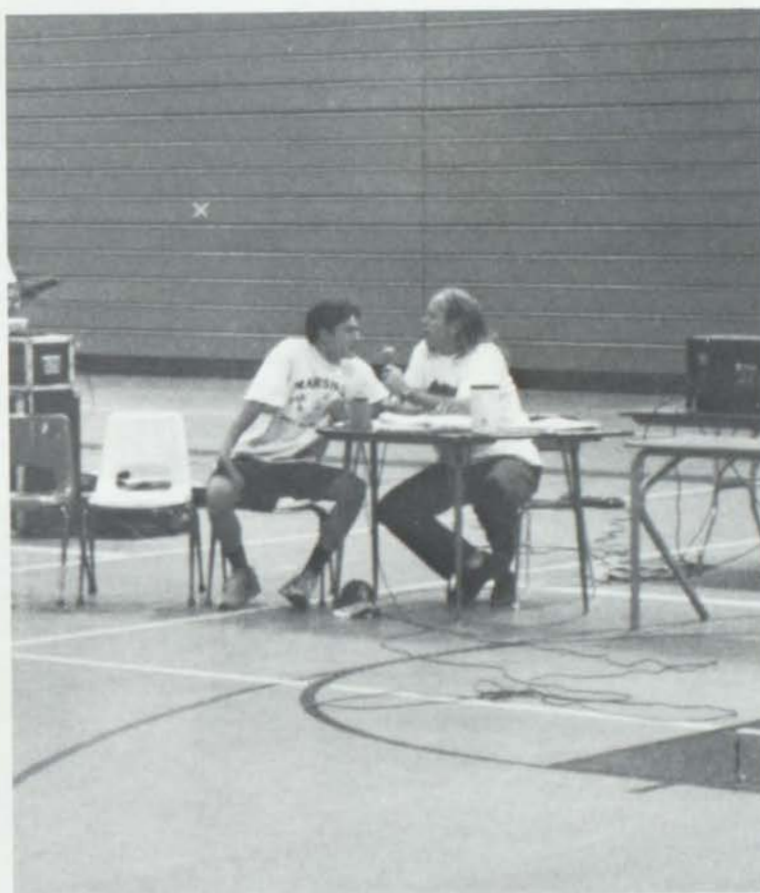

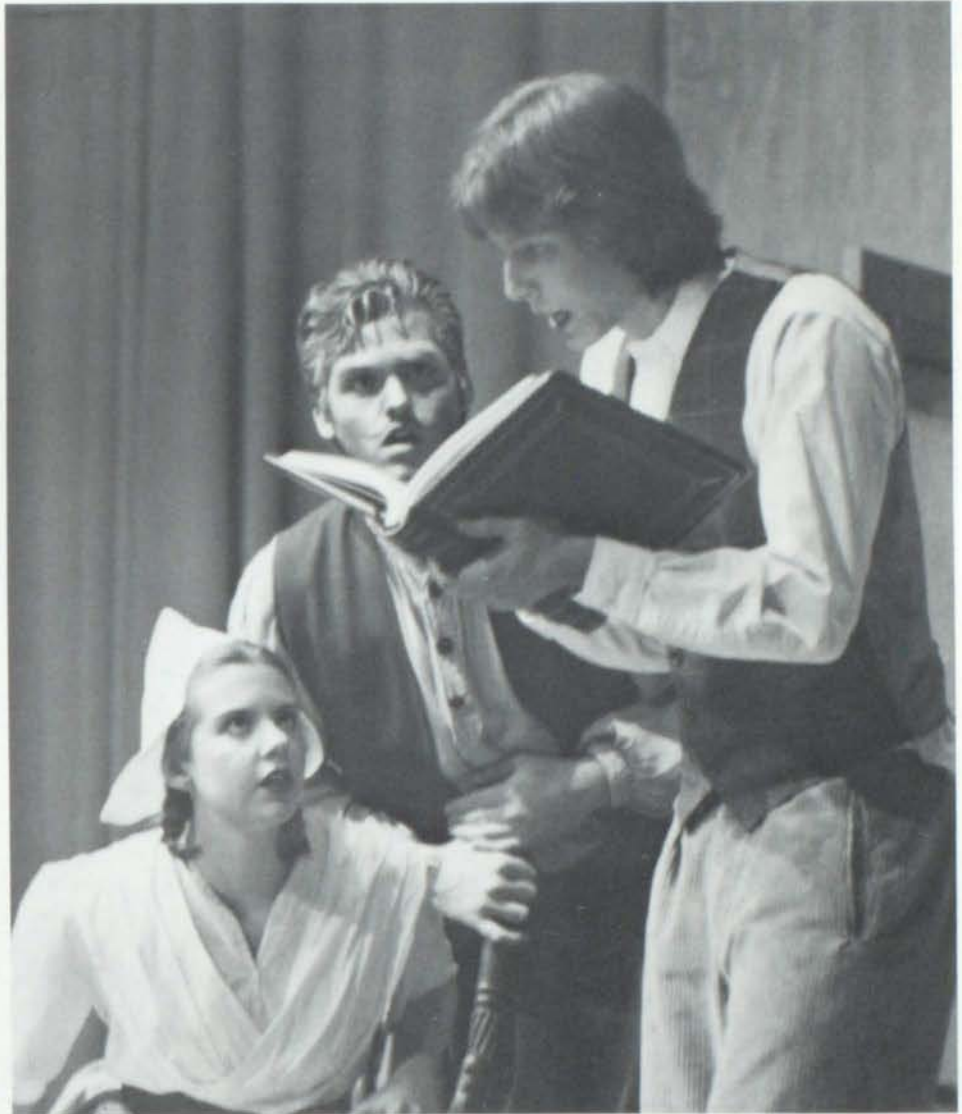

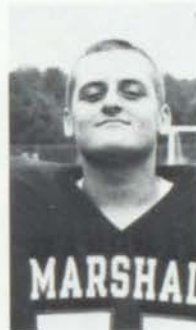

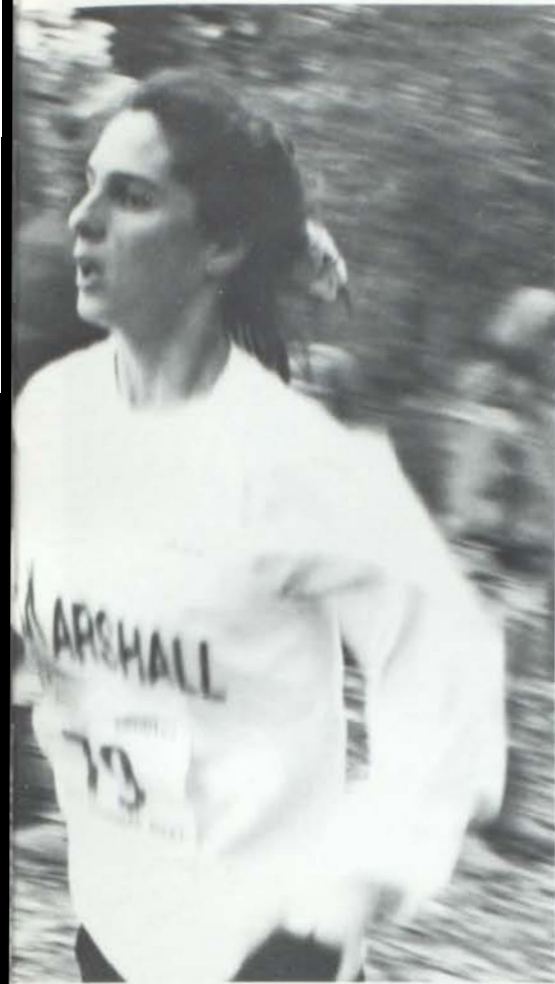

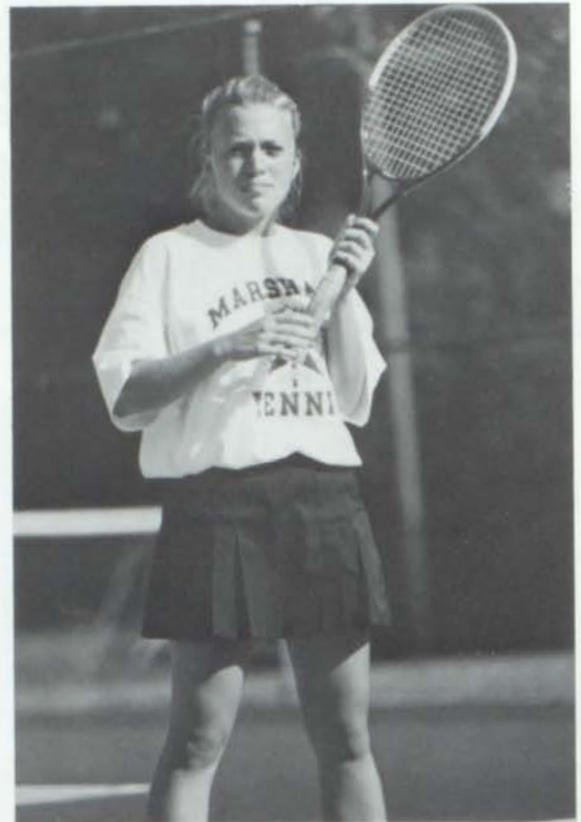

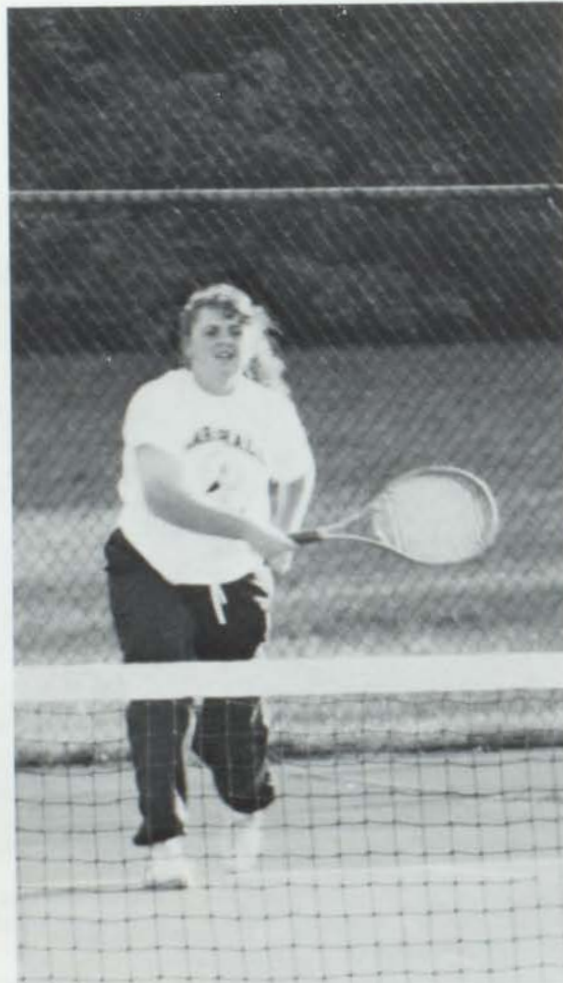

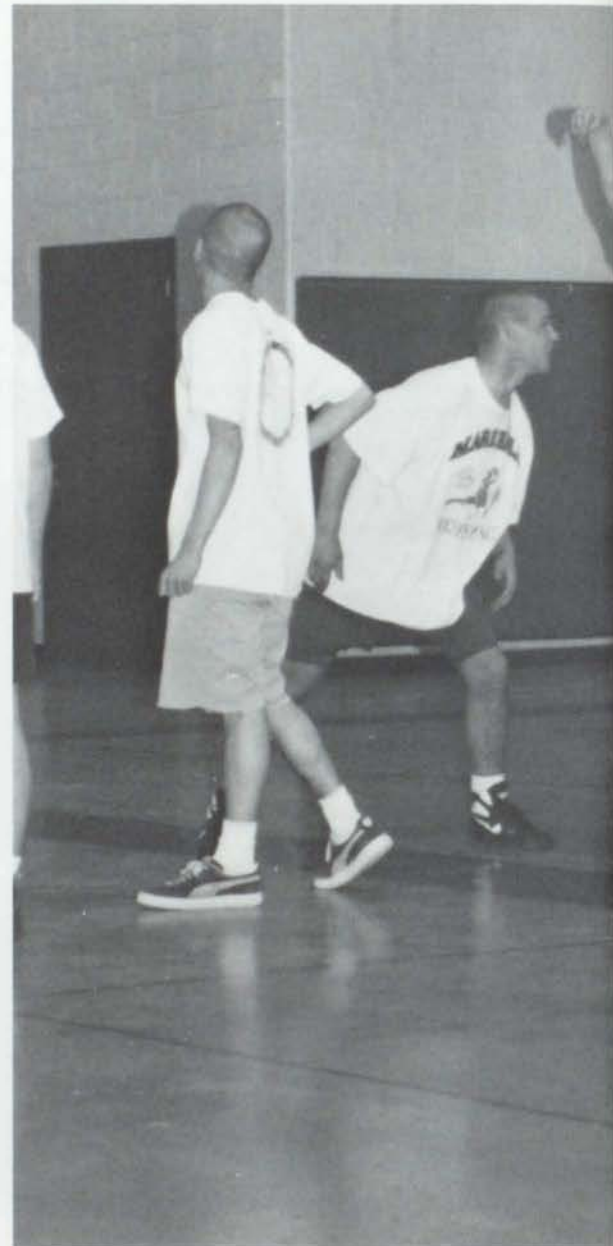

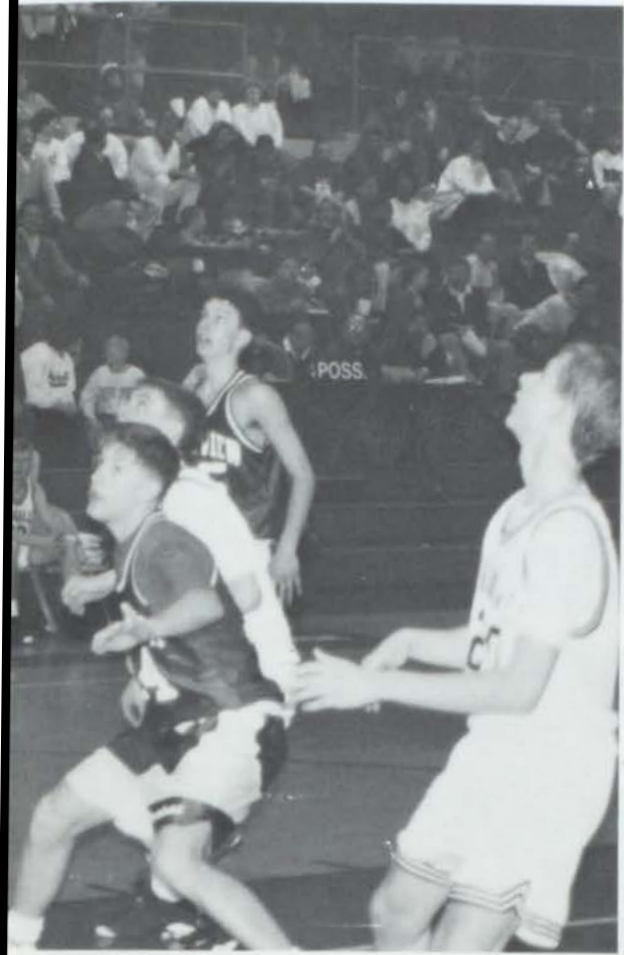

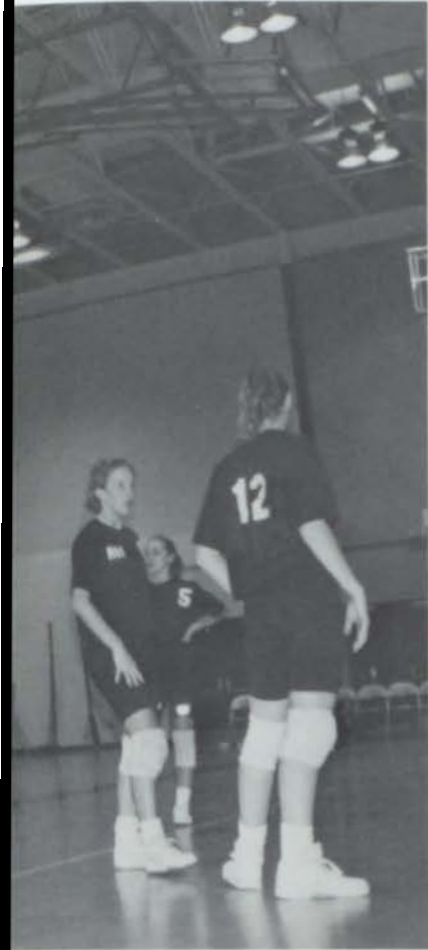

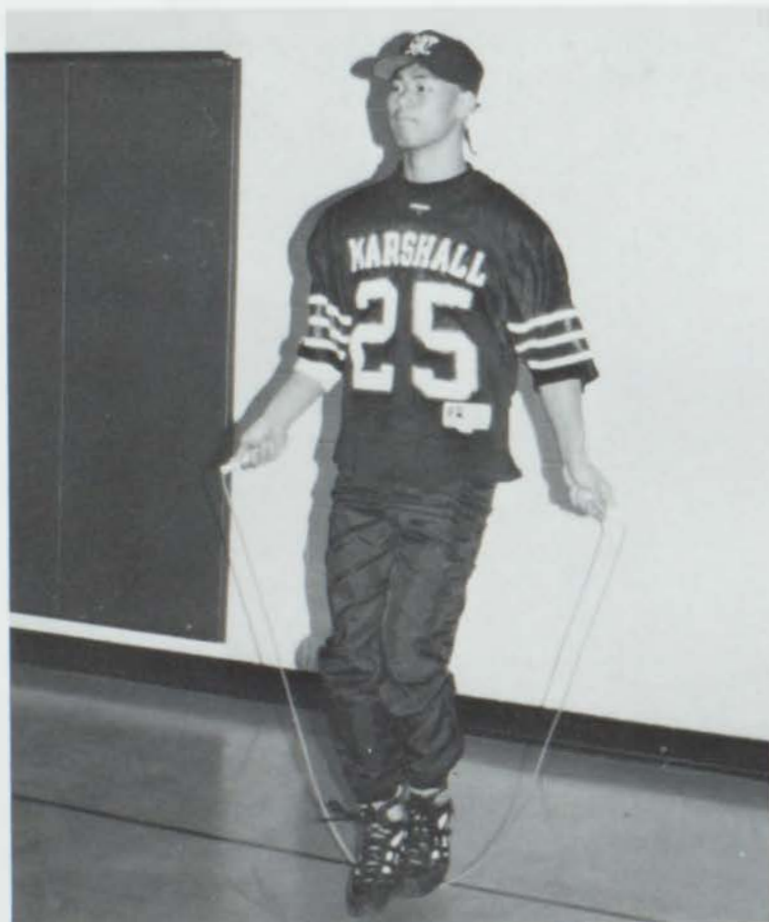
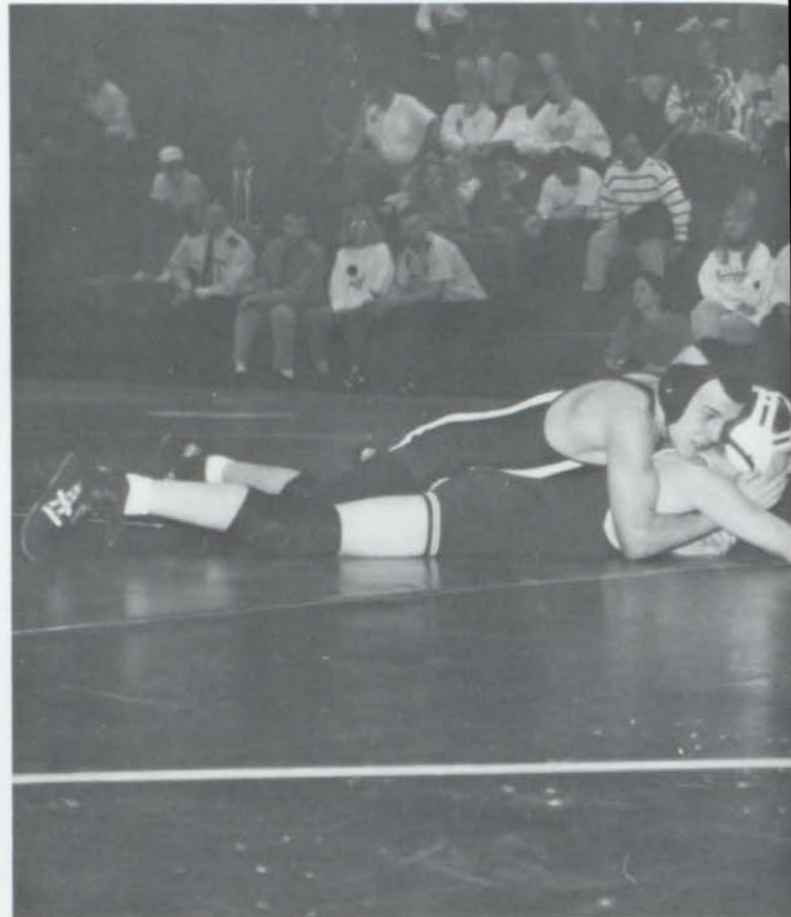
go to State next year.

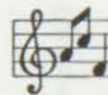

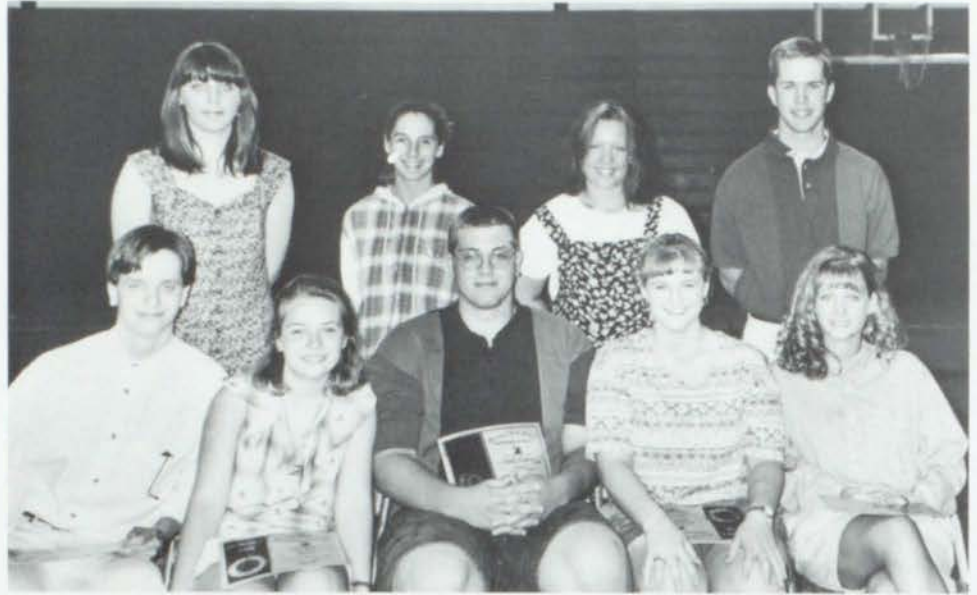
This year the faculty gave out about 262 awards to the hard-working student body. After the students received their awards, refreshments were made available for the hungry families.

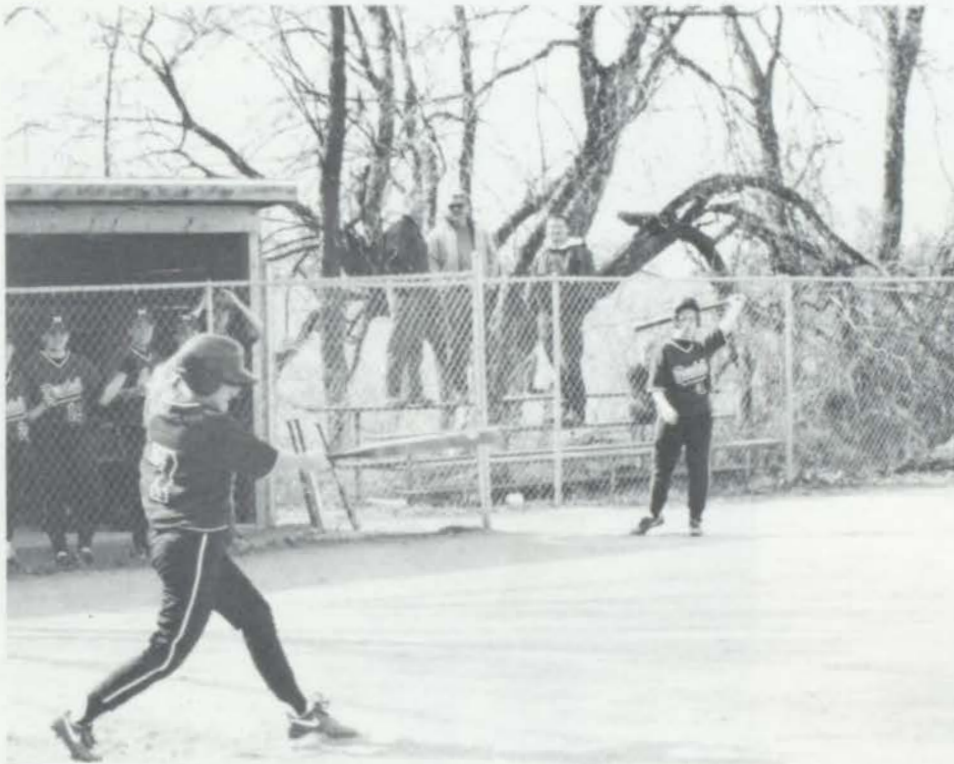

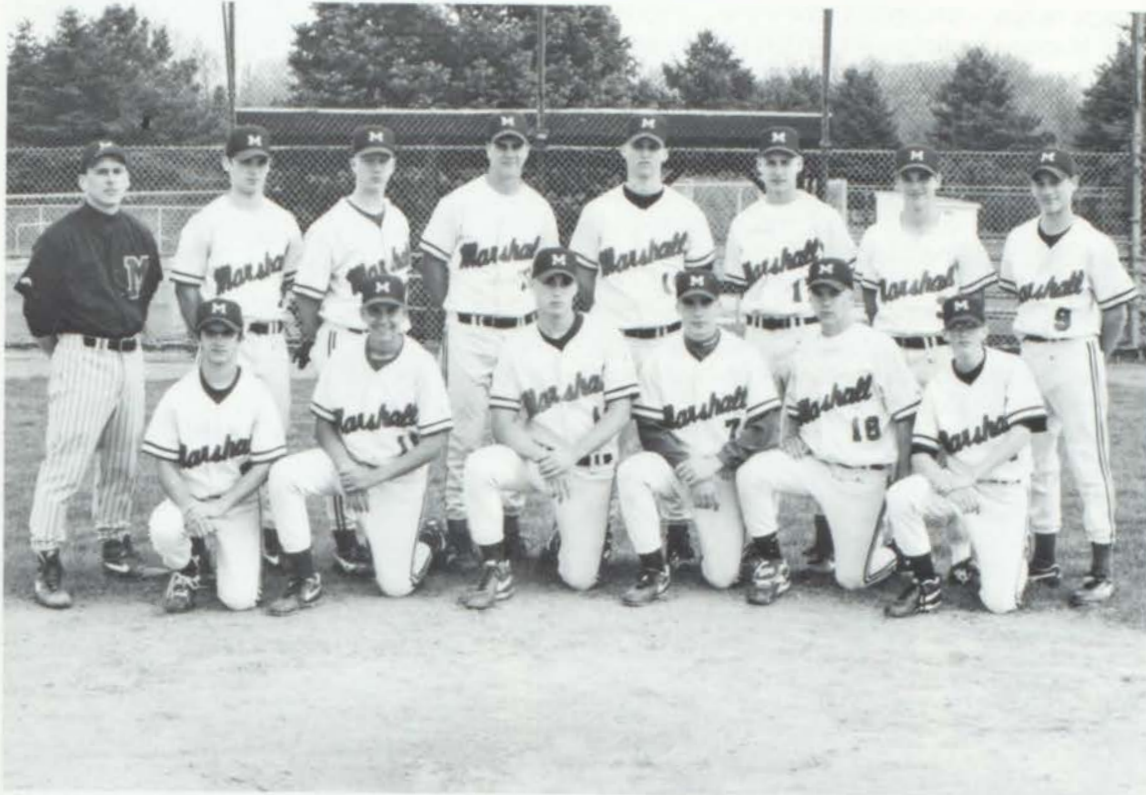

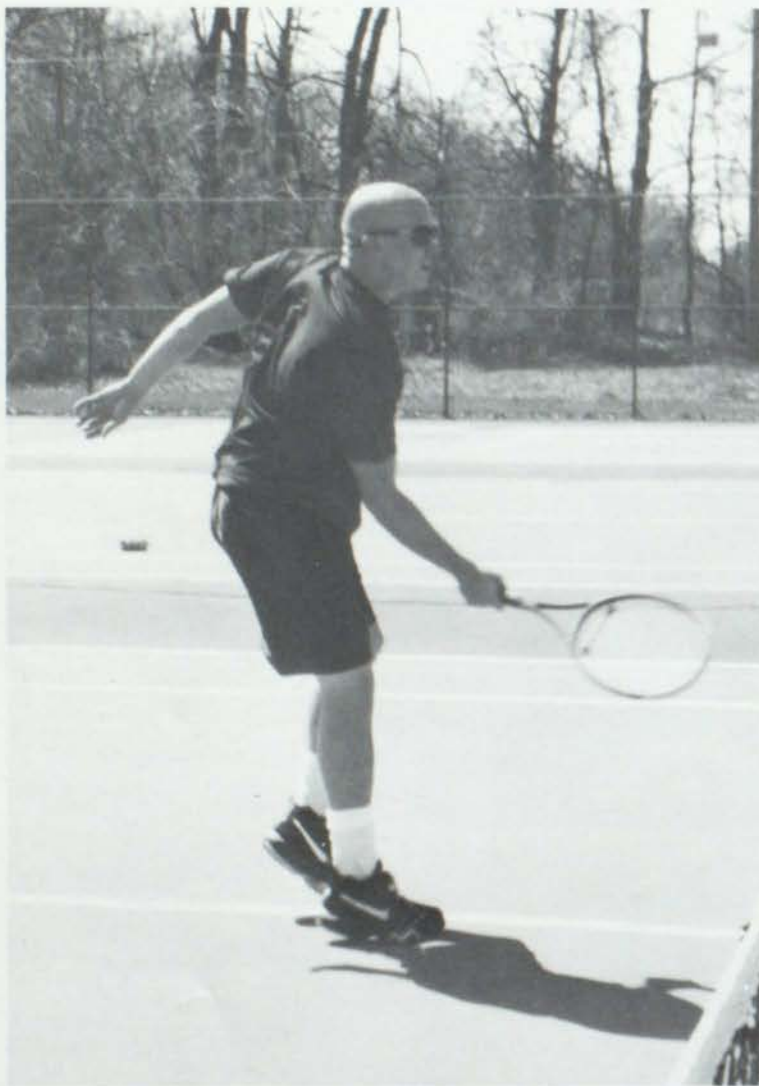

more Brian Wolf was awarded the Most Valuable Player. The Most Improved title was given to Junior James Mazo.

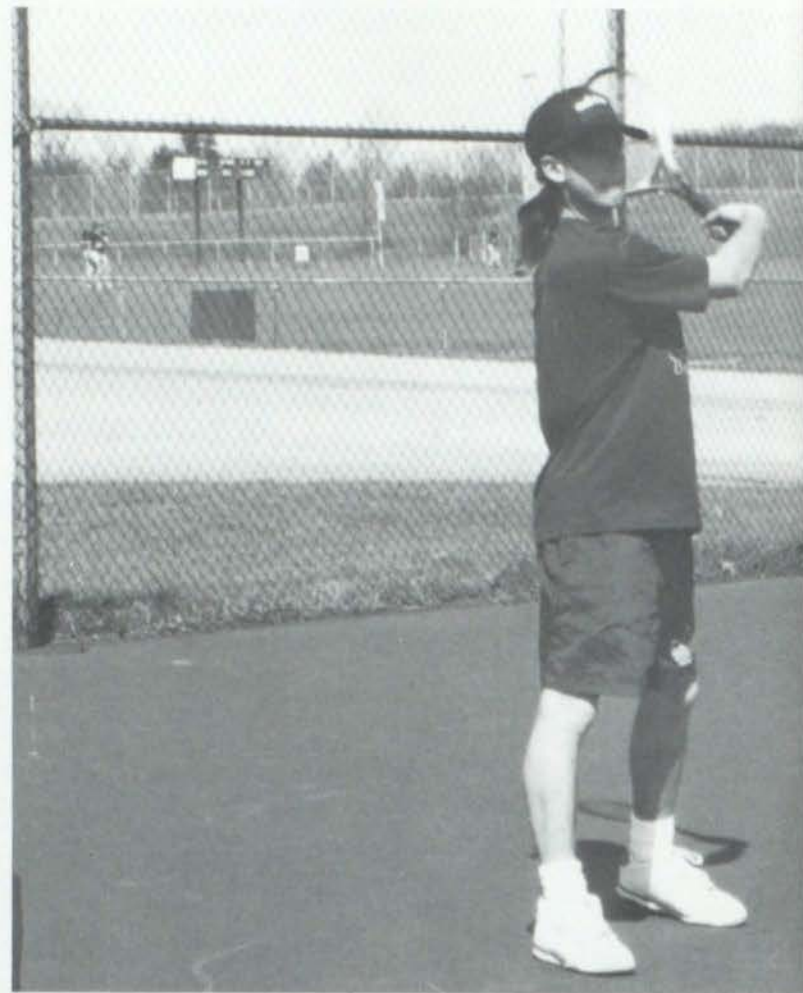
There were many guys that came out for tennis this year Marshall had a big J.V. team. They played around five games.

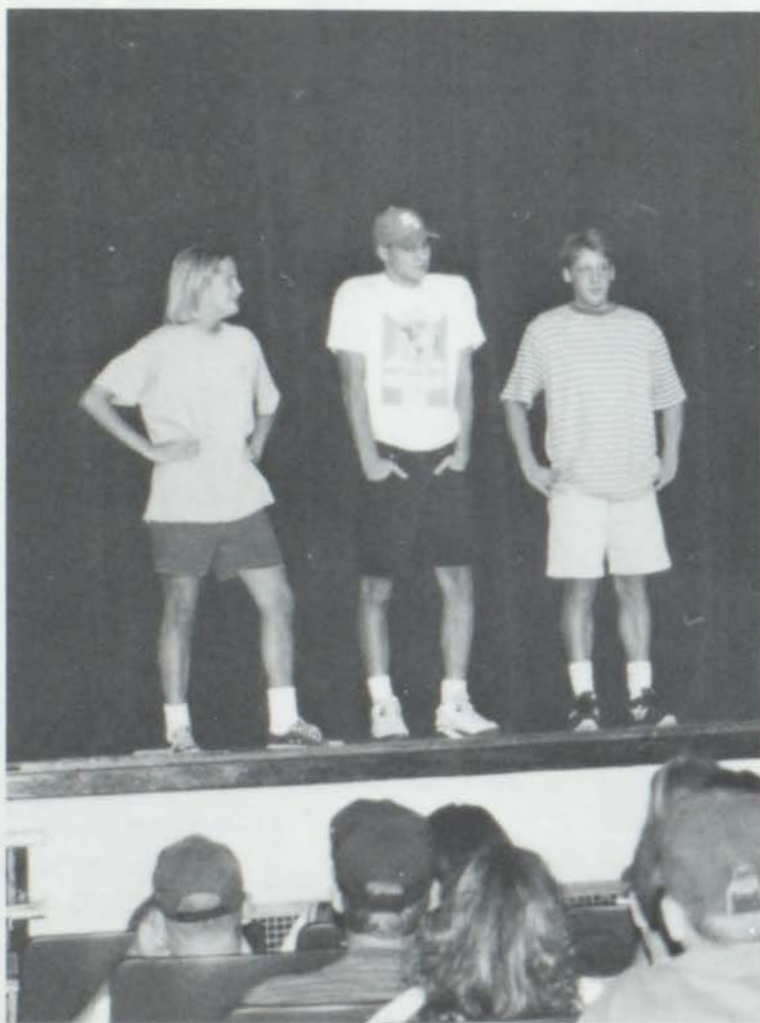


# Pulling all the stops

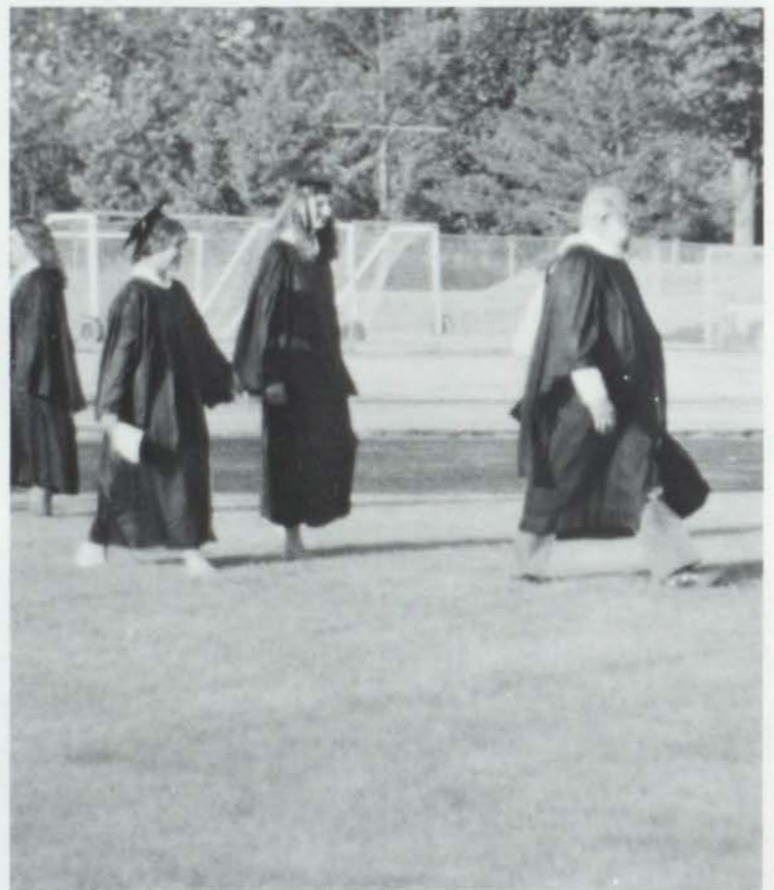

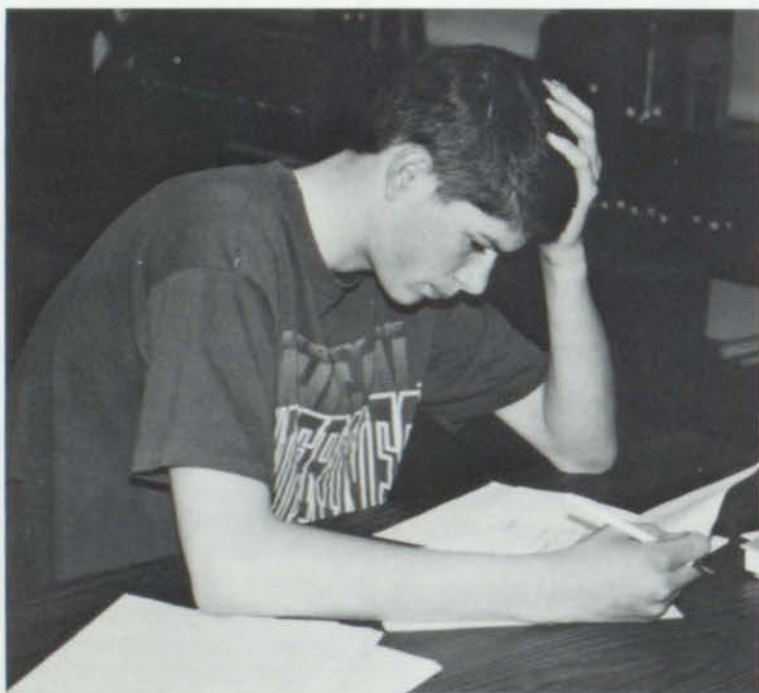

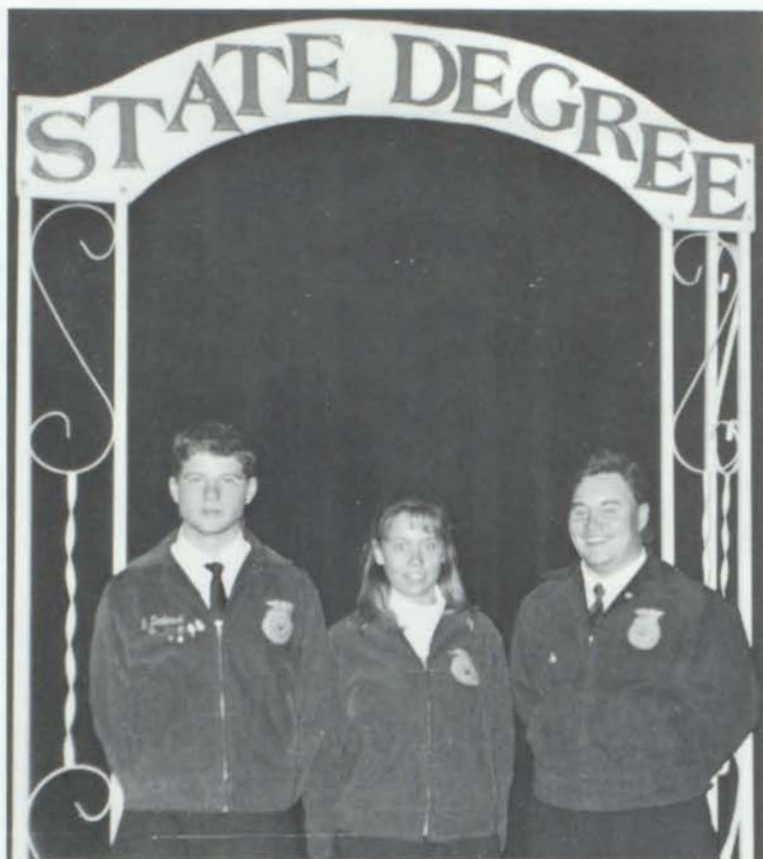
**F**FA is a great chance to get out and experience new opportunities. FFA members have great opportunities to travel all around to various contests and conventions.

The Marshall Singers had a productive year under the direction of Phil Clissold.



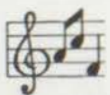

# Taking the scenic route

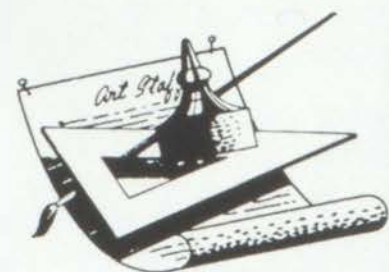

Marshall High's Art Department offers variety of courses for students,

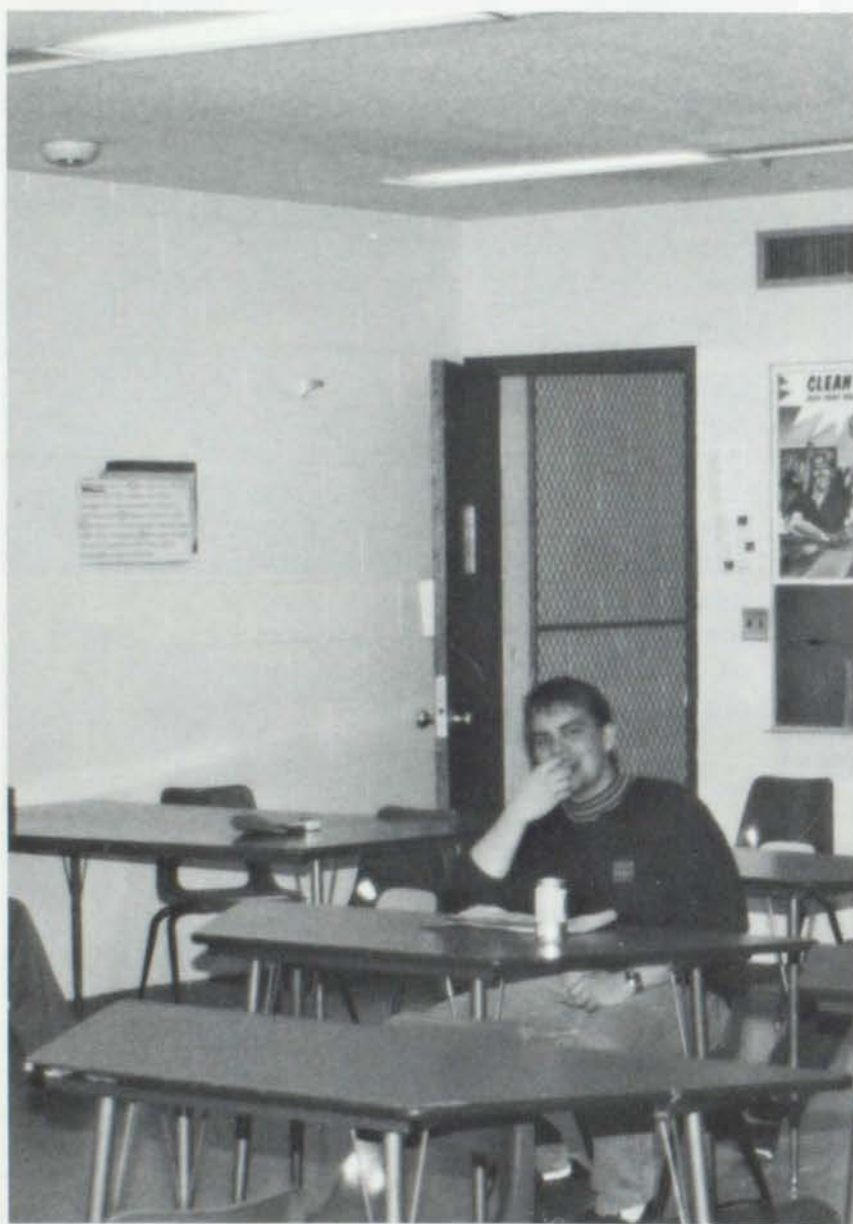

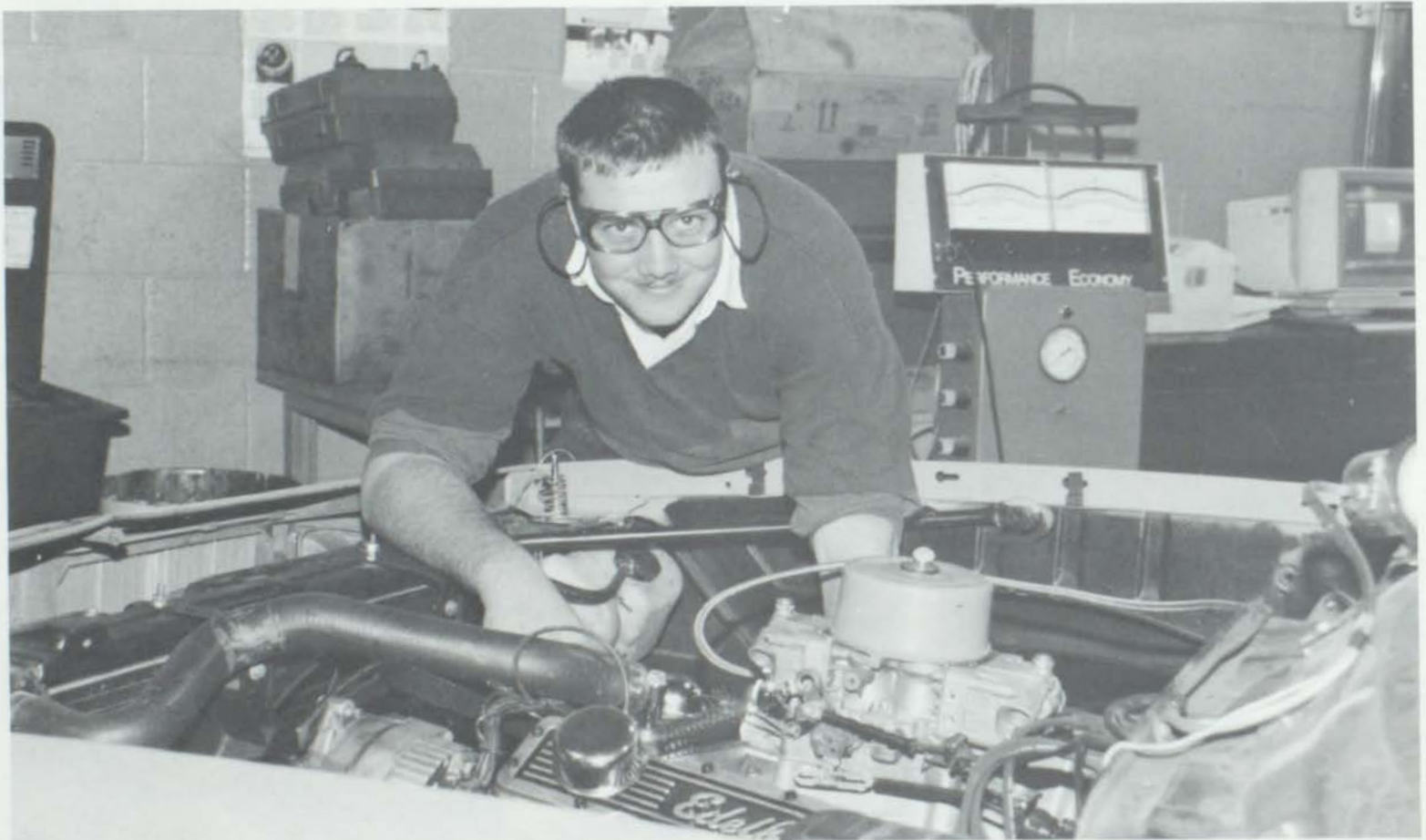
# A ride to a career

# A road trip through 93/94

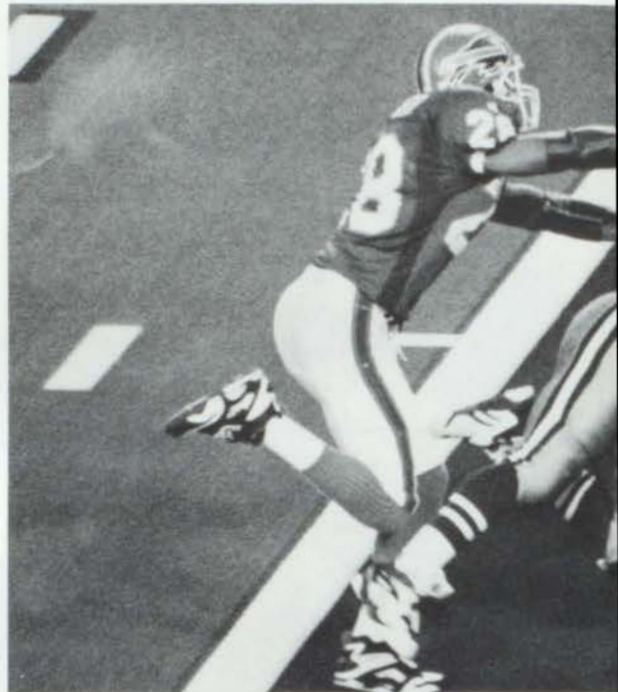

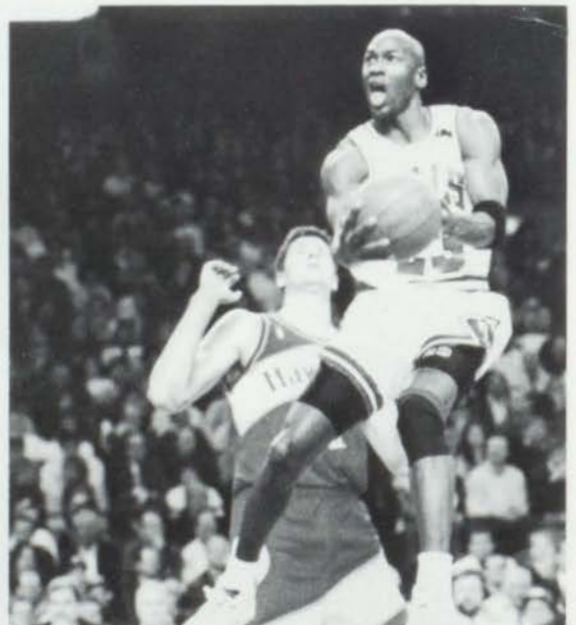

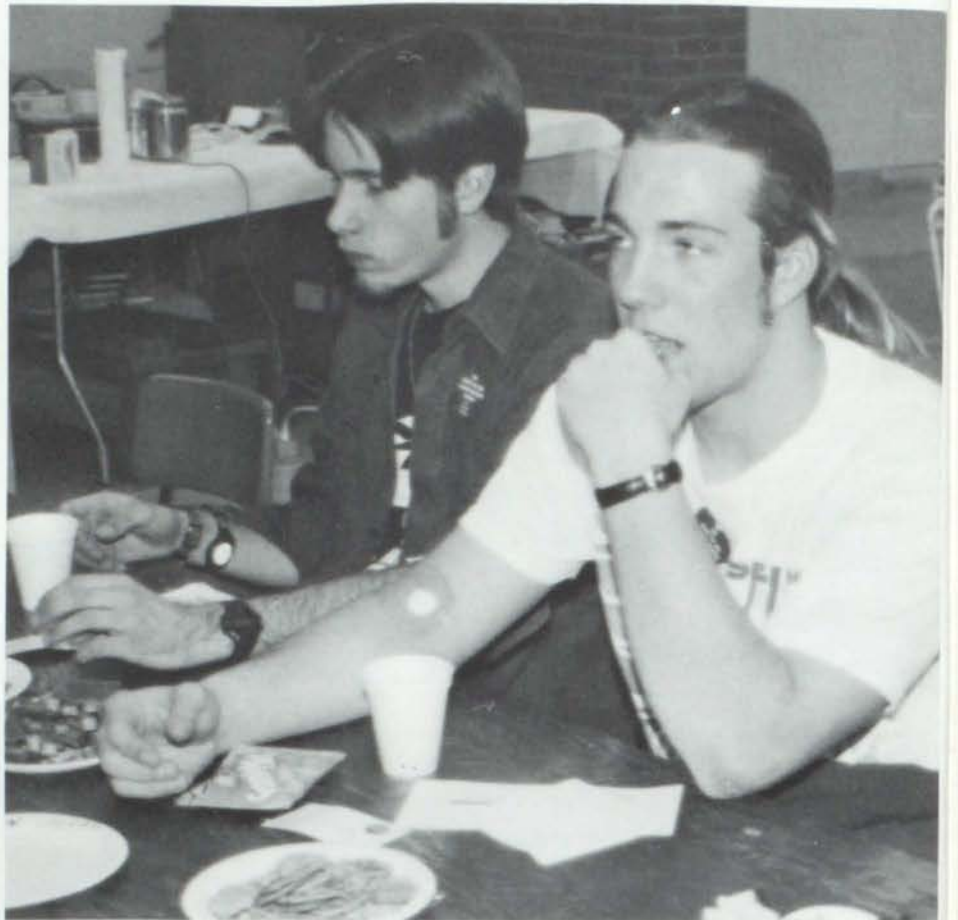
