








## A seeson of ups one cours

This year's Freshman and Junior Varsity football teams were very successful during the 1993 season. It might not have shown in their scores, but it showed in their much-improved play over the course of the season.



These players all worked very hard this year, as individuals and a team. Both of these teams will soon be Marshall fans' pride as a Varsity team.

















Championship.








# Sliding over the competition









The Buffalo Bills were defeated 30-13 on Sunday, January 30, 1994, which was their fourth straight Su-


